

## Hawks Lose First Game to Mt. Pleasant Tuesday, 78-62

The Cass City Red Hawks lost their first cage contest of the season Tuesday night when a fast breaking, close checking Mt. Pleasant five defeated them, 78-62, on the huge Mt. Pleasant court.

A big third quarter spelled doom for the Cass City cagers. They trailed by just four points at the intermission, but the big bulge Mt. Pleasant racked up after the half proved to be too much for the Hawks to overcome.

What sent Cass City to defeat, in the final analysis, was the tremendous shooting percentage of the Mt. Pleasant team. They clicked for an unusual 40 per cent of their shots—many of them from far outcourt.

Despite the fact that they were defeated, Tim Burdon kept rolling along in his individual scoring derby. Tuesday he racked up 30 points to capture scoring honors for both teams.

The second team lost to the Mt. Pleasant reserves by a decisive score, 66-36.

The Hawks will remain idle until Jan. 9 when they re-enter league competition with a game scheduled at Caro.

### Deadline Nears for Crops' Price Support

Tuscola County farmers were reminded today by Chas. B. Eckfeld, chairman of the Tuscola County PMA Committee, that the deadline for obtaining price support on wheat, oats, barley, beans, clover and alfalfa seed is January 30.

Warehouse loans and purchase agreements may be signed on January 30. However, applications for farm-stored loans must be made 10 days prior to January 30 to allow sufficient time to secure samples for submission to the laboratory and receive the report from there. All farm-stored loan documents must be signed and recorded by January 30, 1953.

### Curfew Ordinance Goes into Effect Here Next Week

The new curfew ordinance, discussed in the November meeting of the Cass City Village Council, was passed Tuesday evening by councilmen and will become a law after it is published next week.

The law was adopted from an old village ordinance that had become obsolete. The new ordinance provides a \$25 fine for persons under 15 who are on the streets between 10 p. m. and 6 a. m.

It also holds the parents responsible for the actions of their children. The ordinance has a clause that leaves the way open for children to be on the street after 10 p. m. if they are in pursuit of any "lawful" employment.

According to Village Attorney Albin J. Stevens, this clause will allow the children on the streets to go to school parties, shows, skating, etc. and will not hinder any minor from going on errands at the request of parents.

However, the new law will make it possible for the local police department to crack down on loitering and other behavior patterns that cause disturbances in the village.

Funeral services for Robert F. Horner, 80, long-time resident of the Deford vicinity, were held Saturday at 2 p. m. in the Novesta Church of Christ. Rev. Horace Freeman of Port Huron, former Deford Methodist pastor, officiated and burial was in Novesta Cemetery.

Mr. Horner died Dec. 24 at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Paul Wethers, in Kenmore, N. Y.

## Jim Ware Elected Chief of The Order of the Arrow

Jim Ware, local Eagle Scout, was elected Chief of the Order of the Arrow at the annual business meeting at Cass City High School Saturday evening. The order is the honor society of scout campers, with about 45,000 members nationally and 168 in the five counties of the Valley Trails Council. Ware is the second Chief from Cass City; Robert Foy was elected in 1945.

Jim, the second son of Mr. and Mrs. Leo Ware, is a senior in the high school and has been a scout for five years. He attended the 1950 Jamboree at Valley Forge and was on the staff at Camp Rotary in 1951. He has served as Medicine Man on the Arrow ceremonial teams, often at Rotary and twice at the 1952 state meeting at Flint.

The Valley Trails group will be host to the 1953 Michigan State Conclave of the Order May 15-17 at Camp Rotary. Ware, as lodge Chief, will be in charge of the two-day conference of about 180 men and boys from most of the state's scout councils.

Emil Sieggreen of Saginaw was elected Deputy Chief, Max Berry of Caro was chosen treasurer and Claude W. Lemmer of Saginaw was returned for his third year as Scribe.

The election was conducted by Kendell Poulson of Saginaw, field

scout executive and lodge advisor. The new officers were installed by a group of Vigil Honor members, Harold Oatley of Cass City, Andrew W. Forbes and William C. Morgan, Scout Executive, of Saginaw.

The election of Kies Hagadorn of Alma, retiring Chief, to receive the Vigil, highest honor in the Order, was announced by Forbes, chairman of the lodge Vigil committee.

The meeting adopted a definition of the activity requirement for Brotherhood Honor proposed by Dick Wallace of Cass City, chairman of the Brotherhood Committee. Wallace was in charge of the opening and closing ceremonies for the annual dinner, assisted by William L. Mason of St. Louis, Ware and Berry.

The program was planned by Robert F. Kruske of Saginaw, with Kies Hagadorn, completing two terms as Chief, as the presiding officer.

Tracy C. Young of Auburn, Indiana, came the greatest distance to attend. He is the only active charter member, inducted in 1937, and was accompanied to the meeting by Jim Miller of Saginaw, his grandson, and also a member. There are several father and son pairs in the lodge, but only one grandson and grandfather.

### Local Police to Curb Illegal Parking

William Schram of the Cass City Police Department says that persons who have been receiving courtesy tickets recently for illegal parking would do well to heed the warnings.

For, beginning shortly, tickets will be issued to violators in an effort to secure better traffic control in the village.

Patrolman Schram was recently added to the Cass City police force and one of the reasons he was hired by the village trustees was to tighten traffic control during the day.

In the Tuesday night session of the council, trustees pointed out that all types of violations were to be rigidly prosecuted, starting with the first of the year.

In reviewing the problem, they said, of the outstanding violations, in addition to parking, were failing to stop when emerging from alleys, ignoring stop signs and excessive speed.

## State Okays Main Street Agreement With Cass City

Much of the maintenance work now being done on Main Street by the village street department will be paid for by the state. An agreement will be signed with the state within a few days that will give Cass City a maximum return of around \$2200 for six months for maintaining a strip of M-81, 46 feet wide, within the village limits.

The state will pay 78.2 per cent of the cost of the work to the village. Authoritative estimates indicate that the village is now doing over half of the work that is prescribed by the agreement.

All work connected with the strip, including patching, lining, cutting grass and repairing shoulders will be the responsibility of the village.

The facilities of the village to do the work was examined and approved recently by representatives of the state highway department. Although the agreement is not yet signed, it is in effect at the present time and the contract between the village and the state will cover work now being done.

### Walter Winter Wins Locker of Beef

Walter Winter, Tyre, won the first prize, a locker of beef, in the annual Christmas drawing at the Cass Frozen Food Locker held Christmas Eve.

Second prize was annexed by Iva Profit, who received \$15 in groceries. Other winners were: Mrs. Tony Steppa, Tyre, a turkey; Milt Hoffman, ham, and Mrs. George Steadman, two ducks.

The trustees of the village of Cass City set the 1953 budget for nearly the same amount as the estimated expenses for 1952. This year the budget calls for an expenditure of \$70,800.00, of which \$8,000 was left from unexpended funds of 1952. In 1952, the village spent approximately \$69,855.57.

As usual, appropriation for some departments have been decreased and for other branches of the village government, increased.

One of the big items of the budget this year is \$10,000.00 set aside for the resurfacing of Main Street. Five thousand dollars of the money was set aside in 1952 and \$5,000 more has been allotted for the project this year.

Increases in the budget can be noted in the police department which added another man; in the allotment for sidewalk construction which jumped an estimated \$2,500.00 to \$3,000.00 this year and in the salaries of village employees which reflects the higher wages currently demanded by all employees.

Money allotted for street improvements, sewers, pool and miscellaneous expenses has been sharply reduced. In 1952, the village completed one of the most extensive street repair and sewer building projects ever attempted in the village.

## Former Cass Cityite Dies in Montana

Funeral services for Morley C. Wickware, 75, former resident here, were held Saturday at 2 p. m. in Little's Funeral Home. Rev. M. R. Vender officiated and burial was in Elkland Cemetery. Services were also held in the Methodist Church in Vallier, Montana, of which he was a member.

Mr. Wickware died Dec. 20 in Deaconess Hospital in Great Falls, Montana, after a long illness including a catarrh operation.

Mr. Wickware was a life member of Acme Masonic Lodge of Gagetown and of Echo Chapter No. 837, O. E. S., here.

Son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Albert Wickware, he was born Aug. 22, 1877, at Wickware. He was a cashier in the Gagetown Bank and in the Auten Bank here, leaving in 1911 for Bison, South Dakota. He later went to Vallier, Montana, and left there in 1941 to live in Conrad, Montana. He was a former senator from Montana and was serving his fourth term as county clerk and recorder in Conrad. He was married to Margaret Miller of Cass City who died in 1939.

Feb. 15: Dairies announce penny a quart milk price boost. Only eight persons attend village caucus to nominate election slate. Local delegates from the Cass City Chamber of Commerce appear at State Public Service Commission to protest increase in rates.

### Explain New MSC Income Tax Book

Have you seen the new Michigan State College farm income tax record book? It undoubtedly will soon become one of the most popular account books ever used by Michigan farmers according to Albert T. Hall. It has the approval of farmers, county agents, farm management specialists, Michigan bankers and other credit agencies. It has been carefully reviewed by the Detroit office of Internal Revenue.

Thousands of farmers in the state who are not now keeping a good farm record have been asking for just such a book. This record book is not intended to replace the blue college account book or any other good book already in wide use and which will continue to be used and distributed. It is, however, designed to encourage other farmers to keep accounts.

#### What's Different About It?

1. New—available for distribution for the first time here in 1953.

2. Easy to keep—no instructions necessary.

3. Designed primarily to help the farmer fill out his income tax report.

4. The summary page in the book is the Income Tax Form 1040F. No changes need be made to file that income tax report directly from this book.

5. A special income column is included to provide for sale of livestock and equipment which can go into Schedule E income tax form. If the taxpayer can use this form, it oftentimes means considerable savings.

In addition to helping on income tax, the new book also has pages to handle the following—net worth statement, crop summary, map of the farm and business analysis.

It is available from the county agricultural agent's office in the post office in Sandusky for 20 cents per copy. The Crosswell bank also has a small supply for distribution to their customers.

### First Chickens Were Descended From Jungle Bird

It is believed that the first chickens arrived in America in the ships of the old China trade and were descended from Gallus Bankiva, the jungle bird of the East that became mankind's first domesticated egg layer. The industry's products are now valued at more than four billion dollars annually.

Other birds came from Europe in the days when chickens were kept aboard ship as a source of fresh meat and were valuable stock-in-trade for the souvenirs coveted by curious sailors. Descendants of these sea-faring birds are still identified by their ancestral origin—Shanghais, Cochins and Langshans from China; Leghorns from Italy; Minorcas from Spain, and the Hamburg, a Dutch chicken raised extensively in Britain.

Colonial wives, who wanted good layers, swapped roosters among these alien flocks and developed breeds like the "Dominicker," a hardy pioneer chicken that passed on its barred markings to today's Barred, and Plymouth Rocks. Local preferences for color and other characteristics gave rise to such breeds as the New Hampshire and the Rhode Island Red.

The American Poultry Historical society is making plans to set up a museum which will contain exhibits and information on early chickens.

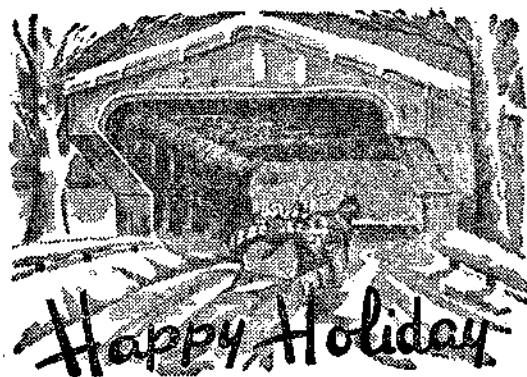

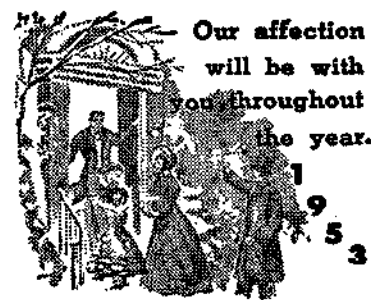

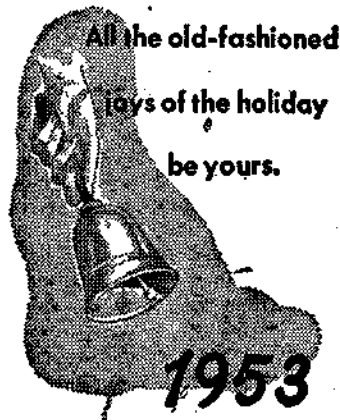

Farmers' Tax Advice

Farmers may treat some live-stock sales as capital asset sales—and pay 1952 income tax on only 50 per cent of their net gains, reminds Everett M. Elwood, Michigan State College agricultural economist. The farmer must have owned the animal 12 months or more; the animals must have been held for draft, breeding or dairy purposes. County agricultural agents can supply farmers with the MSC bulletin, "Farmers 1952 Income Tax."

Cull Flocks Now to Cut Bill for Feeding

Cull your laying flock now, urges J. M. Moore, extension poultry specialist at Michigan State College.

There are two seasons of egg production, he explains; the season of scarce eggs at higher prices is passing and the season of more eggs at lower prices is starting. Your flock must be efficient to be profitable.

If a layer produces two eggs a week, it is doubtful if she pays for her board. If she is laying four eggs a week, she should give a profit.

No time should be wasted over birds that are not laying, stresses the MSC poultryman. Send them to market right away. Look for the hens with the small combs and wattles and the small snake-like heads. The place for these birds is in the stew pot for the low-priced egg season.

By culling out low-producing hens, you cut your feed bill without cutting egg production. The good producers that are left will increase in efficiency.

This low-priced season lasts for six months, cautions Moore; it's time to act on the culling job now. It's one New Year's resolution that will pay.

# MICHIGAN MIRROR NEWS BRIEFS

Gov. G. Mennen Williams would have been a mighty fine Santa Claus this year, but the Michigan senate stole his thunder in a move involving a possible split in G.O.P. ranks as well as "politics as usual."

The governor had dropped very fine appointments in the stockings of John J. Kozarek and Charles R. A. Smith. Kozarek, Hamtramck Democrat, had been reappointed to the liquor control commission. Smith, Detroit Negro attorney, had been named to the workmen's compensation commission. Neither appointment had been approved by the senate.

And so when the lawmakers came back Dec. 18, to authorize more borrowing power for the state's schools, they turned both men out in the cold, throwing a wet blanket on any hot rumors that the olive branch would fly over the capitol.

Williams has assumed his third term as governor apparently determined to cooperate with Republicans as far as humanly possible. The governor's career timetable long has been a question, but it most certainly includes a crack at Ferguson's senate seat in 1954.

It follows that Williams will lean over backwards to promote harmony between his office and the legislature to set his house in order in Michigan before taking go at the senate. Just before the special session he made it official when he asked the C. I. O.-P. A. C. to keep its criticism constructive.

But the Republicans apparently are not about to accept the sprig of olive the Democrats are offering. Says one, just after the governor's latest appointments had been turned down: "This is one way we can hurt Williams." This may sound a bit shortsighted, but the Republicans don't want

Williams in Washington any more than they wanted him to be governor.

However, the vote on Kozarek verified what capitol observers have suspected for some time—there is strife in the senate G. O. P. ranks. Republicans hold a 25 to 7 majority in the upper chamber. But the vote to confirm Kozarek was 14 to 14. Some place along the line seven Republicans jumped the political fence.

Cause: The younger Republicans have been trying to take over the senate reins. Under the lead of Senators Creighton Coleman (Marshall) and Carlton Morris (Kalamazoo), the "young Turks" have been edging out some of the old-timers. And the oldsters don't take too kindly to this treatment.

Wise in the ways of political maneuvering the older heads are sure to come up with something to counteract the so-called coup of the youngsters.

In the hassle over senate control. Governor Williams may be able to sneak through some of his appointments and perhaps a bit of legislation.

He isn't counting on it. From here it looks as though the old battle is still on.

Michigan Schools, now in the greatest expansion period in history, can expect a 37 per cent increase in enrollment in the next five years. Dr. John F. Thaden, MSC sociologist, predicts a 1956 registration of 1,465,000 pupils as compared to 1,067,000 in the spring of 1951. The increase will require 13,000 more classrooms and an equal number of additional teachers, he warns.

Lieut.-Gov. William C. Vandenberg is still bitter over his defeat for the gubernatorial nomination in the August primaries. The Holland man, who conducted his campaign through the dry interests and from the pulpits of the state, says: "Government has nothing I want—nor does the Republican party."

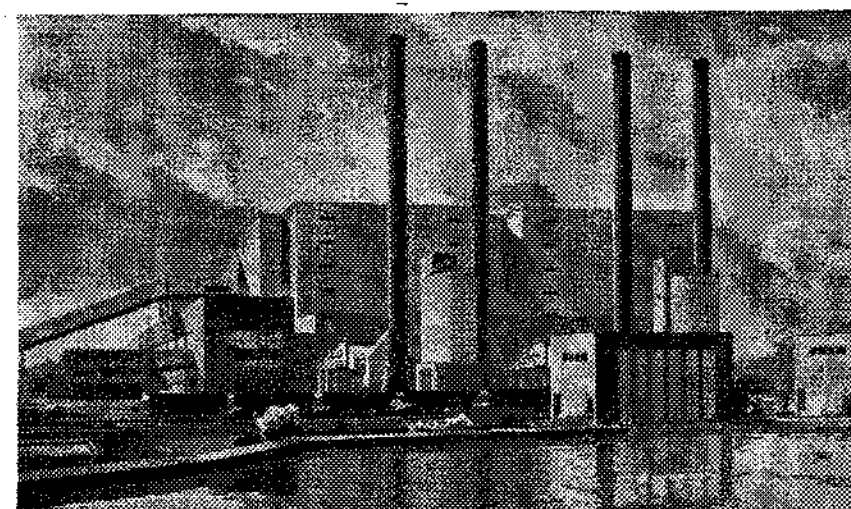

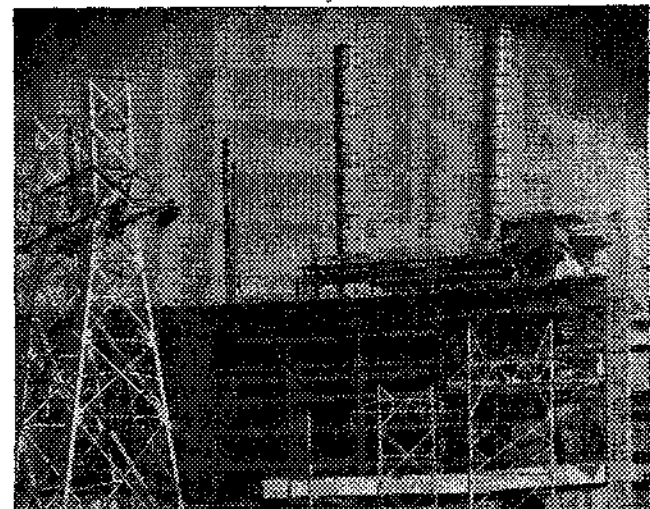
