Mrs. Martin, 86, Dies at Home Of Daughter

Mrs. Genie Martin, 86, well known Woman's Christian Tem perance leader and pioneer resident of Novesta Township, died Tuesday afternoon at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Goldie Mc-Laughlin, of Detroit.

Mrs. Martin was born in Clyde Township, St. Clair County, May 17, 1868. She was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Campfield. Born in the same community as her late husband, George A. Martin, the couple was married Dec. 31, 1888, and spent the first ten months of wedded life in Clyde Township.

In 1889 they came to Novesta Township, cleared away the brush on 80 acres of wilderness and erected a house. They spent 52 years on the Novesta farm and transformed it to a finely productive tract and erected modern farm buildings. Mr. and Mrs. Martin had cele-

brated their golden wedding on New Year's Day, 1938. Mrs. Martin was a life mem-

ber of the Cass City Grange. She and her husband were the first persons in Tuscola County to be awarded Golden Sheaf Certificates for completing 50-year memberships as Grangers. She was also a life member of the Gleaners.

Mrs. Martin was a temperance leader since 1904. She served 18 years as county president, treasurer of the county society for 11 years, district corresponding secretary for nine years, president of the Deford Union for 27 years and 14 years as Seventh District President.
