## Four Groups Hear **Color Lecture at School Monday**

The Cass City Home Demonstration Group were hostesses Monday evening in the homemaking rooms of the high school to members of the Elkland, Bethel and North Elmwood groups. About forty women were in attendance.

The highlight of the evening's program was a lecture on "Color in the Home" by Thomas Wilhelm of Saginaw, a representative of the Glidden Color Studies of Cleveland, Ohio. Mr. Wilhelm was introduced to the ladies by Russell Leeson, a local businessman.

In prefacing his remarks, Mr. Wilhelm said that color adds more to the pleasure of living than any other single factor and that proper colors tend to make our lives happier. The speaker compared colors of today with those used twenty years ago. He exemplified his talk with color charts, samples of draperies, etc. At present, yellow is a favorite color for kitchens, according to Mr. Wilhelm, because it radiates cheer. Green is a soothing color and blue is relaxing. Anyone planning to decorate her home was advised to obtain information from a color specialist for best results. The speaker demonstrated painting wallpaper with "Spred," using first a brush and then a roller. He answered many questions of his audience pertaining to his subject.
