

## Village Council and Township Board Discuss Ordinance, Zoning Monday Eve

### Hawks Whip Bad Axe in Opening Round of Tourney

Cass City moved into the second round of district tournament play Wednesday night with an impressive win over Bad Axe, 78-56.

The Hawks moved out in front early in the first period and were never behind during the game. They scored 10 straight points in the first quarter, before Bad Axe broke the ice with a free throw.

Cass City's defense was so effective that it held the Hatchets without a field goal in the opening quarter. The Hawks widened their margin in the first half of the second quarter and led Bad Axe 30-12 before Coach Irv Clasenman flooded the floor with reserves.

With the most of the first five on the bench, Bad Axe quickly started closing the gap and found the range for enough points to outscore the Hawks in the second quarter to bring the half-time score to 32-22.

Bad Axe came the closest to Cass City early in the third period when they closed the margin to six points.

But the Hawks rallied to bring the margin to nine points at the close of the quarter and then go on for a one-sided victory.

By virtue of their win, the Hawks won the right to face Sandusky in the second round of the tourney tonight (Friday).

Members of the Elkland Township board and the village council held a joint meeting Monday evening at the Municipal Building in Cass City to discuss the passing of an ordinance to prohibit junk yards from springing up on the approaches to the village.

The proposed ordinance would prohibit starting of a junk yard or of having an existing concern branch out into a junk yard within 1,000 feet of main highways, churches or cemeteries in Elkland Township.

In addition, all such businesses would require a license from the township board before it was passed.

The board expressed general agreement with the ordinance, but Supervisor Evard Rawson said that he thought a lawyer's opinion on the enforceability of the ordinance should be secured before the township passed the law.

The village will send the ordinance to the Michigan Municipal League for examination.

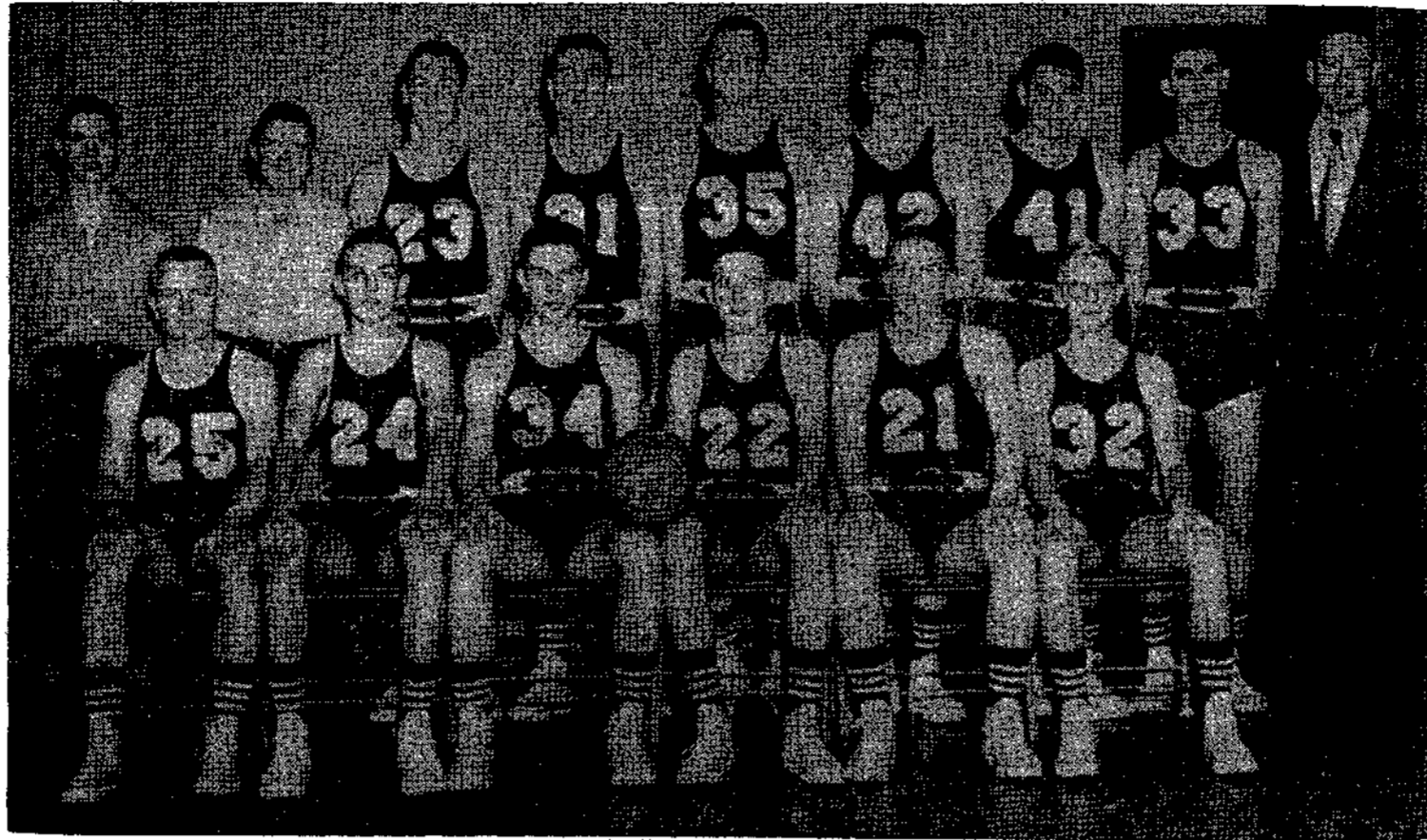
**Zoning Problem.**  
While discussing the ordinance, members present briefly discussed zoning of Elkland Township.

While most members present agreed that zoning was desirable, Supervisor Rawson said that he felt that it was not his duty to go to the people with zoning.

When residents of the township seek zoning from the board, the board will start the complicated procedure of zoning, Mr. Rawson said.

## Bauer Appoints Two Committees Monday

President James Bauer appointed two committees at the regular meeting of the Cass City Village Council held Monday evening at the Municipal Building.

Both committees are new. The first of the committees will deal with major changes and plans in the village in 1955. C. R. Hunt, Arlan Hartwick and Andrew Bigelow were appointed. They will study problems and make recommendations at the next meeting.

President Bauer, B. F. Benkelman and Warren Wood will form a committee to discuss sewage disposal with the Wesley Milk Company.

The council set March 14 as the date for the annual village election and voted to hire the same election board that has served in previous years.

William Day and Roy Taylor were appointed to serve on the board of review for the village on Thursday, March 10.

The council discussed the erection of a building for Ground Observers in Cass City. Two sites were under consideration. After examining the feasibility of placing the building on the hill in the northwestern section of the city, the trustees decided that it would be more practical at the village park.

According to members of the Ground Observers' Corps, the building will cost the village about \$1,200. Some thought was given by the trustees to erecting the structure in conjunction with the Gavel Club, as part of a new broadcasting booth at the field.

After lengthy discussion, the council instructed Clerk Wilma Fry to write the Ground Observers' Corps to meet with the council with plans of the proposed building for further study.

## 700 Attend Pipe Company's Open House in Gagetown

An estimated 700 persons from the area took advantage of Michigan Pipe Company's open house off Sunday to see the newest addition to the industrial development of this area.

Members of the company were on hand to conduct visitors through the plant and explain the operation of the concern.

# Hawks Post Perfect Conference Record

Cass City scored an impressive victory over Bad Axe Friday evening at the Cass City gym to complete the regular season for both teams. The score was 62-52.

The victory gave the Hawks an undefeated record in conference competition and a season's record of 14 wins and two defeats.

Coach Irv Clasenman changed his style of play for the Bad Axe game. Because of the height advantage Bad Axe enjoyed with big Larry Essenmacher at center, the Hawks played a more controlled ball offense than they have in previous games.

After three quick buckets by Larry, the Hawks took control of the game for the remainder of the opening period.

Playing smooth ball, Cass City ran up an 18-10 lead in the first quarter.

Both teams played about even in the second period. The Hatchets managed to chop off two points from the Cass City margin and the score was 32-26 at the half.

Bad Axe staged a rally in the third period, similar to the one they staged in the first meeting of the two teams. They overcame the Hawk lead and at one time moved two points in front of the Hawks. At the end of the period the score was knotted at 40-40.

## Detroit Concern Low Bidder for Sewer Addition

Friedrich and Company of Detroit was awarded the contract for constructing the addition to the sewage disposal plant in Cass City Thursday, Feb. 24, when the company's bid was the lowest of seven submitted.

Friedrich's bid was \$149,980—\$6,700 lower than the second bid of \$156,680, submitted by the A. T. Barnes Construction Company, of Cass City.

The Barnes' bid was one of three submitted by Cass City construction companies. The C. R. Hunt Company placed a bid of \$157,789.83 and the Shaw Construction Co. bid \$159,641.

Other bids received were: Miller-Thompson Company of Detroit, \$159,000; Booms Construction Company of Harbor Beach, \$169,352; and The Taber Company of Grand Rapids, \$170,000.

After all the bids were opened, the council accepted the bid by Friedrich. According to present plans, construction will begin in May and the project is expected to be completed by next February.

Estimates by the village engineers ran at about \$168,000 for the complete job and a bond issue was voted by Cass City residents for that amount last fall.

The addition to the sewage plant will enlarge Cass City's facilities to handle up to 2,500 persons.

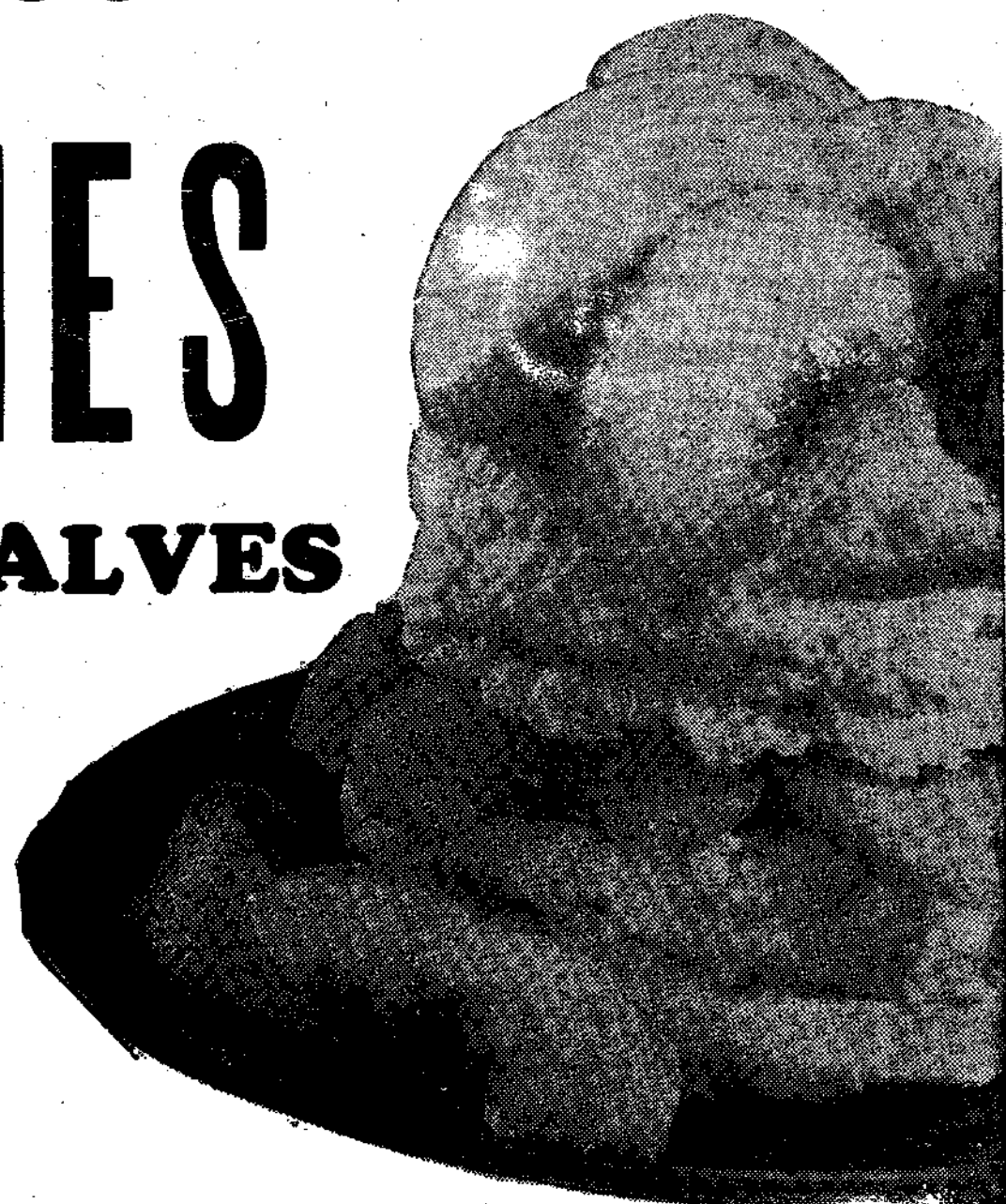

# Clean Up to Avert Costly Farm Fires

A little time spent now in cleaning up the attic, basement, barn and other outbuildings may prevent a costly fire, suggests Quentin R. Ostrander, Tuscola County assistant agricultural agent.

He passes along this advice from safety specialists at Michigan State College:

Remove from the attic, closet and basement those things that burn fast.

Watch especially for oily rags, old paint brushes and open containers of flammable paint, thinners and cleaning fluids.

Take care of defective, sooty and rusty stovepipes and cracked and poorly constructed chimneys.

Repair broken and damaged lightning rods and poor ground connections.

Be sure that gasoline, kerosene, other inflammable liquids and explosives are stored in a safe place. Never use glass containers for flammable liquids.

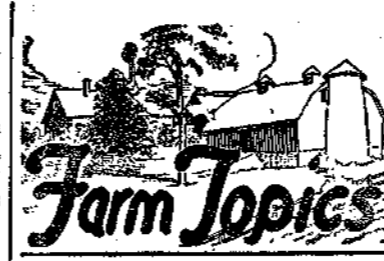
Don't store wet hay in barns. That's a cause of fire, too, unless you can artificially dry it.

Don't use unsafe wiring, overloaded circuits, worn or frayed cords and defective electrical appliances. Replacing them is a good investment.

Remove dry brush, weeds, grass and other trash along roadsides and near buildings. Take care of standing dead trees or limbs that may cause accidents or fires.

Don't burn debris, trash and other hazardous waste materials outdoors on dry, windy days, or close to buildings.

# Farmland Acreage Steadily Shrinking Existing Crop Lands Must Produce More

Farm economists report that America's farm land acreage is steadily shrinking.

These specialists say this is due to the increasing use of big acreages for the construction of super highways and toll roads, for defense and industrial plants, airports, military reservations, flood control and game conservation projects.

Noting this trend, H. C. M. Case, head of University of Illinois' agricultural economics department, recently said, "It's about time we took a long look at our future needs for land."

He points out that every time a two-lane highway parallels a railroad, a strip of land 412 feet wide is frequently taken for the combined use. This means 50 acres used for every mile. One strip the entire length of Illinois would represent 120 farms of 160 acres each.

Corn Belt agronomists point out that most of the nation's profitable farm land is already under crop. This means, they say, that every acre of existing crop land must do a bigger production job to feed the steadily growing U. S. population which is expected to reach 200 million by 1975.

This bigger crop producing job can be done, they say, by: 1—Building the soil's crop feeding power with balanced supplies of nutrients provided by commercial fertilizer; 2—Improving soil tilth, drainage and aeration by regular additions of organic matter by plowing under legume grass crops and by adding fertilizer to corn stalks and other crop residues that are turned under.

## Swine Bulletins Now Available at Extension Office

Some tips on saving all the baby pigs your sows farrow are contained in a new Michigan State College folder. Swine raisers can pick one up free at the county extension office at Caro, reports assistant agricultural agent, Quentin R. Ostrander.

The folder is called "Farrowing Time Tips," authored by MSC animal husbandmen, the publication gives advice about preparing the sow and pen for farrowing, how to take care of the pigs after they are born, what to feed the sow before and after farrowing, and tips on equipment that helps save all the pigs.

Another new bulletin "Controlling Swine Parasites" is also available, Ostrander stated.

## New Angle of Attack For Cattle Grubs

Veterinary scientists, searching for better ways to control cattle grubs, have come up with another new angle of attack.

Research veterinarians of the U. S. Department of Agriculture have reported encouraging results with daily intake of phenothiazine during the months when heel flies deposit eggs on the legs of cattle. The drugs are absorbed into the animal's blood stream so they can attack grubs before extensive damage is done.

Treated cattle averaged some 80 per cent fewer grubs than untreated animals, and some were completely free of infestation.

Grubs are the larvae of the heel fly and burrow into the animal from eggs deposited on the hide by the adult fly. After living within cattle several months, they puncture their way out again, usually through the back, and in so doing cost the livestock industry millions of dollars every year in damaged hides and prime meat cuts.

Some success in cattle grub control also has been reported with drug injections which accomplish much the same results as the feeding program.

# MICHIGAN MIRROR NEWS BRIEFS

The lives of three minority political parties in Michigan will be at stake in Lansing March 9.

For years they have been placing themselves on the Michigan ballot by petition—one per cent of the signatures of the vote cast for the last successful candidate for Secretary of State.

Their fight for existence came about after Michigan election experts proposed a series of reforms to cut the size of the ballot and make the entire system more compact and efficient.

Before the legislature is a bill raising the number of signatures required from one per cent to 7 1/2 per cent.

"That would wipe us out and these people know it," said a leader in the Socialist-Labor party.

Besides the Socialist-Workers party, the Prohibitionists and the Socialist-Labor parties are concerned with the proposal.

If passed, it would leave the Republican and Democratic parties as the only two on the state ballot. The experts claim

the cutback to two parties would save 40 per cent on ballot and election costs.

Spokesmen for the minority parties point to the almost-ignored voices in history which pleaded for the United States to cast off from England and the small band of Abolitionists.

Both finally were successful though they started from small beginnings and were considered a trifle eccentric at times.

Decisions meaning life or death for the three parties are expected shortly after the March 9 hearing, which will also consider a number of other major election reforms.

Michigan Democrats are planning great things for Gov. Williams, the state's first four-term chief executive.

Ottawa and Muskegon counties forthrightly urged him to try for the party's nomination for president in 1956 in their Democratic conventions.

They revived the timetable other party faithfuls drafted for Williams in 1952 during a favor-

rite son boom for his nomination at the Democratic convention in Chicago.

At the time, the plan was for Williams to seek the seat in the U. S. Senate, putting him in the 1956 convention with two years left in his senatorial term.

They figured he could either win the nomination or still stay in the public eye as a senator.

But Williams chose to try for a fourth term as governor, and he won, taking in his entire slate with him.

The timetable was altered but only slightly. Williams can now be placed in the 1956 convention at the end of his fourth term as governor. His record of being chief executive eight years in a Republican state is a valuable sales point.

Democrats will look at the 1954 election results and disclaim that Michigan is still Republican.

But the idea that Williams, with his bow ties and aplomb when crowning queens and calling square dances, is the man who tipped the state over politically will carry weight next year.

While his supporters are ready to move into the ranks of cheerleaders, Williams is quiet about the future—letting each day take care of itself, with his help.

Political seers, however, are finding significance in Williams' willingness to make speeches in Topeka, Kan., Chicago and other spots—north, south, east and west.

Who will be Williams' successor, if and when?

Insiders are watching Lt. Gov. Philip A. Hart, the personable former U. S. District Attorney in Detroit, later legal advisor to Williams.

Hart proved last fall he is an energetic campaigner and is getting his feet firmly planted in state issues as president of the Senate.

Drug addicts are getting special attention from the state these days.

Three years ago, after the legislature set up stringent new laws against dope peddlers and their agents, law enforcement officers said the move drove big operations out of the state.

But there remains a debris of victims, 5,000 of them in the Detroit area alone; hundreds of others spread throughout Michigan.

A legislative investigating committee has asked for a supplement to a law passed last year which defined addicts as sick persons rather than criminals.

Senator Harold M. Ryan (D-Detroit), chairman of the committee, made public findings which recommended that the state establish a hospital for narcotics addicts. He said:

"We recognize alcoholics and their problems with a special commission. This is the least we can do for drug addicts. The commission for the drug addicts would be assigned to make plans for getting a hospital to treat these unfortunates."

# Hogs Important to Farmers' Income

Almost two-thirds of the nation's farms now depend on hogs for part of their income, according to figures cited today by the American Foundation for Animal Health.

In the north central states, almost three-fourths of the farms raise some hogs while in Iowa the percentage climbs to 85 per cent, according to the Foundation.

Between 10 and 12 per cent of the national farm income comes from the sale of swine, the study continues. More than 86 million hogs were slaughtered during 1953, making an average of 67 to 70 pounds of pork for each person in the nation. Pork also provided 50 per cent of the total meat consumed in the country and swine are the greatest single outlet for farm-raised grains.

It was also noted by the Foundation that during the past five years, a larger percentage of hogs were vaccinated against hog cholera than in any previous year. In 1953, more than 55 per cent of the total swine production in the nation was vaccinated, the Foundation reports.
