15, 1858, in Oakland County, the eldest of eight children. She moved to Tuscola County in 1870 with her family. She has spent much of her life working in the schools in Tus-



#### Retiring \$10,000 of \$13,000 Water Debt.

## Village to Pay Part of Debt

The village council took steps Tuesday evening in their regular meeting at the Cass City Municipal Building to retire up to \$10,000 of the \$13,000 the municipality owes for work on the water system here.

The money has been accumulated over the past two years to use for the resurfacing of Main Street. Since it will be impossible to start the program

buy the bonds to save the two per cent interest they are now paying. The village cannot draw interest on their deposits as an indivi-

the bank for nearly two years. The money was not invested because it was believed that the road project, was to start this year.

M.B. Auten The money was not invested beproject was to start this year. However, the state is delaying the project until other work in the area will reduce the cost of the construction work.

For this reason the council decided to retire the water bonds. If the full \$10,000 worth of bonds are retired, it will leave \$3,000 outstanding of which another \$1,000 will be retired out of regular funds

Estimated cost for the resurfacing of Main Street will be \$15,000. In December of 1954, the village will have \$5,000 in cash from bonds that will mature then.

The State will allow the village three years to pay for the project. With the \$5,000 from the bonds, the council plans to set aside \$5,-000 in 1954 and 1955-paying off the resurfacing debt in two years if it is completed next year.

Be sure to feed the heifer the proper ration. Give her plenty of fresh water and turn her out at night for exercise.

It's not necessary to clip the entire body of the heifer if you have followed the right feeding and blanketing practices. You should, however, clip the tail, starting at the top of the switch to the tail head, and you should clip the long hair from the neck, shoulder and flank areas.

After the initial washing, brushing with a moderately soft brush each day will make the hair soft and keep it clean, as well as condition the skin. Apply mineral or olive oil a few days before the show.

When you're training the animal, first teach her to lead and stand. Pose her with her front feet on slightly higher ground where possible. Then face the animal with the lead rope in the left hand. Train her to stand with her legs straight under the four corners of her body, head up and back straight. Be sure to cut her long toes and round off her foot so she can stand level, but don't trim too close.

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

#### **High Profits Come** From Herd Average

"I have a cow in my herd with a 700-pound butterfat average. Where can I get the services of a bull which is good enough to transmit that much production ability to the cow's daughters?"

Alfred P. Ballweg, Tuscola County agricultural agent, reported this answer to a farmer's query from George Parsons, extension dairyman at Michigan State Col-

Parsons says that a bull that consistently has sired daughters which produce 500 pounds of butterfat is adequate to mate with the 700-pound butterfat producer. all of the cows in the farmer's Namera of Flint. herd are not of the 700-pound butterfat caliber. And it's likely, too, ability to transmit that much production to her daughters.

He believes a fair idea of her transmitting ability can be obtained by comparing the produc- Parker. tion records of her paternal half sisters on a 305-day record of milking twice daily. The daughter of the 700-pounder probably will be in the middle of the group on production ability.

It's always a good idea, says Parsons, to mate cows with the best bulls, but the outstanding record of one cow is not as important as a herd average. The herd average is the profit mark.







This desirable condition didn't just happen. It is the result of the combined efforts of many governmental agencies. An important member of this group is the State Department of Agriculture.

The department's main function is to see that some 120 state laws and 75 regulations are complied with by everyone concerned with supplying food to the public. Seven separate bureaus divide this work and function under administration of the départment's director, Charles Figy.

A wide range of activities are covered by these bureaus which include: laboratories, dairy and marketing enforcement. Other bureaus control the growth of plants and trees, animal diseases, care of buildings and grounds. Such matters as public relations, livestock sales, farm co-ordination and many others are handled by the Bureau of Agricultural Indus-

Much work is done "in the field." About 425 people make up the staff of the department. Of these, only 80 remain in Lansing offices to do office and laboratory work. The balance are inspectors, checking various phases of food production throughout the state.

About 125 are inspectors who are employed on a temporary basis. They make up a rotating group of specialists who work with specific crops. When their work is through, they move to other areas and are replaced by experts in a new field demanding attention. Rotation of this type of inspector is co-ordinated by the federal government in cooperation with several other states.

Lives and money have been saved by some dramatic experiments of the department. Dreaded anthrax, a disease suddenly fatal to cows as well as humans, was reported in the U.S. last year. 

#### Wheat Farmers To Have Allotments

Wheat farmers will have acreage allotments for 1954 whether they vote in marketing quotas or An unmasked bandit held up the not, point out Michigan State Colcashier and his assistant of the lege farm economists. The law re-Reese bank and escaped with \$1,- quires allotments except in "emergency" years.

When allotments only are in effect, farmers who overplant are not eligible for price support.

When marketing quotas are applied, farmers who overplant are penalized 50 per cent of the basic loan rate, or about \$1.10 per bushel, on the excess. Penalties can be avoided by storing grain under government rules, or delivering it to the government; until the crop is delivered or the penalty paid, a farmer's entire wheat crop is subject to a government lien.

If two-thirds of the nation's eligible farmers who vote approve quotas, 1954 allotted wheat will be supported at 90 per cent of parity. If the vote fails, the support will be 50 per cent of parity under





HOW TO PREVENT

CHOLERA LOSSES Hog cholera costs American swine producers at least 20,000,000 dollars a year, according to good authorities. Because the virus can be carried great distances in a great many different ways, it often strikes without warning. And once a hog or herd is infected, there is no cure.

Yet all this loss could be prevented if every hog raiser took advantage of a protective measure developed by veterinary scientists over 30 years ago.

This measure is vaccination by the double immunization method. The pig is inoculated simultaneously with both serum and virus. The resulting immunity from cholera usually tasts for the rest of the pig's life.

Authorities have pointed out a number of reasons why swine owners should have the vaccinating done by a veterinarian. It is important that the pigs be ev-amined, first, to see if they are in good enough health to receive the

vaccination without Also, because a deadly virus is used in this treatment, many other special precautions are necessary. Therefore these materials should be handled by a person who has the proper scientific skill and knowledge. And for a few weeks

after vaccination, further pre-cautions should be observed in the care and feeding of the pigs. Proper vaccination costs a small fraction of the cost of a single outbreak of deadly cholera. Ordinarily, the best time for vaccination is around wean-ing time. Pigs at that age are easy to handle, and require less serum to give them the desired protection.


