Many leaders and friends of 4-H are donating their time to make this event a success. The true spirit of the 4-H program is exemplified by these voluntary gestures.

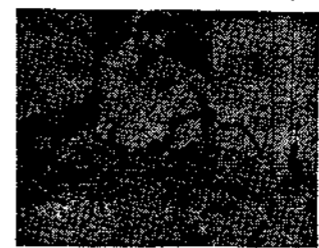

## Develop Effective Sheep Treatment

An effective treatment for lambing paralysis or pregnancy disease of ewes has been developed at Michigan State College.

Affected ewes should be drenched with a cup of cane molasses twice daily, according to Graydon Blank, MSC extension animal husbandman. He said that diluting the molasses with warm water makes it easier to give in cold weather. In severe cases sugar solutions can be injected into the blood stream by a veterinarian to hasten recovery. Giving the ewes choice feeds also will hasten recovery.

Blank said that this is the season of the year when flock owners expect the disease to show up among their ewes. It occurs most frequently with old ewes and ewes carrying twin lambs. It may occur in either fat or thin ewes. In early stages of the disease the ewes are less active than the rest of the flock and walk very slowly. Later, they become weaker, show stiffness and have difficulty in getting up and down. An affected ewe frequently will walk in a circle and stand with her head against an object.

As the trouble progresses the ewe cannot rise and lies with her head turned to one side. Other symptoms are rapid breathing, blindness and grinding of the teeth.

The trouble may be due to an insufficient amount of feed, a poor quality roughage or failure to in-

crease the quality and quantity of the ration as the gestation period progresses. Feeding badly-weathered hay and forcing the flock to consume all roughage offered them are frequent causes of the trouble.

Prevention lies in checking the flock closely. Sort out the ewes that are losing weight and feed them more liberally.

## New Spraying Book Now Available

A new 1952 supplement to the spraying calendar is now available for commercial growers of trees and small fruits, Alfred P. Ballweg, county agricultural agent, announced today.

The new extension bulletin 154 (supplement) is titled, "Spraying Calendar." It includes recommendations and suggested schedules that have been brought up-to-date. It is aimed for use with the 1951 spraying calendar. Because of the expanding small-fruit industry in Michigan, suggested spraying schedules for blueberry, currant, gooseberry, blackberry, dewberry, raspberry and strawberry are included.

Ballweg emphasized that the schedules suggested are merely guides. Each grower should use them to set up his own seasonal spraying schedules, based on his own specific insect and disease problems. This is necessary because pest problems vary from one fruit-growing area to another within the state, and from one

An acre and a quarter of well-managed, well-fertilized pasture will provide good "board and room" for a dairy cow during the summer grazing season and keep that cow sleek and well-fed with high-protein grass silage through the winter, J. L. Haynes, agronomist at Ohio Experiment Station, says. To build high yielding pasture, he recommends seeding a legume grass mixture and adding plant nutrients to the soil.

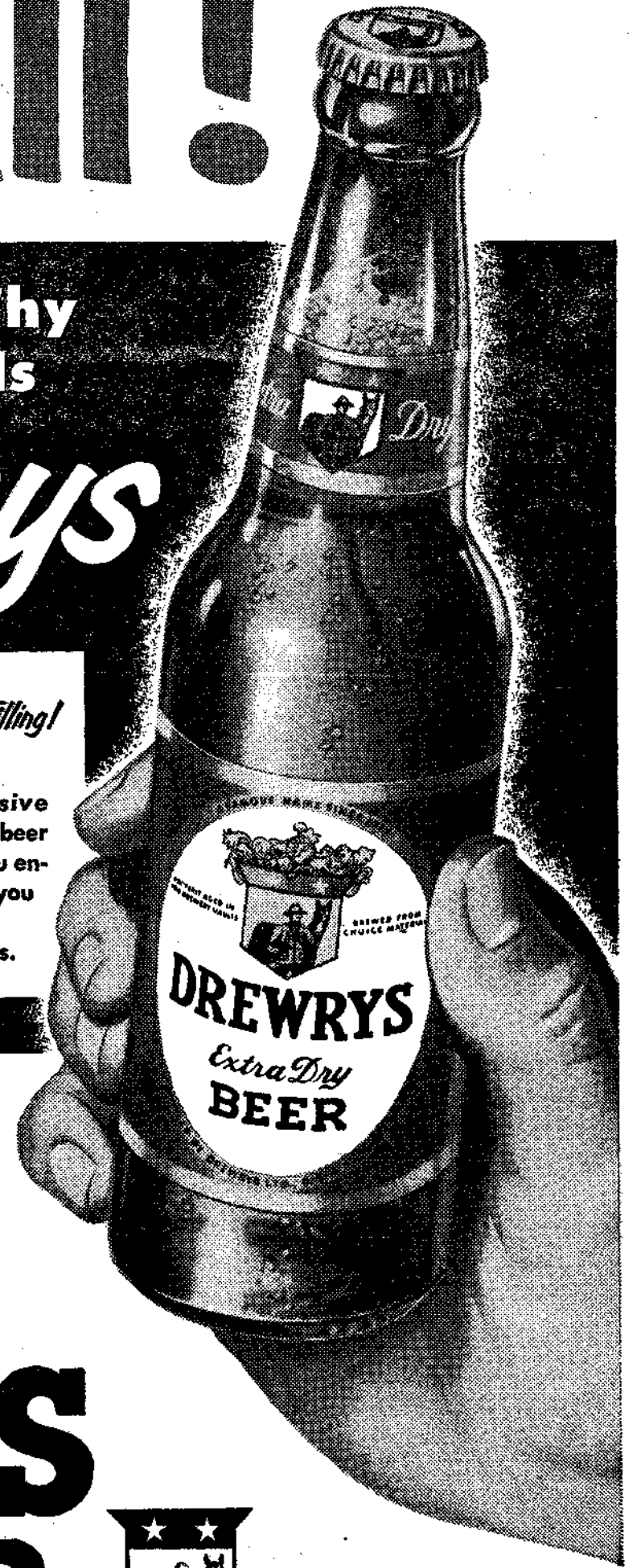

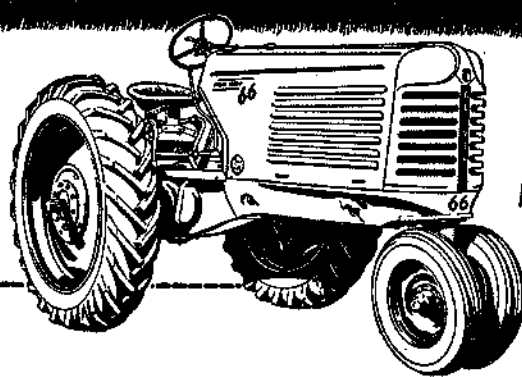

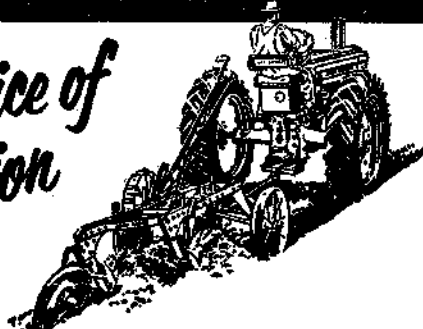

**One-hundred Farmers Have Soil Tested**

Two hundred and fifty-nine soil samples were checked for 100 farmers during the first year of operation of the Tuscola County soil testing laboratory, says Alfred P. Ballweg, county agricultural agent. Of the 259 samples checked, 15 showed a need for lime or had a pH reaction below 6.0. Any Tuscola County farmer may have a soil sample tested by taking the sample to the office of the County Farm Bureau located next to the Caro Farmers Co-op. Elevator Company.

Soil testing does not give all of the answers but it helps. Farmers are urged to have soil tests made of each field at least once during a crop rotation. Cooperating in making the soil testing lab possible were Tuscola County Farm Bureau; Tuscola Soil Conservation District; Farm Produce Company, Cass City; Caro Sugar Beet Growers Association; and Caro plant of Michigan Sugar Company.

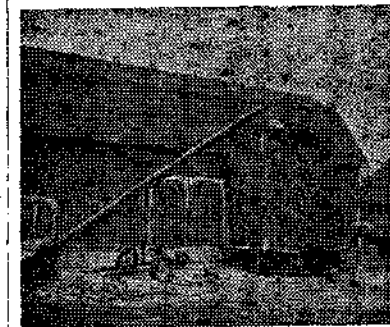

**Farm Welder Becomes Standard Equipment**  
**Quick Repairs Reduce Loss of Time and Profit**

The welder is fast becoming standard farm equipment. It answers the farmers prayers for quick repair jobs that would otherwise mean a great loss of time and profit. It is also being used to make equipment that means greater production.

As an example, one corn belt farmer used his welder to construct the inclined plane, portable elevator shown in the above picture. The conveyor, which has a large hopper at the ground end, is operated by a 1/4 horsepower electric motor.

In order to provide electric service for cribs which might be located at some distance from the barn, the farmer built a portable reel on which he wound about 100



feet of cable. This gives him an "extension cord" of the proper strength to carry the current needed from a 230-volt outlet in the barn.

On the work side of production, he discovered that little more labor was needed to increase his yield. Figuring this out on a dollar and cents basis, labor costs, on a 40 bushel yield, are about 25 cents a bushel, whereas on 100-bushel yields the cost is just 10 cents per bushel—the selling price having taken care of the differential in labor rates.

Many a farm welding outfit has paid for itself during harvest time when quick repairs were made to machinery.

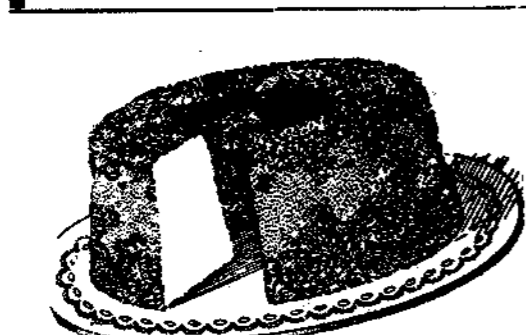

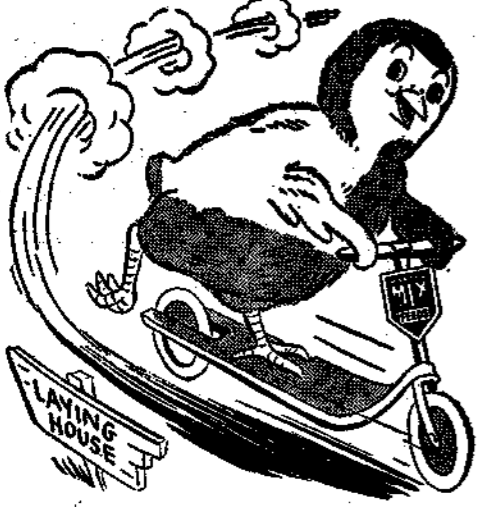

### Once-Over Tillage Cuts Labor Needs

A once-over tillage technique that eliminates much labor from the job of seedbed preparation and cuts costs is now being advocated by Dr. R. L. Cook, soils scientist of the Michigan Agricultural Experiment Station.

Coupled with the benefits from labor savings is the advantage of improved soil structure from once-over tillage. For some time, soil scientists have known that too much tillage packs the soil and prevents water from penetrating to plant roots.

Tests at Michigan State College have shown that crop yields from once-over tillage are just as high as those from other methods of tillage. In many instances they are higher.

The principles of once-over tillage are simple, Dr. Cook says. Frequently, tillage operations are not eliminated, but merely combined. More equipment is added behind the tractor, resulting in less trips over the field.

Dr. Cook cites tests conducted in various locations with several crops which bear out the value of once-over tillage. Oats planted by plowing, disking, and harrowing twice (four operations) gave a yield of 76.6 bushels. Once-over tillage consisting of plowing followed by a plow press drill (one operation) gave an oats yield of 77.5 bushels per acre.

Corn planted after five operations, consisting of a plow with sub-bases, disk, and twice over with a harrow, gave 54.3 bushels to the acre. Once-over operation with a plow and attached culti-mulcher gave the same yield of

54.3 bushels of corn per acre. In all cases, the once-over operations resulted in fewer trips and consequently maintained soil structures.

In these times of high costs, money savings are another important advantage of once-over tillage. At current rates for custom work, the conventional method of tillage could cost \$4.00 an acre for plowing; \$1.50 for disking once; \$1.50 for dragging once; and \$1.50 for drilling, a total of \$8.50 per acre for getting a crop into the ground.

A typical once-over tillage operation would cost \$4.00 for plowing and combined tillage operations and \$1.50 for drilling, a total of \$5.50. This represents a saving of \$3.00 an acre over conventional tillage methods.

Charles Bruffy of the M. S. C. soil science department has worked out a once-over tillage apparatus that can be adapted by any farmer with average mechanical ability. The device includes a spike tooth drag, mechanical lift, sweeps and seed delivery, and other features.

Plans for the once-over tillage equipment may be secured from Agricultural Engineering Department, Michigan State College, East Lansing. A charge of 15 cents is made for the plans to cover cost of preparation.

### Figures Indicate Better Dairying

Future of dairying for Michigan farmers is looking better, according to Art Mauch, extension agricultural economist at Michigan State College. He adds that this is no time to get out of the dairy business.

Mauch explained that average prices received for milk and butterfat by farmers in the United States went up 17 per cent during 1951, more than the increases in beef cattle or all farm products lumped together. However, that doesn't mean that dairy farmers are better off than other farmers. It simply means that they aren't as far behind as they were last year.

Making the picture brighter for dairy farmers is the fact that population is going up faster than milk production. In 1942 farmers in the country produced 119 billion pounds of milk, the same amount expected for 1952. But there are 20 million more people to use it.

Looking at the longer range picture the situation looks bright too. Mauch said that U. S. Department of Agricultural Economists predict that we will need more than 133 billion pounds of milk a year by 1960, and that by 1975 the demand will go up to more than 150 billion pounds of milk. Reason for the coming increase in demand is the coming increase in population which is expected to reach 190 million people by 1975.

The increase in milk production will have to come from two sources, some increase in number of cows and some increase in production per cow. This means we must have more improved hay and pasture lands, and better management of our forage crops, the MSC agricultural economist said.

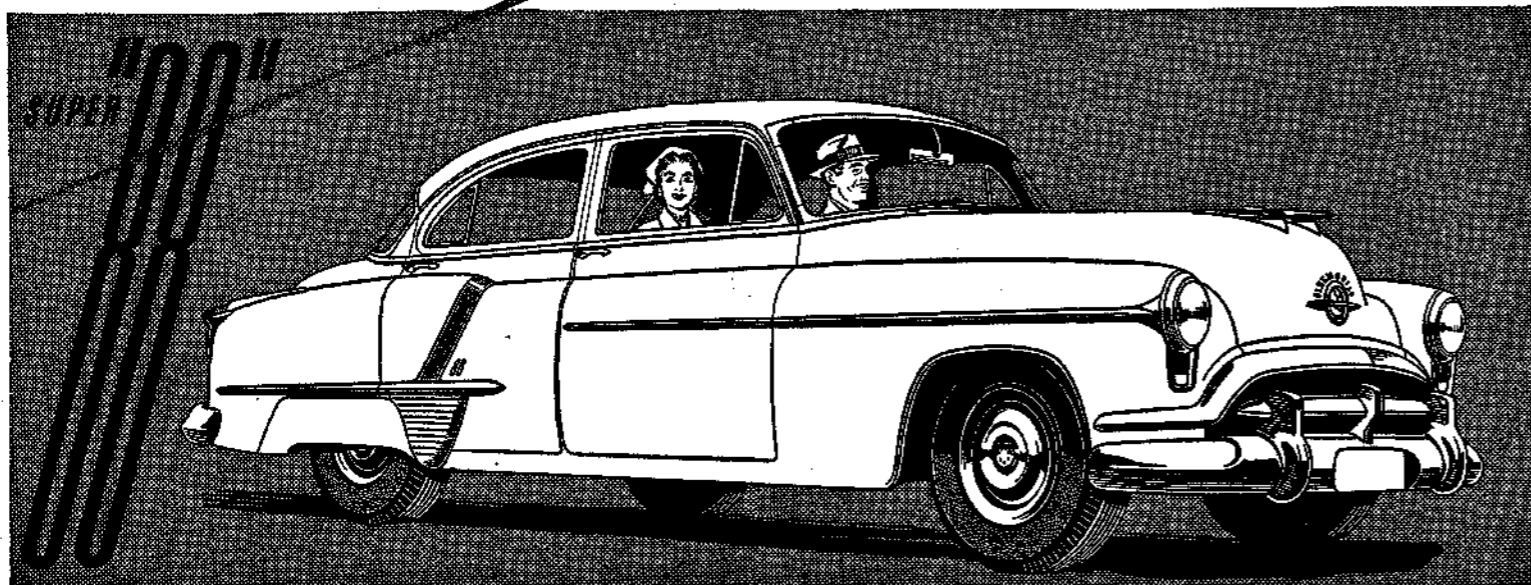
