



Green Pastures for Green Dollars

The following is the first of a series of articles devoted to the Tuscola County Pasture Improvement program. These articles will be found each week in the Chronicle.

You can boost the carry capacity of your legume and grass pasture by a third to a half and increase its quality by applying commercial fertilizer now. And your livestock will do a lot better, not only because there is more forage, but also more pro-

tein and minerals. You'll get some boost in quantity of pasture by putting on 200 pounds of a phosphate and potash mixture but quality improvement comes with higher rates of fertilizing. That was shown by ing, you'll have better pastures experiments on Michigan farms.

About 1100 farmers each applied 620 pounds of a fertilizer strong in phosphate per acre and on the average they measured 55 per cent more grass and legume growth.

Experiments on 105 Michigan farms showed that 750 pounds of 20 per cent superphosphate in creased legume and grass growth by 35 per cent in 90 days. But when an 0-20-20 analysis was used, the increased growth was 53 per cent in that same time meet Tuesday night, April 27. > Extension Soils Specialist Paul J. Rood of Michigan State College says that phosphate-potash fertilizers are best for getting the most out of legumes, but nitrogen is the best shot in the arm for grass alone. And, he points out, now is the time to put 40 pounds of actual nitrogen per acre on the grass. That'll cost you about \$7 per acre-if you buy that much nitrogen in the form of 120 pounds of ammonium nitrate or 200 pounds of ammonium sulfate.

But what about your plans for hay and pasture in 1955? When you make your hay and pasture seedings at the time you plant oats, Rood advises, be generous with commercial fertilizer. "Make it 500 pounds per

The best way to apply the fertilizer when you're planting a

legume with a nurse crop is to use the band method. That's placing the clover, alfalfa, or ladine seed shallow in the moist surface soil—it's in a band above the fertilizer strip, which is placed deeper by the grain drill shoe. Since the fertilizer doesn't generous amounts of the plant

If you want to know how to adapt your drill for band placement, ask for Extension Folder F-180 at the county extension office. It's called, "Band Seeding for Better Forage Seeding." The publication shows how to adapt three different kinds of drills for band seeding.
