The new tax, according to many authorities on the measure, is supposed to be a fairly good tax. One of its drawbacks is that it is quite complicated-many ordinary businessmen will need assistance to figure out what they owe the state.

Regardless of its relative merits, tax experts who have studied the state tax structure all maintain that the entire tax laws of the state should be overhauled so that tax money could be spent The present where needed. whopping deficit in the general fund of Michigan is due, in a large part, to obligated funds-a condition that will not be permanently cured by adding new taxes.

This whole procedure has been without precedent in the history of this state.

The bill was drafted by automobile manufacturers engaged in interstate business. It was rushed through the legislature in a matter of days.
