#### Give Your Faded Clothes New **And Fresh Colors Easily** By Ertta Haley

FRONTIER wives had to have a smattering of chemistry and botany as well as time and energy

to spend long hours over steaming kettles with muscle straining perieds of dipping, and wringing when they wanted to dye fabrics. Today's homemaker needs only to select appropriate colors, then

easily and speedily finish the work of dyeing, be it clothing or drapes, spreads, rugs or blankets. Once the nature of the material

was a problem in dyeing, but there are now dyes available for all types of fabrics, with the exception of those made from glass or metal. Synthetic as well as natural materials can be dyed quickly and without worry over results if the simplest directions are followed.

Color is lovely, and it can make your life brighter if used with discretion. Why not check over wardrobe items some day soon, and at the same time take a look at some of the fabric furnishings in the home? Are they faded? Have you added something to the clothing or furnishings line which now makes the old color less attractive?

These are some of the reasons for dyeing, but economy is also an important factor. Some material which has been rendered useless can be put to good use if dyed.

Select the dye designed for the type of fabric to be dyed. If you are in doubt as to what the material contains, or if it is a mixture, play safe by using the all-purpose

Small articles can be dyed in something as simple as a wash basin or an enameled vessel, While larger articles can be placed in tub or washing machine.

#### New Dye-Color Depends Upon Old Color

It isn't always necessary to remove the old color from materials before dyeing. Let's say that you have a faded yellow dress and want to have one that's green. If blue dye is used, then green will be the result, as yellow and blue give green. Blue and red will make violet, while red and yellow will



Refresh an old wardrobe . . .

If dresses or items of apparel are simply faded several shades and you want to keep the same color, or restore the color to something like it was when new, simply use the shade closest to the one you already have in the material. or spotted, the color in a material

can be dyed a deeper shade. Can the dark colors be removed? It's not advisable to try to remove the color from a navy blue dress or coat, for example, and try to make it a pastel. Color can be removed and a lighter shade used successfully, but to have a pastel requires that the original material be almost white, or streaking may

Dark colors which you no longer like can be safely dyed black, and the material put to other use.

Two kinds of dyes can be mixed together in the solution before dyeing for interesting effect. Try this on a sample of the material to be dyed before dyeing the whole piece of material.

The prints on printed materials cannot be removed by color remover, but a dye-solution slightly darker than that used on the print will produce attractive and novel

effects. Decide whether you're going to tint or dye your garments. True dyeing produces a fast color, and is recommended for dark or deep colors. Tinting takes less time and is suggested for light colors where the desired color range is temporary; this will usually survive several launderings, but with each laundering the color may lighten.

For Dyeing If you've picked out a dress from the closet and have decided to dye it, make certain it's clean and well

avoid handling bulky places by hand. The amount of dye is usually determined by the weight of the article.

If the weight of the material is 12 ounces or less, you'll need approximately two ounces of dye. For each additional six ounces of material, use an ounce of dye. These weights apply to cotton, linen, silk and viscose rayon. For acetate rayon or nylon you'll need slightly more dye, for lighter colors and up to three times these amounts for the darkest colors.

#### Well Managed Acre Will Support a Cow

An acre and a quarter of wellmanaged, well-fertilized pasture will provide good "board and room" for a dairy cow during the summer grazing season and keep that cow sleek and well-fed with high-protein grass silage through the winter, J. L. Haynes, agronomist at Ohio Experiment Station, says. To build high ylelding pasture, he recommends seeding a legume grass mixture and adding plant nutrients to the soil.

#### Sick Soils Can Be Nursed Back to Health

Sick soils can be nursed back to health by means of soil tests which tell the farmer what plant foods and management methods are needed to restore run down fields to high crop yields. In Missouri alone, 69 county soil clinics are diagnosing soil afiments and prescribing treatments. #### Farm Welder Becomes Standard Equipment Quick Repairs Reduce Loss of Time and Profit

The welder is fast becoming standard farm equipment. It answers the farmers prayers for quick repair jobs that would otherwise mean a great loss of time and profit. It is also being used to make equipment that means greater pro-

As an example, one corn belt farmer used his welder to construct the inclined plane, portable elevator shown in the above picture. The conveyor, which has a large hopper at the ground end, is operated by a % horsepower electric motor.

In order to provide electric service for cribs which might be located at some distance from the barn, the farmer built a portable



feet of cable. This gives him an "extension cord" of the proper strength to carry the current needed from a 230-volt outlet in the barn. On the work side of production, he discovered that little more labor. was needed to increase his yield. Figuring this out on a dollar and cents basis, labor costs, on a 40 bushel yield, are about 25 cents a whereas on 100-bushel yields the cost is just 10 cents per bushel the selling price having taken care of the differential in labor



#### Serve Pancakes

STACK THEM FOR breakfast, luncheon, dinner or supper-pancakes, of course! These versatile cakes, made thick or thin according to your taste will go to any meal. Make them plain for the morning and serve with breakfast meats.

The rapid progress in soil conthe keynote of the annual report of on the program Saturday, March the Soil Conservation Service for the 1951 fiscal year. The report also emphasized the need for soil conservation to aid the current mobilization effort and stresses the fact that total conservation is essential.

Tremendous progress has been made in the science and practical application of soil and water conservation during the last two dec-

The service helped 128,502 farmers and ranchers develop conservation plans on 36,259,299 acres last year. This brought the total as of June 30, 1951, to 883,848 plans covering 246,740,009 acres of land.

There are now about 2,400 organized soil conservation districts operated by farmers and ranchers under state laws. The survey spent a total of some 64 million dollars for the fiscal year. Of this amount, about 52 million was for regular operations in soil conservation districts. About seven million was used for flood control work. About one and a half million was for research.

Department of Agricultural Economists predict that we will need more than 133 billion pounds of milk a year by 1960, and that by 1975 the demand will go up to more than 150 billion pounds of milk. Reason for the coming increase in demand s the coming increase in populaion which is expected to reach 190 million people by 1975.

The increase in milk production will have to come from two sources, some increase in number of ows and some increase in production per cow. This means we must have more improved hay and pasture lands, and better management of our forage crops, the MSC gricultural economist said.
