This modern farm implement pictured above can be used for a variety of jobs on the farm all spring and summer, on wheat and alfalfa, on all row crops, and behind other tillage tools as a packer and mulcher. The price is reasonable and being able to use it for so many different jobs makes it a high paying investment.

In the spring it can be used to go over fall wheat, fills in any cracks in the ground, loosens and mulches the soil and gets the crop off to a fast start. The same procedure goes for alfalfa, if fertilizer is being spread on either of the above crops as a top dressing, this implement can be pulled along with the fertilizer spreader or drill for two jobs on one trip. It can be towed backward behind the springtooth harrow to make a fine smooth seed bed ahead of the drill, or two sections can be coupled together tandem and towed behind the plow backward to pack and work the fresh plowed ground so that the crop can be planted immediately with no soil packing or extra expense for fuel
