

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



Johnson suggests that a good goal for the average farmer is an acre of pasture per cow through most of the grazing season. Balbo rye and Sudan grass may carry two or three cows per acre for a short time.

Cows should be able to graze for two or three hours and then lie down to start milk production. If they keep on for long hours on short feed pastures, the energy will cut into the monthly milk

Good pastures also help control grassy off-flavor milk troubles, adds Dr. G. M. Trout, Michigan State College dairy researcher. Cows can get their fill and be taken off pasture well in advance of milking time.

Experiments by the Michigan Agricultural Experiment Station show that cattle are not so apt to produce grassy flavor milk from Balbo as they are from ordinary rye, Trout adds.

The men are mostly married and have houses, either in the nearest village or on the farm itself.

Very great accent is placed on soil conservation and the land strictly rotated-erosion is almost non-existent—a very high proportion of the land being fall ploughed.

On our own farms we fatten 100 steers each year in order to obtain sufficient manure to keep up the fertility. Green crops are ploughed under each five years, too. Our rotation is beets, bar Nemeth, ley, seeds (June clover and rye manure ploughed under), potatoes, spring wheat, barley.

I have given a general outlook of our agriculture today to the best of my ability. I would like to close by thanking very sin cerely the people in Tuscola County for their wonderful hospitality and kindness to me during my most enjoyable stay in Michigan and wish them all prosperity in the future.
