Democrats, who have plugged for years to enact a corporate profits tax of some sort, have adopted a "show me a better way" attitude. Representative Walter H. Nill has intended for some time to introduce at this session, a tax on corporation profits.

Republicans, since the legislature's opening day, have sought a solution to the state's \$90,000,000 deficit and a means of raising an additional \$35,000,000 each year to offset future deficits. They hope to pass a tax that directly affects a large number of people so that
