CAP News

Local CAP officials were notified early Saturday morning, Nov. 28, regarding an overdue ambulance plane en route from Chicago to Tri-City (Bay City, Saginaw, Midland) airport. The plane, piloted by Charles

Dietrich, owner of the Dietrich ambulance service of Detroit, was carrying the body of Charles Neilson of Chicago to Midland for burial.

The plane was to have landed at Tri-City at 8:27 p.m. Friday night.

The group searched the area in seven cars and two planes. Most of the cars were equipped with two-way radios. With these, they kept in contact with the two fixed stations at Bad Axe and Cass City.
