The Christmas Concert at the school was also cancelled due to weather conditions and is now scheduled for Sunday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock.



Still in Good Health, **Ibbitson Celebrates** His 101st Birthday

Relatively few persons live long enough to have great-grandchildren, but Henry Ibbitson, who celebrated his 101st birthday, Tuesday, Dec. 11, note only has nine great-grandchildren but seven great-great-grandchildren as well.

The aged Gagetown pioneer is still alert, according to Miss Rosalia Mall, the Chronicle's Gagetown reporter, who secured the story, and in good health for his age. Mr. Ibbitson walks with a cane and is well enough to attend church services every Sunday at the Huron County Infirmary, where he has been a paying guest for 23 years. He has a regular seat in the front for the services, so that he can hear the sermon.

Since his 100th birthday, Mr. Ibbitson has not been able to keep an accurate record of his age and claims to be 103. However, family records show him to be 101.

Mr. Ibbitson was born Dec. 18, 1850, near London, Ont., and came to Michigan with his parents when he was 15 years old.

Seventy-four years ago he settled on a 60-acre farm north and west of Gagetown and was busy farming for 41 years, although it has been 33 years since he retired.

Approximately seven years after he retired, Mr. Ibbitson's wife died and the family stone was cut and placed in the cemetery lot at Gagetown. On the stone he lists his birth as 1850.

A few years after his wife died, Mr. Ibbitson moved to the infirmary where he now lives. Besides grandchildren and great-great-grandchildren, Mr. Ibbitson has two daughters, Mrs. Fanny Epplett and Mrs. Samantha Sansburn, both of Pontiac.





Calves should be kept in dry pens protected from drafts, and isolated from animals showing symptoms of sickness. Individual pens with solid partitions and raised slotted platform floors are ideal for baby calves. Calf losses can be cut in half in many Michigan dairy herds, by just changing a few management practices. Today's heifer calves are tomorrow's dairy herd. Don't jeopardize your future production machinery. Calves are valuable.

All indications are that the upply of commercial fertilizer will be less than the demand in 1952. Wise farmers will order and take delivery early to get the analysis desired.

This is the time of year that farmers should take a look at the past year's business and try to detect the strong and weak points in the operation. To help do this job in an efficient manner, agricul-tural economics bulletin 480, "Farm Business Analysis" for 1951, covering the cash crop and dairy area of Michigan, has been prepared by Michigan State College. 

"Greetings by Mail" Originated in 1846, Now a Modern Custom

Look at the paintings on the Christmas cards you send and receive-you'll find famous names and some of the best contemporary art. Here is how it all began.

On a December day in 1846, s middleclass Englishman, Henry Cole, sat at the library desk of his London home addressing to his friends what were probably the first Christmas cards ever printed. The cards depicted a Victorian family assembled at the festive board and the traditional Christmas customs of giving to the poor. They also bore the now-classic greeting: "A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to you."

Cole, in a historic move, two months before had commissioned John Calcott Horsley, a Royal



Academy artist, to paint the illustration for the card and had struck off a thousand lithographed copies. He dispatched them that December. This was such a markedly successful stroke of good will that plain Henry Cole subsequently became Sir Henry Cole.

Horsley's art was a far cry from today's Christmas card paintings, but he started a cycle which a hundred years later was to bring fine art into high favor on Christmas

An American shopping for cards may select, for instance, a painting called "Snow Under the Arch" by another Royal Academy member-Winston Churchill, Britain's wartime prime minister and famed amateur artist. Or he might choose Peter Hurd's "One Night in Winter" or "Grandma" Moses" "The White Church' or "The Nativity" by Alexander Ross.





Christmas Carols Herald Yuletide Immemorially


For centuries Christmas Carols have heralded the Yuletide season around the Christian world. Many of them, slightly altered by changing times and customs, have been handed down from one generation to

Rice Fields

Flooding a rice field requires about six gallons of water per minute per acre. In other words, a well or other irrigation system producing 600 gallons of water per minute will irrigate 100 acres of rice. 





This is by far the fundamental cause of the breakdown of civilizations of the past. The only lesson we learn from history is that we do not learn from history." Containment and Balances of, Power and Alliances at best have only maintained a pseudo peace for a limited period

of time, eventuating in war. Modern warfare means no vicor-but all stand to lose. A better approach to the problem of security is conceived today in terms of world disarmament, control of weapons, and with international inspection through the United Nations. In the book, "God and The Nations," partly used in the series of discussions, James P. Warbury states, "Removing the means of aggression from governments is the only way to prevent war between nations."

"Security in its final analysis," said pastor Vender, "is basically a religion problem, rather than political, economic or military-for security can only be founded upon justice, tolerance, freedom morality, help for the weak and underprivileged. This is what Gen. Mc-Arthur meant when, at the surrender of Japan, he said, "Our problem is a theological one, rather than political." Politicians and statesmen-backed by the common man or citizen, of course, have to work out these principles, but they will have to rise above the "fur coat" level of morality if hope is to be found in high office, for Gandhi stated a great truth when he said, "What is morally wrong can never be politically right."

If we are losing the minds of the people of Asia and Africa, and among Moslem people in the Near East, we had better look well to our strategy and our own morality and policies in the West.

If the appeal for the minds of the masses—rather than the military route (though the need of strength at present is conceded) is the best hope for curtailment and building security, then we must give greater consideration to the problems of equality and justice with reference to color and race; more attention and expenditures for 'bread;' greater emphasis on land for the landless and freedom for nations struggling to be born.

You cannot stop communism, as I see it, by liquidating to communist leaders, but only by doing away with the causes which breed

Long-Time Resident Of Greenleaf Dies



First invented as a sales giveaway promotion for Montgomery Ward by Robert L. May, Rudolph was featured in many free booklets before he become associated with Christmas. Songwriter Johnny Marks liked the title "Rudolph, the Red Nosed Reindeer", so he wrote a song about it. He was so sure he had a success that he started his own Publishing company, using "Rudolph" as his first release. Gene Autry made the initial recording, and that one record sold 2,000,000 copies.

Last year, there were 16 different ecordings of the song for sale, ranging from boogle-woogle by Sugar Chile Robinson to Bing Crosby, and cowboy singers.

Tree Decoration Has Ancient Source In Arabian Legend

Small Amount of Plant Food Will Keep Needles on Tree

If you have the type of a treeholder that permits the tree trunk to rest in water, you will find that a small amount of plant food dissolved in the water will aid in retaining the needles on the tree, and keep the needles green. If you use a pebble or rock-filled pail to support the tree, cover the pebbles or rock with a plant food solution.

Use one teaspoonful of plant food, powdered form, to each gallon of water in the container, or use one plant food tablet to each gallon.

Special Paints Curb Mildew

Special paints that prevent the growth of mildew are of great importance in food factories. To determine the efficiency of this type of coating, one test was made in a pickle factory.' 



Keep Christmas Tree In Water for Safety

Keep the Christmas tree in water if you want an easy and practical way to reduce fire hazards in

your home during the holidays.

That warning comes from Dave Steinicke, extension safety specialist at Michigan State College. Keeping the tree in water will also prevent needles from shedding.

Safety measures begin as soon as the tree is brought home. If the tree is purchased or cut early, keep it in a cool place, such as a shed or a garage, where it will be protected from drying winds.

Before the tree is to be brought into the house, the end of the trunk should be cut diagonally at least an inch above the original cut end. Stand the tree at once in a container of water and keep the water level above the cut surface during the entire time the tree is in the

When this treatment with water is started in time, it will prevent the needles from drying out and becoming inflammable. It will also slow the fall of needles of species like spruce, which loses needles very quickly in contrast to balsam fir, which retains its needles even after branches have become dry.

As a special precaution against fire, a fire-retardant coating can simple formula calls for a pint of water glass (sodium silicate) and 4 tablespoons of water containing a detergent or wetting agent. This is enough to cover a 4-foot tree when applied with a hand spray. It produces a shiny, transparent colorless coating which will make the tree fire resistant.


