The patient, Mike Lusic, 68, Sandusky, slashed Mr. Stevens' arm and cut an artery and bit deeply into the biceps muscle. He was treated by Dr. H. T. Donahue at Pleasant Home Hospital.

Mr. Stevens went to the aged patient's room after other patients reported that he had threatened to commit suicide. He found the patient standing with a straight razor in his hands. Lusic struck while Mr. Stevens was try-


ing to talk to soothe him. Lusic was taken to the Sandusky jail from where he was committed to the state hospital at Lapeer.

Farmers not only pay their share of taxes but also shell out millions of dollars each year in tribute money to three "robbers" -livestock diseases, parasites, and carelessness, the American Veterinary Medical association claims.

A recent report from that organization said that annual losses from iust two dairy diseases, brucellosis and mastitis, run close to 200 million dollars a year, not to mention losses from the host of other livestock diseases.

In terms of numbers, 24 per cent of all dairy calves born never live to reach maturity. Of those that do

parasites. Finally, a heavy loss is said to be caused by injuries and deaths resulting from careless loading and hauling of livestock to market. Such losses point to the need for greater disease control consciousness on the part of the livestock industry and renewed efforts by farmers to stop this drain on their resources.

ORDINANCE NO. 49

An Ordinance For The Protection of Children and the Duties of Parents and Guardians Thereof.

The Village of Cass City Ordains:
Section 1, It shall not be lawful for any child under the age of sixteen years to be upon any public street, alley or place of the Village of Cass City and out from under the immediate care and control of his or her parents or guardian, or some adult delegated by the parent or guardian to accompany such child between the hours of ten o'clock p. m. and six o'clock a. m.

hours of ten o'clock p. m. and six o'clock a. m.

Section 2. The provisions of this ordinance shall in no wise be construed to apply to children who may be upon any public street in the pursuance of any lawful employment with which he or she may be connected, nor shall it apply to children who may have been sent upon a public street or streets in pursuance of any labor or errand by his or her parents or guardian, nor shall it apply to children who may be going to or returning from any lawful gathering or place of worship: Provided said children shall not play or loiter upon the street.

Section 3. The parent or guardian of the child shall be held responsible for the enforcement of Section 1 and 2 of this ordinance.

Section 4. Any parent or guardian found guilty of violating any provisions of this

ordinance.
Section 4. Any parent or guardian found guilty of violating any provisions of this ordinance shall be fined a sum not exceeding twenty five dollars or be imprisoned in the county jail not exceeding ten days or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court.
