Bad Axe quarterback Oarie Lemanski proved to be a thorn in the side of the Hawks throughout the game. He intercepted three Cass City passes to stem potential touchdown drives.

One Hawk drive was stopped on the Bad Axe eight-yard line when a five-yard penalty for too much time set the Hawks back and enabled Bad Axe to take over on

Lemanski intercepted a pass on his own 35-yard line and the Hatchets moved to the Hawk 30 where the talented quarterback was broken into and a tool box faded back and threw a strike to End Jim Kervin who ran into the end zone.

Bad Axe struck for their second touchdown in the third quarter. Fullback Bob Case capped a long drive with an 11-yard scam-per after taking a handoff from Lemanski.

Cass City scored in the final period. Russ Foy, who sparkled for the Hawks, received a Bad Axe punt on his own 40 and returned to the Hatchet 39-yard line.

Oklahoma National Guard unit Have Agricultural Extension Program

The third township agricultural extension program in Michigan started Thursday, Oct. 1, in Denmark Township of Tuscola County.

Final arrangements were made at a meeting of the Denmark Township Agricultural Extension Association at Reese Wednesday, The organization is a non-profit group which was formed Sept, 24 to cooperate with Michigan State College in establishing the project.

Loren Black, Saginaw County agricultural agent, has been designated to head the project which will serve farmers in Denmark

Township exclusively.

The venture is being financed in part by a grant from the W. K. Kellogg Foundation of Battle Balance of the necessary funds is to come from Denmark Township farmers and businessmen. Purpose of the program is to make available to farmers more personalized assistance with production, marketing organization and other farm problems. A similar organization has been formed in two other localities-townships in Calhoun and Kalkaska Counties. Two more are to be organized in other Michigan townships. At the Wednesday meeting, the

board of directors of the Denmark Township Agricultural Extension Association drew up a memorandum of agreement with the Michigan Cooperative Extension Service. The organization has pledged funds amounting to about onethird of the cost of the first year of the program. The township project will be in effect for five years. Directors of the association include Joe Wells, Cecil Baker, George Thurston, Herman Roth, Bob Krueger and Arnold Krumnauer. Representing the Cooperative Extension Service at the meeting were Director D. B. (Woody) Varner and Richard Bell, who is in charge of the special, intensive extension program, and Alfred Ball-weg, Tuscola County agricultural Cecil Baker was elected presi-

dent of the association; Herman Roth, vice-president, and Arnold Krumnauer, secretary-treasurer.






