Still in Good Health

Slightly Higher Budget Set By Council For 1954

Trustees for the village set the budget for 1954 at their regular Tuesday evening meeting at the Cass City Municipal Building.

The budget this year calls for expenditures of \$77,776.85-\$6,-976.85 more than the \$70,800 set for 1953.

The largest item on the budget is the amount set aside for paying M-81 within the village limits. Trustees have allotted \$15,000 for the project. In 1953, \$10,000 was set aside for the work which never materialized.

Plans for the work were formulated three years ago, but delays have kept the project from starting here. However, most observers believe that the job will be done in 1954.

Another item that has taken a big jump this year is sewer extension, which was allotted \$1.000 in 1953 and jumped to \$5,000 for 1954. The increase is expected to take care of a sewer to Jake Tekeili's home.

A new budget item in 1954 will be building maintenance. Money for this work was formerly taken from miscellaneous expense, but the work needed has grown so much that trustees decided to make it a budget item. One thousand dollars has been set aside for maintaining buildings in 1954.

Benson Discusses Farm Program

By Ezra Taft Benson Secretary of Agriculture

Any effective solution of today's farm problem must provide methods for reducing our huge stockpile of agricultural commodities and at the same time prevent further burdensome accumulations.

Getting rid of these surpluses is only half of our problem. Even if we were able to bring them down to manageable proportions, we would soon acquire new hoards of wheat, corn, cotton and butter under the existing system of price supports.

We already have approximately \$2.5 billions tied up in loans on farm commodities, in addition to an equal amount invested in goods which we own outright—\$5 illions in all.

Our present program does not encourage the production shifts which are required to meet the changing market demands for various commodities.

Of course, we could destroy some of our surpluses. Remember Youth Fellowship will sponsor a the government's potato fiasco of watch night service New Year's a few years ago?
