New Soil Lab Now Operating In Sanilac County

Cooperation between Sanilac County farmers, the Sanilac Extension office and the Sanilac Soil District has resulted in a brand new soil testing laboratory for the county.

The project, started last spring, was successful because of the donations of interested persons. Farmers in the county contributed \$241 and the Sanilac Soil District added \$165 towards the total cost of setting up the service in San-

Equipment for the laboratory cost \$498.97 and installation costs raised the total cost figure to

Directions for taking soil samples can be had at the Sanilac County agricultural agent's office in Sandusky, said Albert T. Hall, who was one of the persons responsible for the completion of

Testing will be done by William Colclough, a graduate of Michigan State College. Each sample will cost the farmer 50c.

Plans for the erection of the laboratory were started in the spring when farmers and others were asked to donate money for Cass City Students the erection of soil testing facili-

ties in Sandusky.







Adequate Corn Cribs **Profit Farmer**

This year is one of the times that a farmer will be at an advantage to build adequate storage for his corn, suggests Alfred P. Ball-

weg, county agricultural agent. He points out that the 13-cent government payment under the loan program for resealing willhelp defray part of the cost on some farms. And a new change in the tax law provides for depreciating a corn crib over five years instead of the customary 18 to 30 years.

Plans for building several types of corn cribs are available at County Agent Ballweg's office: (1) double crib with driveway, (2) single bin crib, and (3) storage of Earl Corn on the Farm, Farmers' Bulletin 2010. These plans also show how to rat-proof the crib. A catalog also is available to facilitate ordering of plans the farmer chooses from Michigan State College's agricultural engineering department.



The sad plight of nine high school athletes showed signs of improving after a meeting of Administration Code Committee of the State Legislature in Lansing. The nine boys were ruled ineligible by the Michigan High School Athletic Association by order of its executive committee. They were found guilty of accepting "gifts" or "prizes". But trifling values were involved. Circumstances showed that the boys did not understand acceptance would bar them from school competition as professionals. Articles were returned by boys unused.

Words of anger and disgust from parents, fans and state legislators were directed at the athletic association which made the stern ruling. Amazement was expressed that the school committee should deal so sharply and with such lack of understanding. Six of the boys from Hastings had accepted fish rods valued at \$2.41; two U. P. boys had received small prizes for winning a local golf tournament.

Plant Cover Crops To Check Erosion

Government allotments, cutting wheat acreage about 35 per cent this fall, will leave many acres unprotected and subject to severe soil erosion, cautions Alfred P. Ballweg, county agricultural agent. Rolling ground is especially liable to fall and spring erosion, he explains, if it is not protected with a

Land not going into wheat this fall because of the allotments should not be left bare to await a A free copy of a new history welfare cases than was claimed by spring crop, agrees Richard M. Swenson, soil scientist at Michigan

There are several crops that can protect soil from erosion and add needed organic matter to be plowed down in the spring, suggests Swenson. Wheat can be used as a cover or green manure crop if permission is obtained ahead of time from the local Production and Marketing Administration office.

Rye will make a good cover this fall but many farmers dislike rye because of the "volunteer" rye to be found in succeeding crops. Oats is a crop to appeal to many-even though oats freeze down during the winter, they will provide a protective cover. Rye grass also can be used. Success of a cover crop in preventing soil erosion depends on a good ground cover, notes the Michigan State College soils man.






