Supervisors Okay 1955 Budget Friday

When Tuscola County residents receive their tax bills this year, 00. qualified authorities estimate that they will be \$2 higher per \$1,000 than they were in 1954. Supervisors expect to ask for 5.5 mills county tax this year on

Last year the county had 7.5-mill tax on the county's asspread at 68 per cent of the source and this year expects to state's figures.

ized valuation, as required by a

The tax experts have computed that five mills raised on the equalized valuation is equal to 7.5 mills on the county's valuation. Therefore, the 5.5-mill tax will amount to a raise of a half mill on county taxes.

School districts who are forced to raise five mills to be eligible for state aid will actually be raising 7.5 mills on present valuations, which will be an average raise of 1.5 mills or a total of \$2 a thousand for school and county taxes.

Supervisor Evard Rawson says that Elkland Township is now assessed at the county's equalized valuation, but many townships in the county are below the county

Spreading on the state's valuation will actually raise the 15-mill limitation, established by an amendment to the constitution, to 221/2 mills, computed on the basis of county valuation.

This year there will probably be only a total of 11.5 mills raised, leaving 3.5 mills available for tax inreases without a special vote.

Supervisors for Tuscola County set the 1955 budget at \$401,-367.74 during the final day of their January session Friday at the courthouse in Caro.

The amount is \$14,608.84 less than the county spent in 1954 and f the county is able to follow the budget, the total deficit in the county wil be reduced to \$31,-

105.25 by the end of 1955.

At the present time, the total deficit is \$62,487.51. Estimated income for the year is \$432,750.-

According to the figures compiled by the supervisors, the county expects to receive about \$4,700 more in 1955 than it did in

The added revenue will come from an increase in the amount to be received from property taxes. Last year the county resessed valuation which was ceived \$327,324.68 from this receive \$333,000 through increased property taxes.

Two major items that are expected to reduce costs for the county are the Social Welfare Department and inactive drain fund. The budget shows \$87,000.00 for 1955 as against \$94,250.00 spent last year. A total of \$5,686.99 was spent in the inactive drain fund in 1954 and nothing was allotted this year.

Happen in Winter Heating Systems,

Sparks Chief Causes

Farm fires-which cost an estimated 3,000 lives and \$142 million each year-are most likely to happen in the winter.

A survey in one mid-western state showed that although there are over 10 buildings on the aver-Highway Commissioner Char- age farm in the state, 64 per cent flues and heating systems, or sparks on the roof, both winter hazards.

Some good winter precautions: 1. If roof is shingled, be sure shingles are in good condition and that there are spark arresters on the chimneys.

2. Keep chimneys in good condition. They should be regularly inspected, particularly at the roof line, and cleaned. Repair cracks. Entry into the attic is necessary for a thorough inspection job.

3. Keep stoves, furnaces, ranges, and fireplaces clean. Furnaces



Most of the damage done by farm fires is to dwellings. Keeping chimneys well repairedclean and with no cracks is one way to assure flying sparks won't cause you to lose your farm home. It's also wise to keep an eye on heating system during dangerous winter months.

and wood stoves should be at least 18 inches from walls, beams or woodwork unless such are properly insulated.

4. Equip fireplaces with sturdy metal screens.

5. Portable oil heaters should be on level surface, away from furniture, draperies or other combustibles. Never fill one while it is lighted. Keep the fuel supply outdoors and refill heaters there.

When heaters are burning, keep window or door open slightly to provide an adequate oxygen sup-

Old Dairyland Pastures Can Be Easily Improved

Some old seedings of dryland pastures will respond to mechanical treatments and save complete plowing, say research workers in

In recent tests, treatments included ripping pastures at 5 and 8-inch depths on a 20-inch interval, plowing grass into rows about 42 inches apart, and disking. Research workers also seeded alfalfa and sweet clover into a series of plots plowed into 42-inch rows.

Results showed that western wheatgrass production would increase slightly after the disking treatment. After other treatments, production of western wheatgrass

Plowing into rows and seeding legumes increased forage yields, and, except for rows seeded with sweet clover, one would expect treatments involving legume seeding to outyield mechanical treatments 19 times out of 20.

Grasses plowed into 42-inch rows and seeded with alfalfa produced 83 per cent more than the untreated area. This treatment appeared to be the best way of increasing yield of seeded pastures in low productivity.







2. Unused acreage in any factory district may be transferred to factory districts needing such acreage.

Transferral of acreage shall be made in accordance with procedures to be set up later by the State ASC Committee with its Advisory Committee.


