

Cut Egg Production Costs by Culling

With egg prices down, it takes constant flock culling to keep loafers from eating poultrymen out of business, Alfred P. Ballweg, Tuscola County agricultural agent, points out.

If a poultryman does a good job of culling, he can cut egg production costs sharply. J. M. (Mac) Moore, extension poultryman at Michigan State College, asserts that costs can be sliced by two cents a dozen if the rate of lay can be increased by a dozen eggs per hen.

He points out that it takes 35 to 40 cents to produce a dozen eggs if a flock averages 60 eggs daily per 100 hens. That's 20 to 25 cents a dozen for feed costs alone.

Aim at high production, he advises. A hard working hen eats only a little more than a loafer.

CARS ARE MY LINE

In the past we've talked a bit about safety, speed, speed laws and the testing of cars. But, as the old saying goes, the most important part of a car is the nut behind the wheel. Bad driving, I've always felt, comes more from not knowing the rules than from outright cussedness.

For driving on the open highway the three things that worry us most, I think, are how closely should you follow? How much room should you allow to pass? How can you defend yourself from bright lights?

When the driving is good, the weather clear and the highway fairly straight, the best rule is to allow one car length between you and fellow up ahead for every 10 miles an hour of speed. At 50 miles an hour, therefore, you should be at least five car lengths behind.

At 60 miles an hour it takes at least 10 seconds to pass another car and you should have at least 600 feet of clear, straight road ahead. Keep in mind that for safe passing you need the length of two football fields, a long, long way. (I'd sooner be driving it than running it).

The rule on headlight glare is better known: keep your eyes on the right hand side of the road. That keeps you on the road and helps to keep the light out of your eyes.

And, of course, every nut in the car—except the one behind the wheel—should be thoroughly tight. 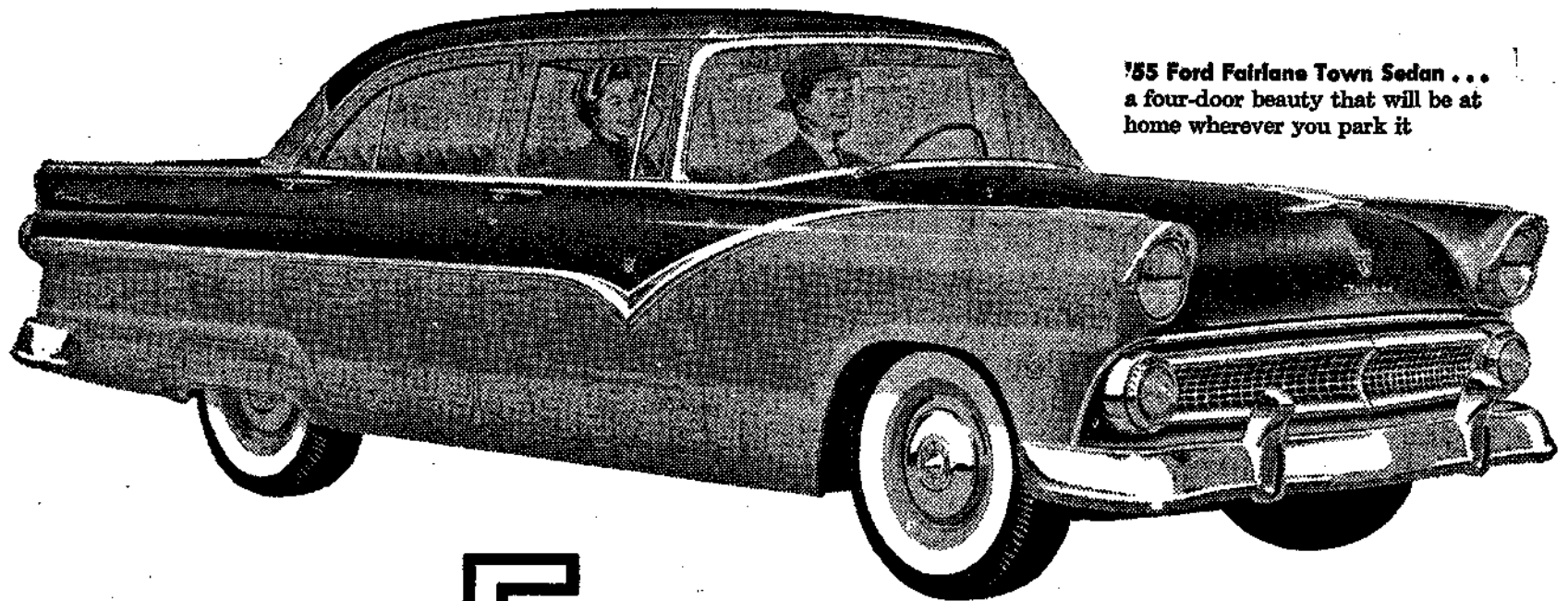





Michigan Historical Marker
JACKSON MINE
On this spot in June 1845 Marji-Gesick, a Chippewa Chief, pointed out to Philo M. Everett pieces of iron ore among the roots of a fallen white pine tree. As a result of this discovery the Jackson Mining Company of which Philo Everett was a founder began taking out ore here in 1847. In this way the great iron mining industry of Michigan began.

A standard marker for officially approved historic sites in Michigan has been adopted by the Michigan Historical Commission. Above is a sample marker. The crest shows the wolverine and the words "Michigan Registered Historic Site." The marker is of cast aluminum with gold lettering. By adopting a uniform design and authorizing its use the Historical Commission believes historic sites in Michigan will become as well known as those in Eastern states and the West.

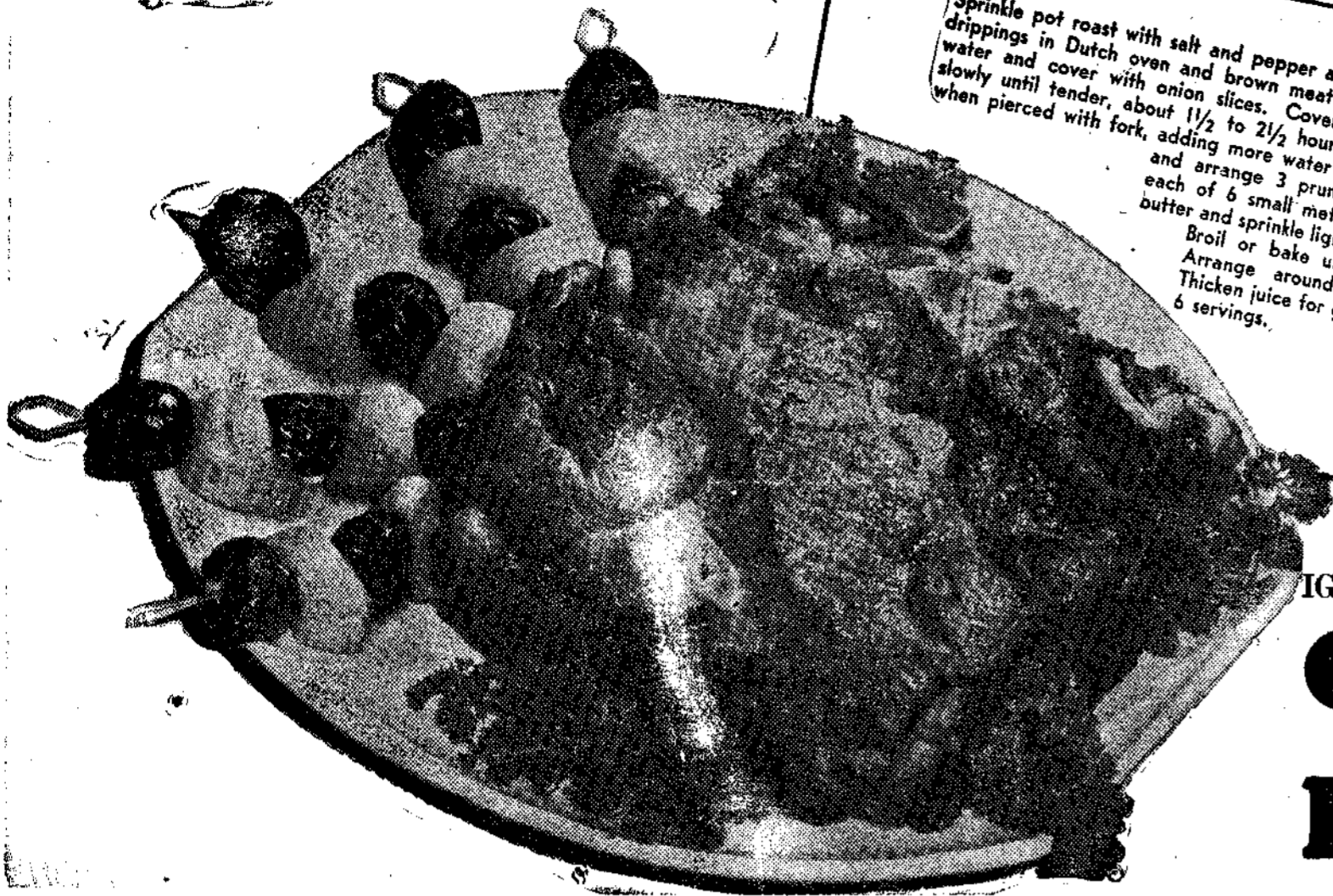
