## Report Reveals Costs Lower for Yuletide Displays

## No Cause for Action Jury Returns Verdict In Local Hospital Case

A Tuscola County jury returned a verdict of no cause for action in the suit brought against Cass City Hospital by Anna K. Guilds for burns she said she received on the leg while in the hospital.

Mrs. Guilds was brought into the hospital unconscious Easter Sunday. On the following Tuesday, she discovered that her leg was burned, supposedly from hot water bottles placed there.

The case opened before Judge James E. O'Neill, Saginaw, Friday afternoon and continued through Monday and part of Tuesday, going to the jury at 2:05 p. m. Tuesday.

Jurors deliberated just one hour and 25 minutes before returning with the no cause for action verdict.

In another case in circuit court, Donald Woodard was found guilty of contempt of court and fined to six days in the Tuscola County jail, providing he pays \$250 in back alimony.

## To Comply with State Law

## County to Audit Books Of All School Districts

Better business practices are expected when Tuscola County begins a new system of child and financial accounting of school districts, scheduled to be in operation by March 1.

The plan, which calls for audits to be made by the County Superintendent of Schools' office of each school district, was presented to 110 county school officers Tuesday night at the biennial school officers' meeting at the Caro High School.

The audit is mandatory for all districts in Michigan and has been established by state law.

To handle the details for the districts, the County Board of Education has authorized hiring a full-time employee.

Joseph Liddicoat, county superintendent of schools, said that the plan is designed to comply with the state law at the lowest possible cost to school districts.

Failure to complete both child accounting and financial accounting would mean the loss of state aid, he said.

The audit system will require county treasurers and directors to establish a new set of books in many cases, so that an audit can be made quickly, authorities stated.

## Quick Killed in Auto Crash Near Caro Thursday

Russell Quick, 37, of Caro was instantly killed Thursday night at 10:15 o'clock when he crashed into the rear of a fruit truck driven by Nicolò Alfeno of Saginaw, two miles northeast of Caro on M-81.

Sheriff George F. Jeffrey said that both the car and truck were traveling southwest on M-81 towards Caro when the accident occurred.

According to Mr. Alfeno, he had slowed his truck almost to a halt because of traffic ahead of him, when Mr. Quick struck him in the rear.

Sheriff Jeffrey said that the Quick car was badly wrecked in the front where it smashed into the truck. The bumper of the car slid under the rear of the truck and the impact smashed the hood and drove the motor of the car back towards the driver.

Funeral services were held Sunday at 2:30 p. m. at the Novesta Church of Christ.

Burial was in Novesta Cemetery.

Surviving are five brothers, Hazen, Albert and Basil, all of Caro, George of Indian River and Jerry of Flint.

Car Burns.

An accident Saturday on the edge of Cass City damaged one car and set another ablaze.

The crash occurred when Adrian Hutchinson smashed into the rear of a car driven by Keith Lowe of Cass City. Lowe was pushing Charles Cook on M-81 when the accident occurred.

The crash damaged the front of the Hutchinson car and set Lowe's car on fire. The Elkland Township Fire Department was called and extinguished the blaze.

The fire broke out around the gas tank of the Lowe car.

Mary Ann Anthes of Deford, a passenger in the Lowe car, was taken to Pleasant Home Hospital and released after treatment. She was not seriously injured.

Constable Bill Schram, one of the investigating officers, issued a ticket to Mr. Hutchinson for not having his car under control.

## 1953 A Busy Year At Tuscola County Sheriff's Office

It has been a busy year for the Tuscola County Sheriff's Department.

The annual report issued to the Tuscola County Board of Supervisors showed that the department traveled 75,132 miles in department cars, handled 595 car accidents in which 27 persons were killed and 350 persons injured.

Thirty-one persons were brought to court for reckless driving and 22 were found guilty of drunk driving during 1953.

The sheriff and his deputies found beer in possession of minors 43 times and issued 64 gun permits.

It was a busy year at the jail, according to Sheriff Jeffrey's reports. The jail housed 453 persons and served 5,928 meals during the year.

Officers issued 298 warrants in the course of 1953's business.

The department collected \$11,504.86 . . . \$1,267.47 in fees and \$10,237.39 in fines and costs.

## Road Commission Report Shows How 1953 Funds Spent

A report presented by the Tuscola County Road Commission to the Tuscola Board of Supervisors revealed that \$85,946.38 was spent on construction and maintenance of county roads in 1953.

The commission received \$834,711.41 from all sources during the year and started 1953 with a balance of \$28,449.68 for a total of \$863,161.09 to be accounted for.

Besides the money spent on roads, other major expenses of the commission included \$44,464.74 for land and new equipment and \$214,873.95 for materials purchased.

Total expenditures for the year for the commission amounted to \$855,447.50.

Starting 1954, the report showed \$7,713.59 cash on hand.

## Soldier Tells of Japanese Conditions

In a letter written to Mr. and Mrs. G. B. Dupuis, A/2c Marvin A. Pratt describes some of the conditions as he found them while stationed in Tokyo, Japan.

He writes that one of the things about the country that impressed him unfavorably was the dirt. "Some parts of Tokyo are so dirty and smelly so badly that it turns your stomach to be near them. There is no comparison between the stores here and the stores back home. They have everything in the open. The meat is out where flies can walk on it and the fish are put in a tub and they smell. Bread is in the open and has no wrapper on it.

"G. I. trade is what most merchants live on—that is in clothing and souvenirs. The cost of living here is very low. The average family spends about 100 yen per day (28 cents) for food.

"The average laborer makes 360 yen per day which is one American dollar. The average residential district is as dirty as the slum districts in our cities back home.

"The Japanese women still dress in the old costume—kimono and wooden shoes—but the men and young girls dress like we do."

Despite the Hawks' 10-point victory margin, the game was close all the way.

As usual in a Caro-Cass City game, the tilt was marked by flaring tempers that saw Don Simmons from Cass City and Douglas McBurney from Caro banished from the game.

Simmons was ejected for an elbow in the face to a Caro player. The blow looked intentional, but Simmons said after the game that it was an accident.

Several other times in the game the boys doubled fists, but close officiating kept the game under control.

Chuck Grady and McBurney were threatening each other late in the game and Coach Don Stamatos benched Dave Corradi for doubling his fists in the first half. He returned to the game in the final quarter.

The Tigers started the game as if they were going to make it a runaway. They ran up a 13-2 margin in the first four minutes and at the five-minute mark, led 15-4.

But Cass City kept its poise and started whittling down the lead and by the end of the quarter trailed by just two points, 21-19.

The second and third periods were a seesaw battle. The Hawks outscored Caro in the second quarter, 18-14, to take a two-point lead.

They stretched their advantage to 33-49 at the end of the third quarter.

In the final period, Caro rallied to tie the score before Cass City staged its final drive to win going away.

Don Hover, Caro, led all scorers with 24 points. For Cass City, Russ Foy netted 22 points and Clare Comment registered 19 points. Simmons and Jack Clara materially helped the Hawk cause with 17 and 14 points, respectively.

The Cass City reserves won an easy 52-37 decision from the Caro seconds.

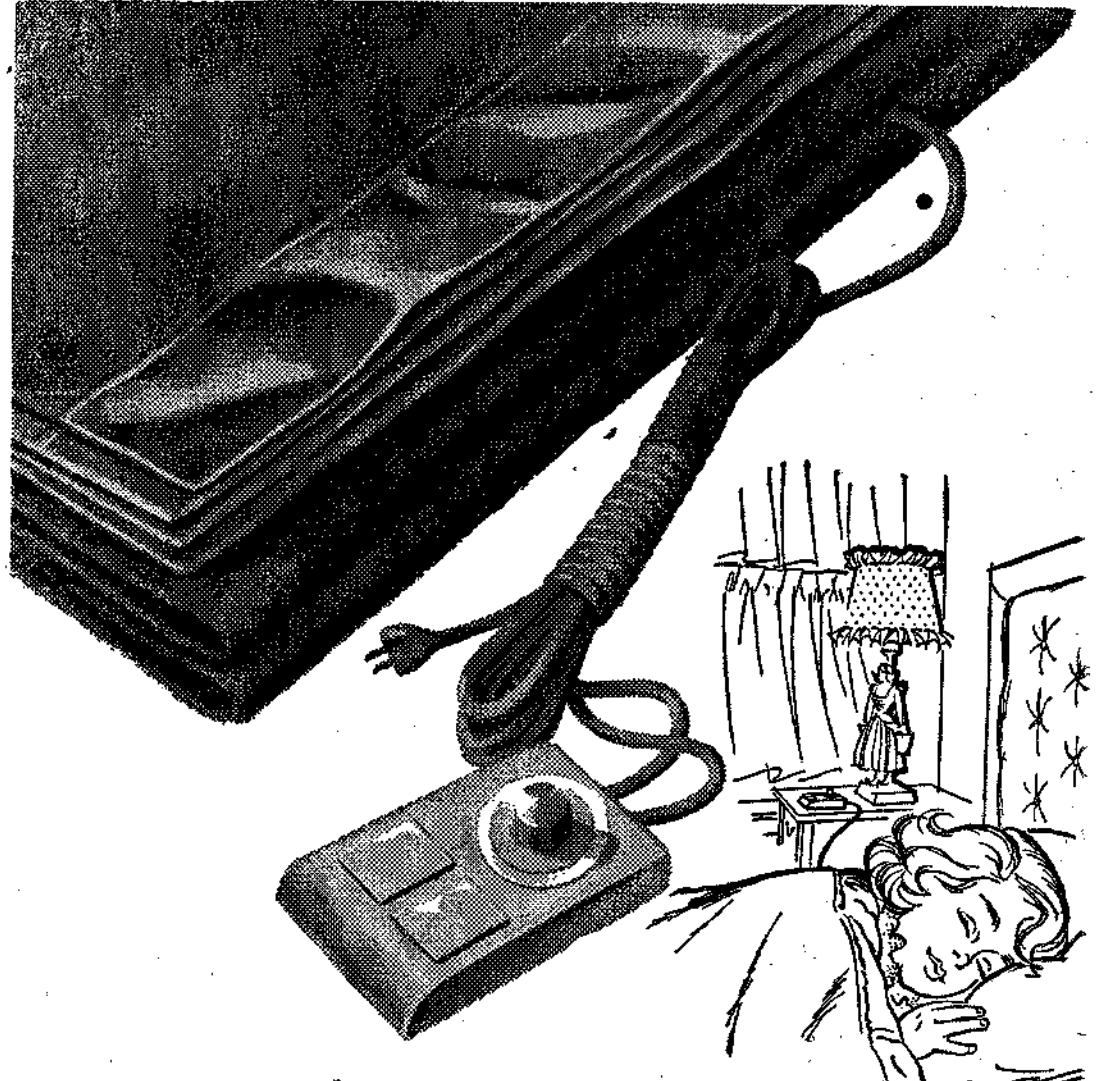

## Group Leadership Training School Slated in Caro

A group leadership training school for current leaders of various organizations in Tuscola County will be held in the Wilber 4-H Memorial Building, Caro, from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m., Monday, Jan. 25, according to Alfred P. Ballweg, county agricultural agent. In charge of the leadership training program will be Paul Miller, extension specialist from Michigan State College.

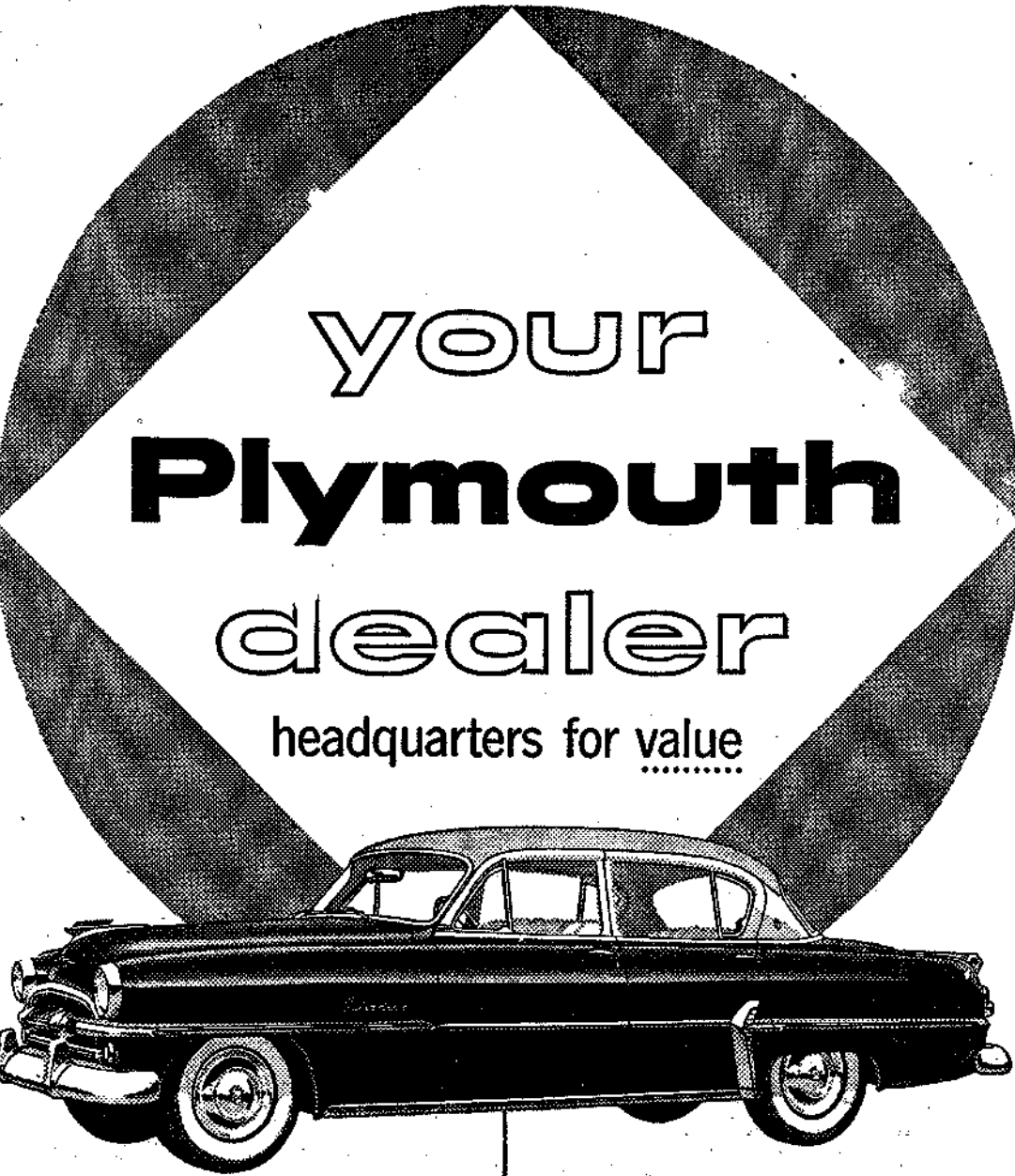

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### MICHIGAN MIRROR NEWS BRIEFS

Legislators convene in Lansing this week to consider Michigan's business for the coming year.

As always, there are problems to solve; decisions to reach; policies to determine. Public needs, being many and varied, can never be completely satisfied. In preparing to deal with problems of this session, lawmakers have good reason to feel encouraged over progress made during 1953.

Taxpayers can relax this year, for the first time in many months, without worrying whether they will be affected by a new tax.

"Financial condition of the state is good," said Auditor General John B. Martin. "During the previous 12 months, Michigan has dug itself out of its monetary mess and now expects to pay all its bills on time—including those due schools and other local governments."

Schools were swamped with increased enrollment resulting from babies born in the post war period. There were problems to find high schools for students in rural areas, elementary students in most areas, teacher payrolls generally.

Enrollment went from 1,190,000 to 1,250,000, an increase of 60,000. These additional children required 2,000 additional teachers and 2,000 additional classrooms.

Older teachers were brought back, special teaching certificates were issued; the need partly satisfied. Pay scales were increased to an average of \$4,000 per year to encourage teachers to remain in the profession.

College enrollment in 1953 increased about 12% to 100,000, a total demanding more building by educational institutions.

The birthrate continued up last year: the death rate decreased. Michigan citizens, as a group were healthier.

An all time low was realized in deaths—less than nine per 1,000 people. Maternity deaths dropped to the lowest ever—less than 5% per 1,000 live births. There was virtually no change in the infant death rate.

About 180,000 babies were born in Michigan during 1953, some 2,165 more than 1952 record high of 177,835.

The marriage rate declined somewhat, but the divorce frequency also fell off.

A \$28 million building program saw 26 buildings completed and work started on 10 more.

The Lewis Cass building, which was ruined by fire and water in 1951, was ready to accommodate many of the state offices forced to seek temporary quarters at that time. A second state building named in honor of Steven T. Mason, was also completed and immediately occupied.

Hospitals and schools make up the majority of other structures on the list. Fifteen are already in use as addition to mental institutions. Wayne University has a new \$4 million medical science building in Detroit; Michigan College of Mines at Houghton and Northern Michigan College of Education at Marquette have additions to the campuses.

Highway construction, a field that dropped behind during the war and was never able to catch up, totaled \$37,655,000. Contracts for this amount were let in 1953. Sixty seven new bridges and 51 railroad crossing flashers were built, and 24 crossings reconstructed.

There were 108 miles of concrete pavement installed during 1953. Surfacing, smoothing and rehabilitating completed on hundreds more.

### Cass City ABA to Meet January 18

All five of the Tuscola County artificial breeders' associations will hold their annual meetings on Monday and Tuesday, Jan. 18 and 19, announced Quentin R. Ostrander, Tuscola County assistant agricultural agent.

The main speaker at four of these meetings, Vassar, Kingston, Unionville and Cass City, will be George Parsons, dairy specialist from Michigan State College, who will discuss problems of a successful breeding program.

The speaker for the Millington ABA will be Dr. Lloyd Turk, director of the Michigan Experiment Station, who will discuss "Problems Ahead in Agriculture."

In addition to the main speaker, the program at all meetings will include a presentation of the annual report, election of two directors and refreshments, Ostrander stated.

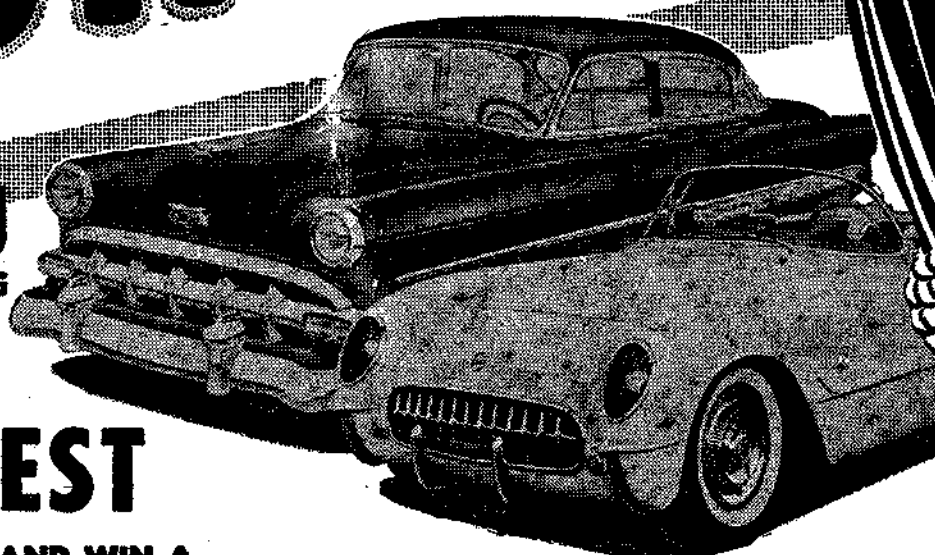
