

LICENSING OF JUNK YARDS

Whareas, Act number 12 of the Public Acts of 1929, for the State of Michigan (19.731 to 19.732, Michigan Statutes Annotated) authorizes townships to provide for the licensing of junk yards and places for dismantling automobiles; the anneal license fees and to adopt rules, regulations and conditions for the operation thereof; and

Whereas, the Township Board of the Township of Elkland, Tuscola County, Michigan, desires to regulate and license junk yards and places for dismantling automobiles;

Now, Therefor, the Township Board of the Township of Elkland, Tuscola County, Michigan, in meeting assembled this 14th day of March, 1956, resolves to adopt the following for the licensing of junk dealers and junk yards and places for the dismantling, wrecking and disposing of the junk and/or refuse material of automobiles in the Township of Elkand, except therefrom the Village limits of the Village of Cass City, namely:





For years, Senate Democrats have complained that a thirdfloor caucus room is a little snug for two desks, two secretaries, a filing cabinet, an electric heater and 11 Democrats.


