The point is well illustrated by examining the records of Cass City's two 1951 champions—Bill Zinnecker, who had the grand champion lamb that brought him an even \$400, and Dale Leslie, whose steer, "Blackboy," was grand champion and brought \$2,210 at the sale.

Bill started his 4-H career in 1945 when he was 10 years old and had the third

place steer in the Detroit show. After that auspicious start, here is the way his record reads:1946:Reserve Grand Champion steer at Junior Livestock Show and grand champion Angus heifer at 4-H show at MSC; 1947: Best group of two steers shown by one exhibitor at Junior Livestock Show and reserve champion Angus of state at

Michigan dairymen use three

Individual merit means to select a cow for her own record and type. "We need to set standards above which we would like our cows to be, Ralston says. "The cow we're considering for our herd should produce more than the breed average and more than our pres-


ent herd average." If cows are classified for typethey should at least classify "good" or "good plus" or above. 'And we must not overlook the disposition and handling qualities

of the individual cow," he says.
Ralston explains that pedigree evaluation means simply taking into account the production of the cow's mother, half sisters and other close relatives. Cows which are of a good cow family probably will pass along production ability more like that family than herself. For that reason he suggests checking production of the cow's close relatives in making your choice.

Progeny performance means production of the cow's offspring. If the cow's sons and daughters have high production and good type, then she's probably a good prospect to add to your herd or keep if she's already there.





Strip Cropping Helps Hold Soil in Place It's Only First Step In Conservation Plan Strip cropping, an important parti of soil conservation, is a good deal! like putting a splint on a broken! bone. The splint holds the bone

in place, but it doesn't knit it.

Strip cropping helps hold the soil

in place, but it won't rebuild rundown fertility. The above picture is a beautiful example of strip cropping, but it was not accomplished by mere contour plowing. It was accomplished by sound soil conservation, based on use and treatment of land with all proven, appropriate measures that are needed to keep it permanently productive while



Strip cropping on a field just north of Neillsville, Wis., is a beautiful example of one step toward soil conservation.

Sound conservation means terracing land that needs terracing; contouring, strip cropping, and stubble-mulching the land as needed; along with use of supporting measures of crop rotation, cover and green manure crops and the use of the right commercial fertilizers.

No farmer should undertake a conservation program without expert advice. He should first contact any one of his soil conservation district officers and apply for assistance from his district. If he doesn't know who his officers are, he can locate the address of his district office in the phone book, or he can call his county agent. Districts help only farmers who request their assistance,

### Number of U.S. Farms Lowest Since the 1890s

The number of farms in the United States has continued to decline since the end of World War II with the current total the lowest since before the turn of the century.

The department of agriculture reports there were fewer than 5.4 million farms in the country last year. This figure compares with approximately 5.9 million in 1945, and with the peak number of 6.8 million in

Thus the number of American or more than a fifth, in the last decade and a half-a period in which land in farms has continued to increase and in which total agricultural production has likewise shown a spectacular increase in aggregate volume of products raised as well as in total market value.

In 1900 there were some 5.7 million farms in the U.S., approximately 350,000 more than at present. A decade before, in 1890, the minber of farms was about 4.6 million.

Sliding Door



Poultry raisers can save many a step by a sliding door in poultry houses which can be operated from the outside. A small rope attached to the door by a screw eye runs to the ceiling or roof boards, along the wall, through the side of the chicken house and terminates in a ring. A hook can be attached to the side of the building and thus hold the door open.

Farm Exports Increase 14 Per Cent, Report

The agriculture department reported recently that farm exports ncreased 14 per cent over the preceding fiscal year. The total was placed at \$3,409,245,000. Cotton exports led the group in 1950-51 with a total of \$935,332,000,000, the second highest in 26 years. Wheat and wheat flour ranked second in value at \$747.570,000, up 9 per cent over the \$683,229,000 the preceding fiscal year.
