James Porter, extension soil scientist at Michigan State College, points out that it's up to each farmer to decide whether the topdressing will pay for the plants ruined if you wait too long.

Typically, soil tests show a need for such grades as 0-10-20 on sandy soil, 0-20-20 on loams, and 0-20-10 on the heavy clay ground. Porter suggests using about 200 to 300 pounds of the topdressing fertilizer per acre 'per year.

Michigan Mirror News Briets

Michigan voters will be asked April 4 to install in the state constitution a plan to help local school districts finance new buildings with a \$100,000,000 bond issue.

It was written by educators who know the potential problems and enacted by legislators who were convinced it existed.

Clair L. Taylor, superintendent of public instruction, called schoolmen together last fall for a try at solving the crisis on a statewide basis and the proposal is the result. Taylor said:

"The legislature is to be complimented for putting the proposal on the ballot. If approved by the voters, it will help the most seriously distressed school districts and help education."

Taylor painted a picture frightening to lawmakers: The state will need 2,000 more class-

rooms a year for the next five years to handle an increased enrollment of 70,000 new students annually.

School financing in Michigan has always been a local problem, with a lift from the state sales tax diversion, and legislators feared any further involvement would jeopardize local control.

But, they heard of the school districts on the fringes of metropolitan areas where new subdivisions will quadruple enrollments in some districts next year and engulf local financing plans.

They were told of half-day sessions in crowded schools, the overload of students on teachers.

After several conferences, the proposal—drafted first in Oakland County—was shipped into the legislature under the sponsorship of Senator William S.

Broomfield (R-Royal Oak). It first called for a \$200,000,000 bond issue, but educators agreed that half that amount would be enough for emergency money.

Here's how it will work: School districts facing a classroom crisis will be forced to levy up to 18 mills in school taxes for buildings. If the need is greater, the system begins to work.

Districts will certify their needs to the state and get approval to go on building. Anything that cannot be covered by the local 18-mill tax will be picked up by the state.

The state fund will be used to make annual payments of principal and interest on the local school bonds. The proposal also would pledge the full faith and credit of the state behind the local bond issues to obtain lower interest rates.

School districts also would be permitted to use the state funds to re-finance existing bond issues, cutting interest rates on which they are now paying.

To get the state's money back, the districts would be required to continue the 18-mill levy after their needs drop below that point, using the excess over a 30-year period to repay the state. Taylor said:

"We want to educate our children, a right they have by being Americans. That, we hope, is one of the answers to the problem."

He said the \$100,000,000 "probably" would not be all used and that the first year's lending program would affect 46 districts, most of the southeastern section of the state, and the first year's loans would approximate \$3,000,000.

Democrats in the Senate finally got a home of their own. It is the first-floor office in the capitol building formerly occupied by Grand Army of the Republic records and one secretary. The office has been moved to other quarters.

For years, Senate Democrats have complained that a third-floor caucus room is a little snug for two desks, two secretaries, a filing cabinet, an electric heater and 11 Democrats.

Last year, Lt. Gov. Clarence A. Reid, a Republican, invited the minority party to use his office, a spacious, carpeted room on the second floor.

Lt. Governor Philip A. Hart, a Democrat new this year, issued the same invitation, just to be bi-partisan.

But when the GAR office was moved, the Democrats were waiting. The room now is brilliantly lighted, has a tile floor, three desks and plenty of room for Democrats and a few visitors, occasionally.

There's only one complaint now: There is no way to install a loud speaker from the Senate like other rooms have and the secretaries must rely on telephones for information from the Senate.

"This is better than nothing, though, and almost better than anything," said Senator Charles S. Blundy (D-Detroit), minority floor leader.

Cupid had his day in the legislature, with a bill to cut the waiting period between obtaining a marriage license and the wedding from five to three days.

Senator Carlton H. Morris (R-Kalamazoo) sponsored the bill. "Young people have problems, too," he said.

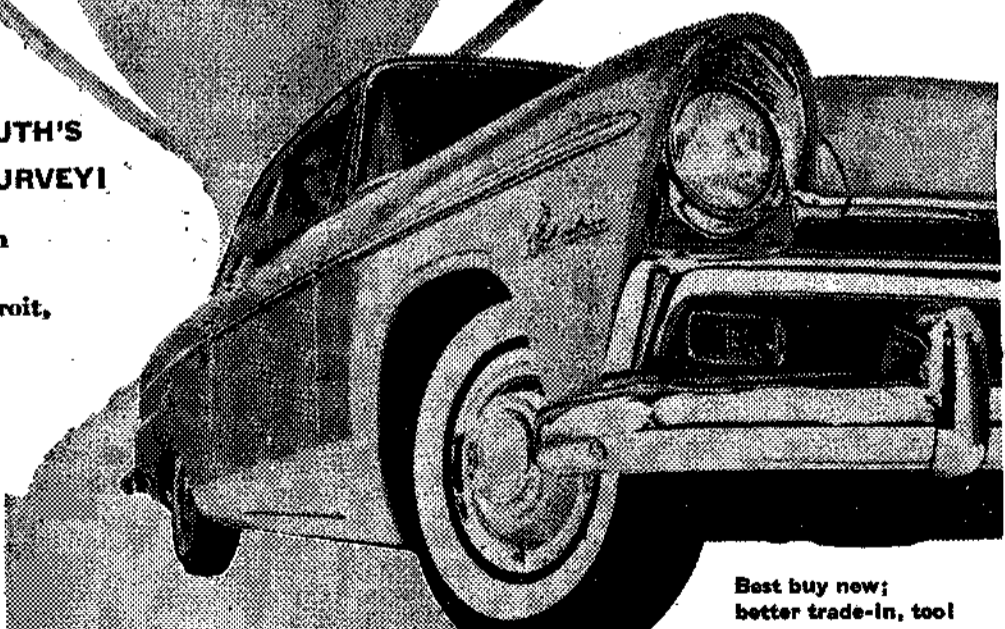

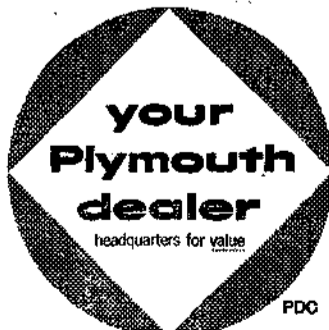
