and Memorial Day holidays falling this year on Saturday with the resultant forced change in work schedules, businessmen and employees are again discussing a change in certain holiday dates.

The plan to move certain vacation days so that they automatically come on Mondays is not new -at this time 32 state legislatures are considering the plan.

Basically, the plan would make six national holidays fall on Monday in place of dates arbitrarily set long ago, with little regard to sentimental or historical fact. The six holidays under consider-

ation for change are: 1. Presidents' Day, third Monday

in February, combining the dates now observed for the birthdays of Washington, Jefferson and Lin-2. Memorial Day, last Monday in

May, removing controversy be-tween North and South over separate dates now observed. 3. Independence Day, first Mon-

day in July. 4. Veterans' Day, first Monday in August, combining V-J, V-E and Armistice Days. (Labor Day would not be eliminated.)

5. Columbus Day, second Monday in October. 6. Thanksgiving Day, fourth To be Issued Monday in November.

The change would not affect Christmas, New Year's and Easter. Personally, we believe that the plan has much merit-especially for Michigan which is within three-day driving range for more people than almost any other region in the United States.

Besides bringing more tourist money into the state, the plan would guarantee employees their vacations following a week end and enable businessmen to avoid interrupted work schedules by midweek or Saturday holidays.







The establishment of a small present program provides for projects in corn, beans and sugar beets; added to this now are projects in wheat, oats, barley, rye and soybeans. Many 4-H crops members in Tuscola County have been following this work for some time but it was made official statewide by a recommendation at the 4-H club agents' conference last May and approval by the State 4-H Council.

Requirements for small grain work are recommending certified seed; a minimum of one acre be grown but that members work on a field as a unit with their parents on a share basis; that varieties be those recommended for area; that it be carried on as a possible feed grain project for ivestock work; and that the exhibit be one peck of grain. Crops club members have two opportunities to exhibit their grain, one at the County Fair and the other at the 4-H grain show in the fall.

Poultry Pasture Will Save on Feed Costs

Poultrymen might try a "gypsy" life on chickens with successrolling shelters and brooder houses suggests Alfred P. Ballweg, county agricultural agent.

Chickens are not good foragers, or more of his feed bill. Ballweg passes along some tips from J. M. (Mac) Moore, extension poultry specialist at Michigan State Col-

Succulent range means green grass three or four inches high, with the coarse growth trimmed away, and the range should be on clean ground, where chickens haven't roamed for two years.

Chicken raisers could take some tips from some turkey growers, who move their brooder houses around. Chickens with enough feed don't like to travel more than 100 feet but they will if the houses are moved.

Ladino and ladino-alfalfa mixture make good chicken pasture. The alfalfa will be green in August when you want some short green feed. They even like quackgrass, and they will "eat it until they kill it out," in case you want some help on that.

One hundred chickens will handle a half acre of pasture very well in dry weather, but when it's growing stronger, you may need some help from cows in keeping it down. Chickens and hogs should not graze the same areas, however.

Some poultrymen find it pays to irrigate one small pasture while the poultry graze on another-and then alternate. Shelters will kill grass if left in one place for two weeks; for one week, it's OK.
