Little Change in Regulations

Mail Early for Best Yule Postal Service

There has been little change in regulations for delivery of mail through the Christmas season officers Elected this year, according to an announcement made by post office officials this week.

However, a banner year is expected for volume in letters, packages and cards and members of club Tuesday sons in the area to mail early to avoid disappointing delays because of swamped mail service.

To help you mail your parcels and letters quickly and efficiently, the post office has come up with a few suggestions for saving time and assuring delivery. Next time you're in the post

office, stop and buy all the stamps you think you'll need in advance. When you sit down to write Aunt Suzy or Uncle Joe, be sure to place the complete address in ink and place your return address in the upper left hand corner of the envelope.

If you plan to send packages this Christmas, don't forget that the government has special rules for mailing. Don't seal your packages unless you have the statement "Contents Merchandise May be Opened for Postal Inspection.

If you tie your package, the statement is not necessary. Don't enclose a letter in the package unless you want Uncle Sam coming around asking questions. Any form of address besides "Do not open 'til Christmas" and "Merry Christmas," etc., are forbidden in third and fourth class

To assure delivery of cards, more and more senders are using the first class mail. Each letter sent first class costs an extra penny (three cents, instead of two) but has several advantages.

First class mail will be forwarded and can contain written messages. They can be sealed and will be returned without charge if undeliverable.

> Terrific strain to our highvay system has resulted from this great increase in automobiles. Not only are there more that Straits traffic for October cars and trucks in existence, but each of them covers more distance each day on our roads. Figures show that in 1945 1,658, 538 vehicles were licensed by the state; in 1952, this number increased to 2,833,876. State Police in May. estimate that drivers covered 16 million miles on Michigan roads in 1946. This compares to 24 billion in 1952. Each day last year 64 million miles were driven by Michigan motorists. This is equal to traveling around the earth 2,-

800 times. Today average is 71 million

driving every 24 hours. Figures of the Oil and Gas association show the average consumption of gasoline per vehicle jumped from 633 gallons per year in 1946 to 771 last year.

Serious problems result from these increases: 36% more drivers; 60% more vehicles; 50%

more miles driven. Traffic deaths in rural areas increased 33%. There were 46% more accidents, 42% more injuries, 17% more deaths.

Solutions exist but they cost

Present highway system is inadequate to handle today's traffic load says Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler. He says \$250 million are needed to meet existing emergency deficiencies. Highway people are hoping fervently that new studies and more money will be forthcoming from January's legislative session.

They want to widen and repair mail arteries; build new bridges. East-west highways in line for improvement are U.S. 16, 12, 2, 28. North-south arteries, badly in need of attention are routes 13, 10, 31, 131.

"More policemen are needed," says State Police Commissioner Joseph A. Childs. At present only 295 state officers are available for patrol duty each 24 hours. The Commissioner is asking for 150 more. Allowing for sickness and leave time, 134 additional troopers would then divide each day's duties.

Artificial Breeders

The artificial breeding association's dairy tour held November 4 in Tuscola County showed how ABA service and good dairy herd management is paying off for the three farms visited on the tour, according to Quentin R. Ostrander, assistant agricultural agent for Tuscola County.

Lloyd Karr at Cass City has nine ABA daughters in production. The production records of these nine daughters compared with their dams, on a 305-day mature equivalent basis. showed an average increase of 2,285 lbs. of milk and 62 lbs. of butterfat.

Karr credits ABA service and an improved feeding program for his increased production. Karr is breeding Red Dane cattle from his original herd of grade Guern-

Eliwood Eastman of Cass City has a herd of registered Guernseys which originated from his sons' 4-H club dairy projects. Eastman has been using ABA service for the past five years and now has seven ABA daughters who have completed one year or more of production. A comparison of the production record of these daughters with their dams shows an average increase of 211 lbs. of milk and 41 lbs. of butter-

The third farm visited on the our was the Charles Seddon farm at Kingston. Seddons have herd of grade and registered Holsteins. They now have seven ABA daughters who have completed one year or more of production and the average increase for these seven daughters over their dams is 465 lbs. of milk and 41 lbs. of butterfat. Through constant and careful culling of their low producers, based on DHIA records, and the use of ABA sires. Seddons have increased their herd production average from 7,920 lbs. of milk and 258 lbs. of butterfat in 1938 to 10,960 lbs. of milk and 369 lbs. of butterfat in 1952. They expect their average for 1953 to be over 400

lbs. of butterfat. Ostrander states that any dairyman in Tuscola County who wishes to take advantage of the opportunity of using the high quality, USDA proven sires available through ABA service should contact the County Extension Office, their local inseminator or a local ABA board member.






