Bigelow Named To Fill Vacant Trustee's Post

Andrew Bigelow was named by the Cass City Village Council to fill the unexpired term of M. C. McLellan, Tuesday night at a special meeting of the village council held at the municipal building.

Mr. Bigelow will serve through March when Mr. McLellan's term on the council would have expired. Mr. McLellan resigned last week because he plans to take a vacation and move out of the village into a new home.

Mr. Bigelow will begin his duties with the December meeting of the council.

Authorities of the State Savings Bank of Gagetown announced this week that Richard K. Burdon and Leslie C. Munro, both of Gagetown, have purchased the bank stock formerly owned by their grandfather, Richard Burdon, Sr.

The elder Burdon was one of the original stockholders of the bank when it was organized the day before Christmas, 1890.

Mr. Burdon and Mr. Munro are members of the Gagetown school board and trustees of the Village of Gagetown. They are well-known in the Gagetown vicinity.

Baguley New Welfare Director For County

The Tuscola County Board of Supervisors named Irl Baguley, supervisor from Indianfields Township, as the Tuscola County Welfare Director, Monday in their regular one-day monthly session at Caro.

The board acted on the recommendation of Mrs. Gladys Witte, chairman of the Welfare Commission. Mr. Baguley will receive a salary of \$4,000 for the first year he is in office and \$4,200 for the second year.

Mr. Baguley told members of the board how much he had appreciated working with them during his terms as supervisor. He will resign his position on the board to assume his new duties.

Assessed valuation of property in the Village of Cass City will probably be raised about 25 per cent next year to pay for the sewage system to be installed here next year, according to a discussion of the Cass City Village Council at a special meeting held Tuesday at the municipal building.

Payment on the bonds and interest for the first year will be about \$9,000. The expected boost in taxes will net about \$7,000 and the remainder of the money will be taken from the general fund.

According to an anticipated budget set for 1955, the village will receive \$66,600.00, not counting the amount the increase in taxes will bring.

The village has \$15,000 on hand which, together with \$12,000 to be received from weight and gas tax, is required by law to be used for road improvements in the village.

It is expected that the money will be used to resurface Main Street and widen Seeger Street one block north and south of Main Street. If funds permit, the entire length of Seeger Street will probably be resurfaced next year.

The increase in valuation will amount to about a four-mill increase in taxes or about \$10 a year for a home assessed at \$2,500.

The complete budget will be submitted and approved at the regular December meeting of the council.

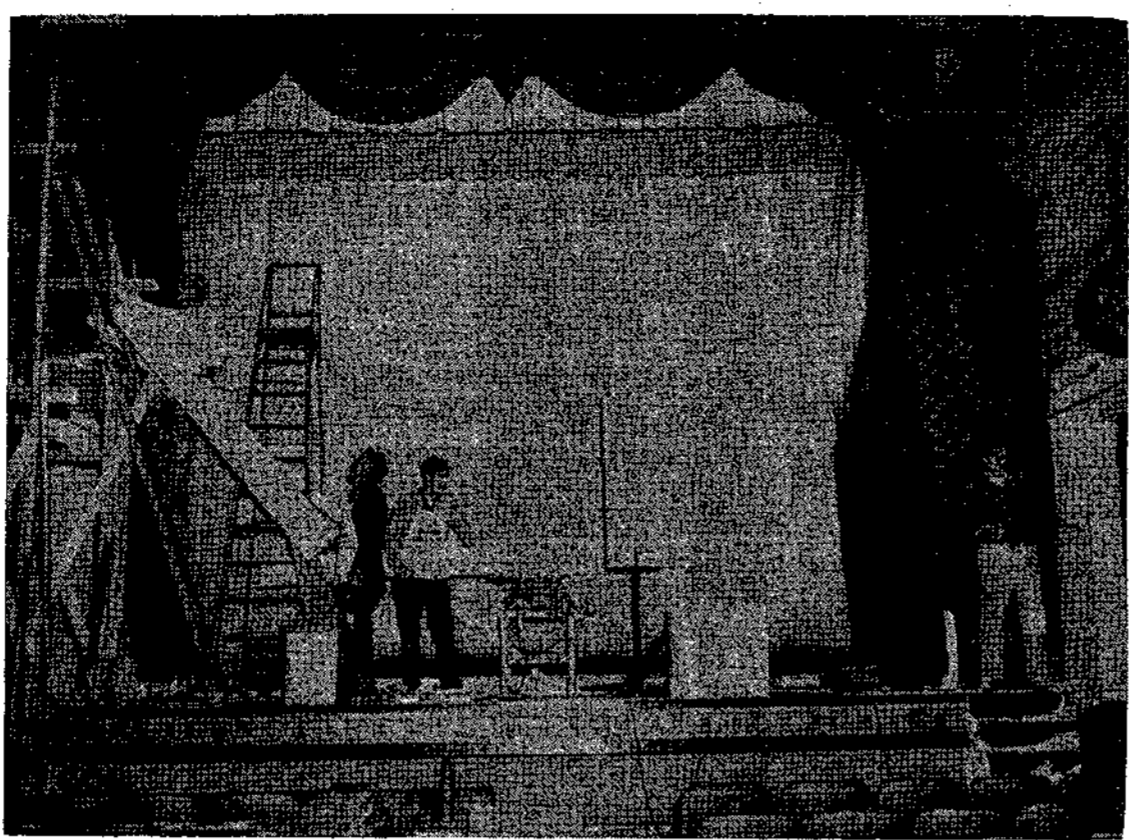
Tyler Lodge No. 317 F & AM elected officers at the annual meeting held Tuesday evening. Grant Hutchinson is the newly elected worshipful master.

Kenneth Auten, 45, Cass City area farmer, was killed Tuesday evening in a two-car collision at the intersection of Bay City-Forestville and Cemetery roads, four miles north of Cass City.

Injured in the accident were three persons: Mrs. Ida Guitar, Harbor-Beach, driver of the car travelling east on Bay City-Forestville Road, is in critical condition. She was still unconscious Thursday morning. She is suffering from a skull fracture, multiple cuts and bruises and shock.

Mrs. Elizabeth Sieske, a passenger in the Guitar car, also of Harbor Beach. She is suffering from a fractured hip and abrasions of face and body. She is expected to recover.

Cecil McQueen, driver of the car on Cemetery Road, of Snover. Mr. McQueen suffered scalp lacerations and multiple cuts and bruises.

According to the report of authorities, the Guitar car hit the automobile driven by McQueen in the middle of the right front door. The McQueen auto traveled about 65 feet after the accident and the Guitar car went off the road, through a roadside ditch and stopped when it hit a fence.

According to Coroner H. T. Donahue, Mr. Auten died shortly after he was admitted to Pleasant Home Hospital. Death was said to be caused by a broken rib which punctured a lung causing internal bleeding. Mr. Auten also received chest injuries, a fractured jaw and fractured skull.

Mr. Auten was born Sept. 6, 1909, at Gagetown. He married the former Miss Etta Collins Mar. 19, 1934.

Hawks Nip Marlette In First Game, 70-66

Fresh from a narrow 70-66 victory over Marlette Friday, the Cass City Red Hawks will open their home season tonight when they play Vassar in a conference game at Cass City High School. The first game will start at 7 p. m.

The game will give many Cass City fans their first opportunity to see the 1954-55 edition of the Hawks in action. Although many persons in the area wanted to see the opener at Marlette, limited seating kept many fans at home.

Coach Irv Claseman said that he was satisfied with the club's performance for the opening game. "The team can be stronger this year than it was in 1953-54," Claseman said, "if they are willing to work the way last year's squad did to improve as the season progresses."

The fortunate few from Cass City who saw the game with Marlette say about as an exciting game as they are apt to see all season.

With about four minutes left in the game, Cass City trailed Marlette by seven points. The Red Raiders went into a stall to try and run out the clock.

The move backfired as Cass City broke up the attempt and moved in to tie the score with a minute left.

Don Simmons, who was impressive in his first game as a regular at center, the Hawks outscored Marlette, 13-12, in the initial period.

In the second quarter, Cass City added two points to their lead by outscoring the Raiders, 18-16, and led at the half, 31-28.

Marlette came up with its best quarter of the game in the third period. They netted 25 points, with Wayne Smith, big Marlette center, picking up nine of the points. Cass City netted 17 to trail by five points going into the final period.

The Hawks showed one attribute of a winning team in the final period. When trailing by seven points late in the game, they kept their poise, although the Marlette margin looked big with only four minutes left in the game.

Besides the scoring of Comment, three other Hawk players reached the double figures. Bill Tuckey counted 11 points, Dick Donahue netted 14 and Don Simmons counted 12. Smith and J. Kelley netted 18 points each for the losers.

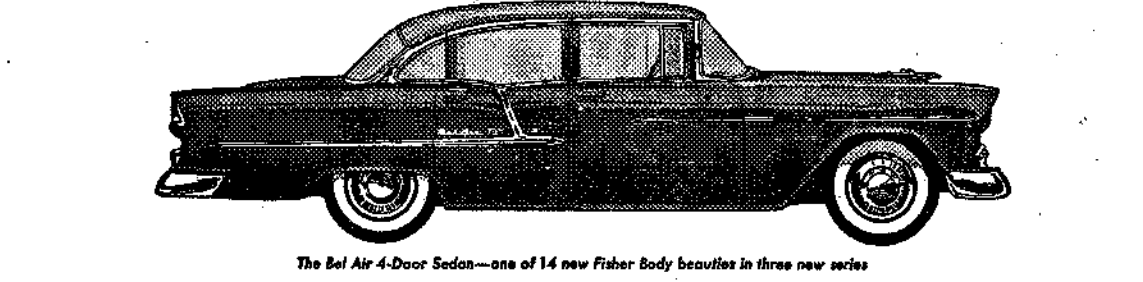



CARS ARE MY LINE

A few weeks ago in a large eastern city a young woman was driving home along a narrow, busy street. Her wheels stuck in the street car tracks and plowed the car head first into the front of a heavy tow truck. It was a bad smash-up but the girl stepped out with only a few scrapes and bumps.

The police officer who investigated the accident wrote in his report: "In my opinion, she escaped more serious injury because of the safety belt in the car."

This was probably the first spontaneous and unrehearsed accident in which a car safety belt proved its worth. Their advantage, of course, is that they hold the driver, and his passengers, tight in their seats when the car stops suddenly, keeping them away from the windshield, dashboard and steering wheel.

Many safety organizations have sung the praises of safety belts and some police departments have had them installed in their cruisers.

It's a gloomy subject, but one which should be considered sanely and frankly. My feeling has been that the safety belt in itself doesn't prevent accidents and may, in fact, cause more accidents. Any device which makes a cocksure driver more cocksure, which virtually assures a smart aleck that he can do anything he wants without fear of being hurt is liable to put a new breed of menace onto the road.

For my money the best safety devices are those which actually prevent accidents, a responsive engine, reliable steering and good brakes.

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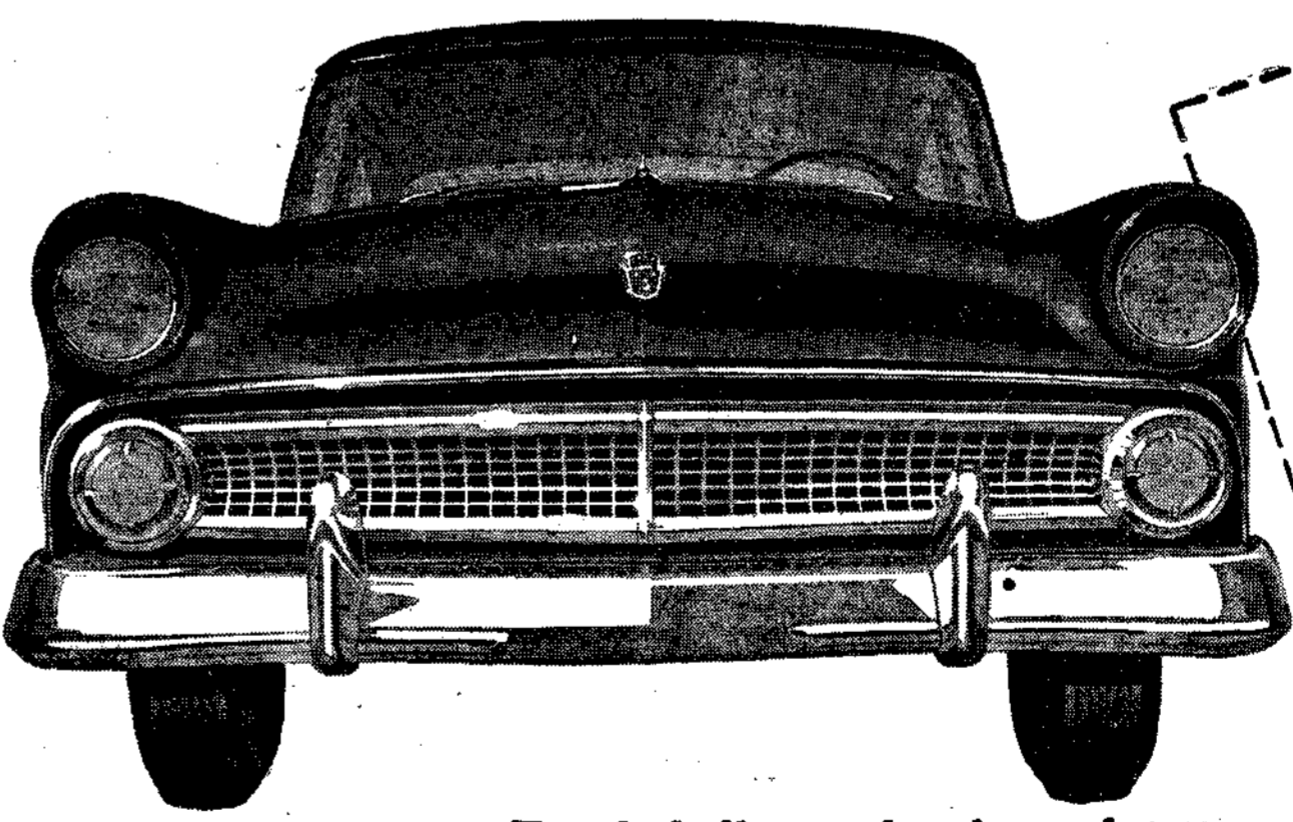

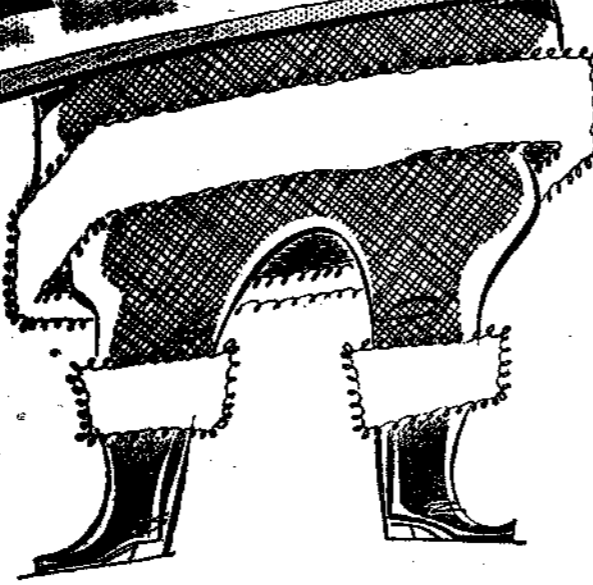

MICHIGAN MIRROR NEWS BRIEFS

Michigan Republicans are looking for a knight in shining armor to revive the party for 1956.

Confused and hurt after their fourth straight loss to Democratic Gov. Williams, Republicans are preaching revival.

"We've got to do more than rest on our oars and place our faith in tradition," said Treasurer D. Hale Brake.

It was the valedictory of a sincere party stalwart who was swept out of office in the Democratic landslide after 14 years as guardian of the state's purse-strings.

He has seen politicians come and go and at one time figured to be the Republican rallying point. Others differed and rather than split the party, Brake went along.

Now, in the debris of another election in which all Republican candidates for state office met political disaster, Brake is back with ideas to put the party on its feet again.

Brake wants to fight fire with fire.

He suggests recruiting an out-state man — "a popular figure" as state chairman and insists he be well-versed in publicity; a man who will capture the imagination of a new kind of voter.

It's the same step Democrats took years ago with Williams, the boohy-looking idol of the young people; the trademarks of politics

the bow tie and the square-dance calling.

The technique made Williams a popular vote-getter, a politician everyone would like to have live next door and it won him four terms in the executive office.

Democrats had the keen Paul W. Weber to guide Williams' footsteps and write his speeches. Weber feints the opposition of balance and crosses with a well-turned phrase.

It's the pattern that Michigan politics has taken in the past decade.

But who is the man or men around which this new and fresh Republican party can be constructed?

One choice is Congressman Gerald Ford, the young man from Grand Rapids. His backers say he has the energy, the youth, the foresight to breathe new life into an old philosophy.

Others claim that because Republicans are out of the main offices, the mantle of leadership will naturally fall to party members in the legislature.

There the Republicans have Senators Creighton R. Coleman, Battle Creek; Edward Hutchinson, Fennville; Carlton H. Morris, Kalamazoo. All are among the "Young Turks" who gained power two years ago.

Coleman admits privately he would like to run for Congress but might stay around for extra party duties. Morris is young, a lawyer and admits to no ambitions beyond the state borders.

Hutchinson, whose grandfather once sat in the Senate, will work in Michigan for the next 1,000 years, if necessary, for Republicans.

The House of Representatives has Rep. Harry J. Phillips, Port Huron; and Herb Clements, Deckerville; Reed Orr, Battle Creek; and a number of other young men ready for battle with Democrats.

Whatever happens, it's a certainty among Republicans that those at the head of the party organization from Detroit will be of less importance when the 1956 convention is held.

Bingo is still unlawful in Michigan. The election saw a proposed constitutional amendment

defeated which would have led to its legalization under restraints of the legislature.

Counties which have been turning their heads the other way for years are suddenly cracking down, chasing bingo out of the clubs—under the theory that they have a mandate of the people.

The most telling argument in favor of bingo during the campaign was: "If Michigan can control legalized gambling at the horse tracks, why not if the game is bingo?"

Now that their election battles are past one legislator is carrying the torch against all gambling. Rep. Willard I. Bowerman (R-Lansing) said he would ask the 1955 legislature to outlaw pari-mutuel betting at the races, wiping out a multi-million dollar operation.

Michigan gets up to \$7,000,000 a year from tracks in taxes. Bowerman said: "That's a paltry sum when morals of our citizens are involved."

Prisons and Mental Hospitals are both overcrowded in Michigan and a battle is brewing over who will get the 200-bed addition to the Ionia State Hospital for the Criminal Insane.

"We want it all," said Corrections Director Gus Harrison.

He has a law on his side, one passed two years ago which said that the addition would be turned over to the use of the corrections department. Mental Health Director Charles F. Wagg said:

"We also need more space, and we shall see."

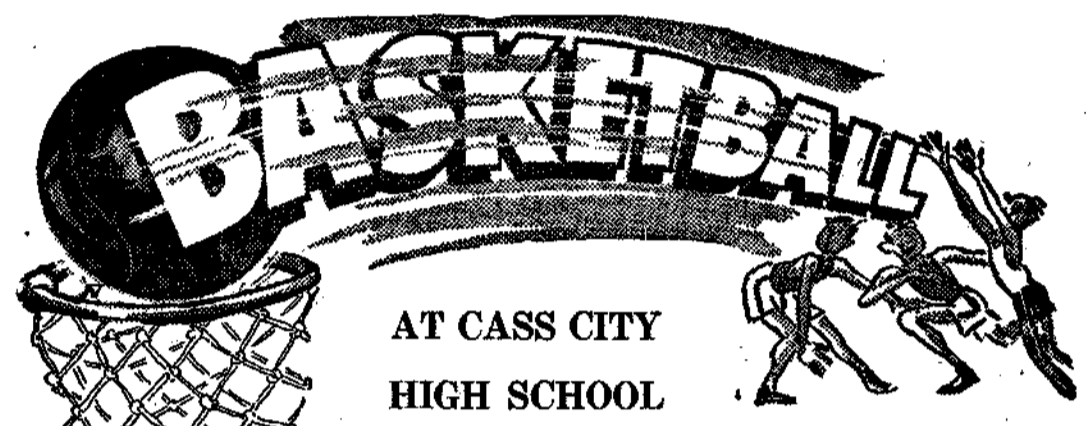
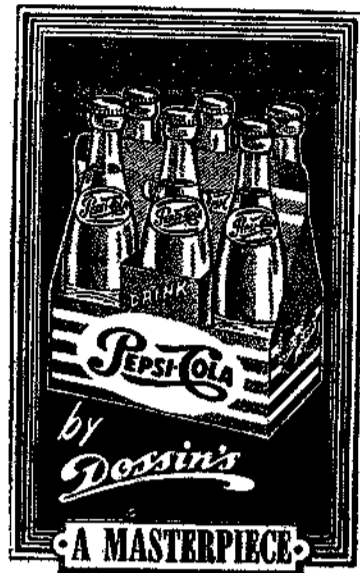

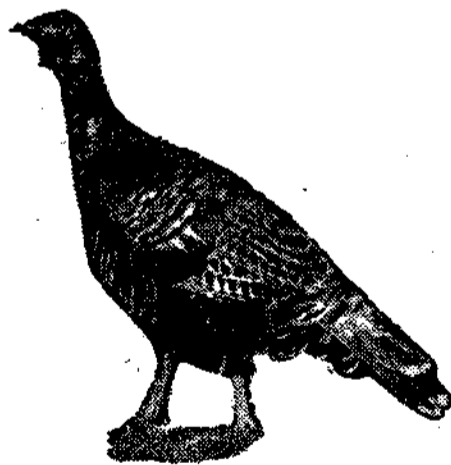

Judge Quinn Tells Rotary of Circuit Court Tuesday
