Nitrogen isn't something you can put where you want it and make it stay put until the plant is ready to use it, cautions Alfred P. Ballweg, county agricultural agent. Michigan State College research shows that putting on extra nitrogen at wheat-planting time is a "poor substitute" for applying

it in the spring, he adds. If a farmer expects spring trouble with applying the extra 20pounds-per-acre of nitrogen for wheat, then the best bet is to put it on after October 15 and before the winter freeze-up, advises James A. Porter, Michigan State College extension soil scientist. The extra nitrogen isn't needed if wheat gets a good winter topdressing with barnyard manure, he reminds.

Weak Seedings Need Extra Fertilizer Says County Agent

How's that new legume seeding coming? Maybe it needs a little help, suggests Alfred P. Ballweg, Tuscola County agricultural agent.

If a farmer has a good stand but the seedings look weak, it's a can be killed by frost in the spring. good bet he needs extra fertilizer, according to James A. Porter, extension soil scientist at Michigan State College.

If less than 300 pounds of commercial fertilizer were used at seeding time, the extra application should go on right away in many cases, he explains. That \

300" is a good indicator. If the land needs lime, the seeding will benefit even from some lime applied atop the seed ing, notes Porter, but it would have been much better earlier.



Plant Bulbs Now For Early Blooms

If you want early spring blossoms around your home, now is the time to plant bulbs.

Quentin R. Ostrander, assistant county agricultural agent for Tuscola County, says many bulbs and related root forms should be planted early in September for the best results and not later than October 15.

Michigan State College floriculturists, for example, report that the Madonna lily, a base rooting plant, must be planted early enough to develop a rosette of leaves before freezing weather comes. If the rosette isn't formed before frost, chances are the plant will not bloom next year. The floriculturists advise plant-

of September. Narcissus, snowflake, snowdrop, grape-hyacinth and Siberian squill do best if planted early because they form their root system while the soil is still warm. The development slows down when the soil gets cold. The MSC specialists believe it's better to plant tulip bulbs, however, after the soil becomes cool. If
