Plans Set for Celebration

The village council decided to resurface five streets in Cass City at their regular monthly meeting at the Cass City Municipal building, Tuesday night.

Among the streets selected will be the roads running past Auten Motor Sales, Hartwick's Market, Damm's Sales and Service, Cass Tavern and sections of the road running to the Nestle's Milk Co. The streets will get a coat of black topping about 20 feet wide that will be applied in the center of the roads.
