Pfc. Gerald L. Hartwick, 21, of Cass City was killed Wednesday, April 29, while on active duty with the armed forces in Korea. Notifi-cation of his death came to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ed E. Hartwick, late Monday evening.

According to the wire, the young soldier died while on duty at an outpost on Triangle Hill. Cause of the death was said to be carbon monoxide poisoning.

Gerald was attached to the seventh infantry division while in Korea. He entered the army April 1, 1952, and left the United States in November, arriving in Korea sometime in December.

On the day he died, he wrote a letter to his parents saying the reason he hadn't written more often was that he was so tired after coming in from patrol duty that he immediately went to sleep.

Besides his parents, surviving are: seven brothers, Arlan, Law-rence, Leland, Leslie and Robert, all of Cass City; Charles, in the air force, and Paul, and two sisters, Mrs. Stanley Mellendorf of Owendale and Mrs. J. Crane of Cass City.







His bill, he says, will make Michigan's tax spread more like the national average and will leave more money in the hands of consumers. This, he continues, is good for manufacturers because they can sell more products.
