

## Union Asks for Salary Hike from Road Commission

Union employees of the Tuscola County Road Commission have submitted a formal request to the Commission for a 10 cents per hour wage increase and improved sick leave allowance, authorities for Local number 1330 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees said this week.

In the formal statement, the union said that average hourly rates paid in the seven counties in the Saginaw Valley and Thumb areas is \$1.65 per hour. County employees now receive an average wage of \$1.45.

Another request by the union is a change in payment for sickness. The present sick and accident insurance starts payment on the fourth day of absence and the employees can use part of their six-day vacation allowance for sick leave.

The union is demanding an additional four days' allowance for combined sick and annual leave.

Authorities for the road commission said that no action is being taken on the request at the present time.

They said that no list of the members of the organization has been turned into the office and they do not know how many employees the union represents.

Many of the county employees belong to their own county organization, they said, and are not represented by the AF of L.

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## Two Important County Roads to Be Black-topped

The Michigan State Highway Department will accept bids Wednesday, May 25, on two important farm-to-market roads in Tuscola County.

A 20-foot-wide bituminous aggregate surface will be placed for 2.7 miles on Dickerson Road from the village of Colling to the village of Colwood. The work will be an extension of the road which received black-top last year from M-25 to Colling.

The second project in the county will be for 6.4 miles of 20-foot-wide bituminous aggregate on Deckerville Road from M-81 easterly. The road is an important link from Deford to Caro.

Both of the projects will be paid for by Tuscola County. Completion date for both projects is Sept. 1.

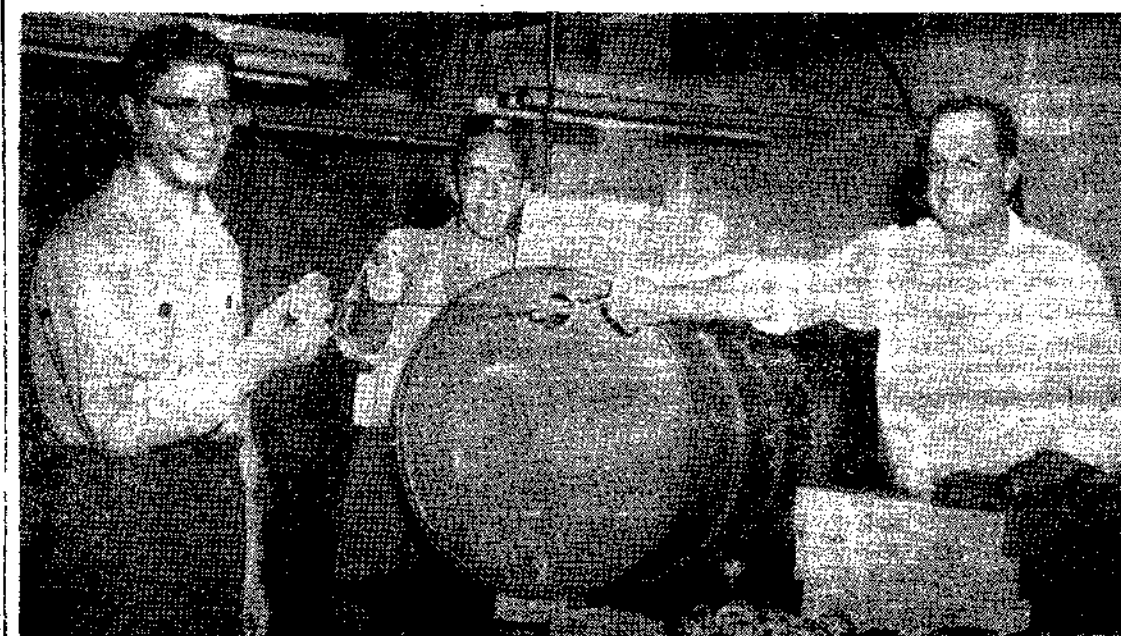

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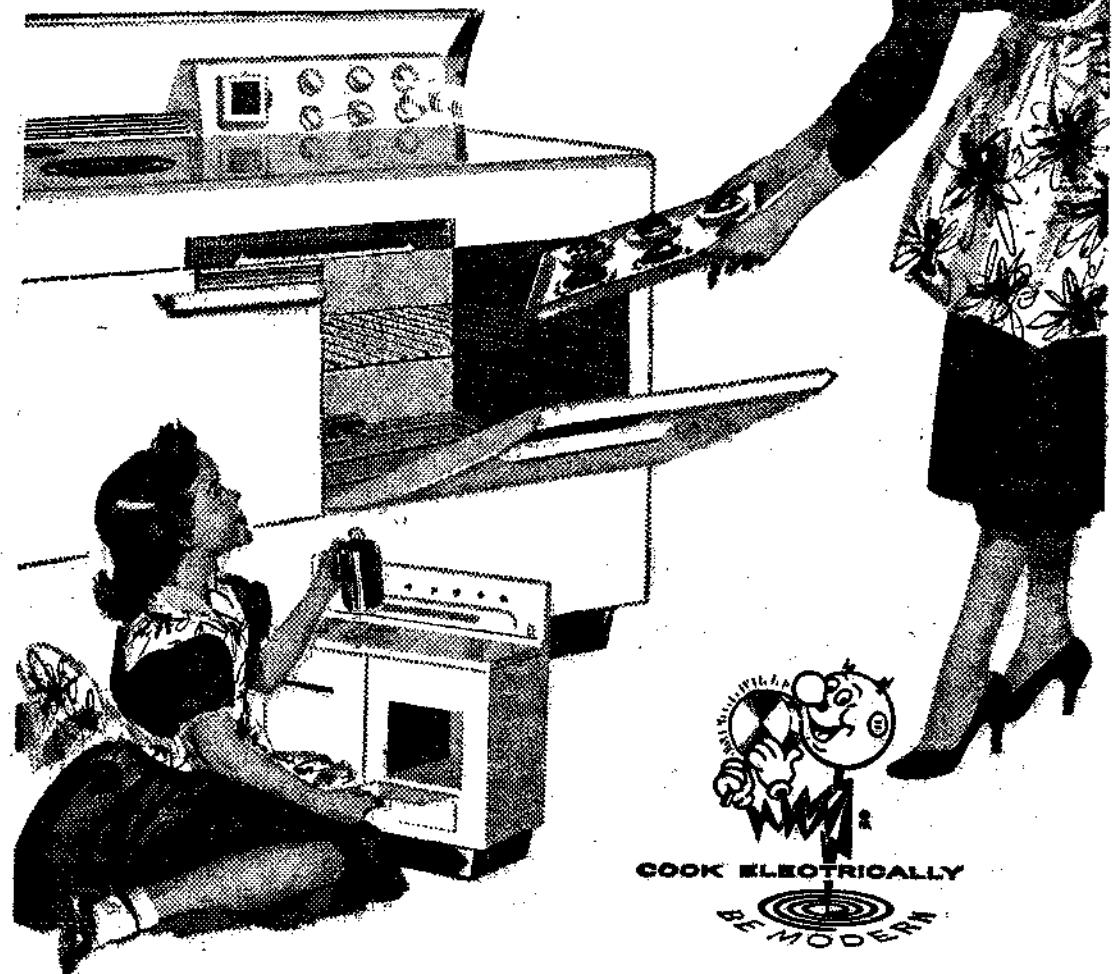

**Good Hog Pastures Increases Profit**  
Hogs like good pasture and should be placed on them as soon as possible and left there all season long if pasture is good. Good swine grazing can save up to 15% in grain and from 15% to 20% in protein supplement feeding, says Don R. Kebler, assistant county agricultural agent at large.

Harry Moxley, an extension animal husbandman at Michigan State College, points out that clean pastures help control roundworm troubles and reduce the dangers of necro (necrotic enteritis) and little pig anemia. It means fewer runs, too. Moxley gave these other tips:

Wet ground pastures should be well sodded before turning pigs on it. Ring them to prevent rooting damage. An acre of good pasture will carry 20 or more hogs from weaning until market, when they're on a self feeder fattening ration. Ladino on good soil can't be beat for good hog pasture, and hogs like it.

Temporary grazing for hogs can be done on rape or a mixture of oats and rape. It's available in early June and lasts until late fall.

Hogs don't like excessive woody growth so pastures should be grazed down or clipped. Other livestock should give hogs assistance in keeping it down if hogs can't do it alone. Big and rank rape is partly responsible for sun scald of light colored hogs, especially in wet, hot seasons. So clip pasture and provide shade if trees are not around. Be sure there is plenty of fresh water handy and in or close to the shade along with feeders.

**MICHIGAN MIRROR NEWS BRIEFS**

Economy in government is fine for those who can afford it.

That was the tenor of complaints as the legislature went into the "Battle of the Budget" for 1955-56 juggling figures for the current year.

The totals: Republicans want to cut Gov. Williams' budget from \$292 million to \$287 million. They figure they'll need between \$14 million and \$28 million in new taxes.

On paper, the situation doesn't add. Some believe existing taxes will yield more next year, others say the budget will be more to cover deficiencies and extra expenses.

Each year when the battle to make income and spending come out even begins, there are complaints.

Taxpayers assert the load is already too heavy and the state agencies say they are being impaired in their functions for lack of money to operate them.

"It is to be expected," said Rep. Joseph E. Warner, (R-Ypsilanti), chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee.

Republicans on the Senate appropriations committee drew the first fire by reducing the budget of Michigan State College and ruling out the self-liquidating building program.

The State Board of Agriculture complained officially in a special emergency meeting.

Chairman Clark Brody said that "the quality of instruction will be impaired" if the budget cuts were not restored and that the building program would be needed to handle the expected influx of students.

Budget proposals ruled out specifically Michigan State's attempt to get a VHF television

channel for educational purposes through a link with a commercial station.

For the next few weeks, the legislature will hear the details—in letters, telegrams, public hearings.

Department of mental health was the second with complaints of cutbacks. Republicans pointed out that the budget was not cut, but actually increased from last year.

Charles F. Wagg, director of the department, said there will be more than 1,100 new mental patients next year and that the budget—some \$4,000,000 more than last year—will not cover new programs.

The committee approved \$175,000 for mental health research at the University of Michigan, a major project, but there were complaints that the money did not go elsewhere.

Taxpayers will also have their inning.

Gov. Williams' proposed corporation profits tax, estimated to yield \$101,000,000 a year, is dead in committee. It will stay there unless resurrected at the last minute as an amendment.

The only major tax proposals now before the legislature are versions of the \$30,000,000 a year business receipts tax.

It is one of the handiest in years—those who pay the tax wrote it into bill for passage by the legislature. There have been few complaints.

"It's a good tax with a broad base a high yield and a minimum of controversy," said Senator Carlton H. Morris (R-Kalamazoo), chairman of the Senate taxation committee.

When the legislative session ends June 3, the issues will be settled. In the meantime anyone

### Bang's Disease Still Costly to Farmers

Brucellosis (Bang's disease) is costing the livestock farmers of Tuscola County a lot of money. The disease takes a \$100 million toll every year nationally, points out Alfred Ballweg, county agricultural agent.

Dairy herds in this county may lose as much as 22 per cent of their milk production and up to a 40 per cent cut in the calf crop, he asserts.

To the beef cattle farmer the loss is serious because he has to rely on the calf crop. The calf loss to the dairyman is also serious because, on the average, he replaces his entire herd every four years. With such a heavy loss, he would be forced to buy replacements.

In addition to these drastic losses, brucellosis may cause temporary or permanent sterility in infected animals, notes George Parsons, Michigan State College extension dairyman.

One out of five infected animals will become permanently sterile and must be sold for slaughter, it is estimated.

The disease in a herd of livestock means a boost in veterinary bills. So it is becoming increasingly difficult for the owner of a brucellosis-infected herd to compete successfully with a man who owns a disease-free, healthy herd.

Pabst Farms recently shipped a three-quarter maternal brother of Robel to Japan for use in one of that country's largest and best herds. Robel should be fine addition to the Carpenter's good herd, where he succeeds another sire of Pabst breeding, now in Artificial Breeders Association stud at Michigan State College.
