Good Hog Pastures Increases Profit

Hogs like good pasture and should be placed on them as soon as possible and left there all season long if pasture is good. Good swine grazing can save up to 15% in grain and from 15% to 20% in protein supplement feeding, says Don R. Kebler, assistant county agricultural agent at

Harry Moxley, an extension animal husbandman at Michigan State College, points out that clean pastures help control roundworm troubles and reduce the dangers of necro (necrotic enteritis) and little pig anemia. It means fewer runts, too. Mox-

ley gave these other tips: Wet ground pastures should be well sodded before turning pigs on it. Ring them to prevent rooting damage. An acre of good pasture will carry 20 or more hogs from weaning until market, when they're on a self feeder fattening ration. Ladino on good soil can't be beat for good hog pasture, and hogs like it.

Temporary grazing for hogs an be done on rape or a mixture of oats and rape. It's available in early June and lasts until late

Hogs don't like excessive woody growth so pastures should be grazed down or clipped. Other livestock should give hogs assistance in keeping it down if hogs can't do it alone. Big and rank rape is partly responsible for sun scald of light colored hogs, especially in wet, hot seasons. So clip pasture and provide shade if trees are not around. Be sure there is plenty of fresh water handy and in or close to the shade along with feeders.

New Method of Planting Corn Gaining Favor

Corn growers in Tuscola County can get on the minimum-tillage bandwagon started by a couple of southwestern Michigan farmers, claims agricultural

agent Alfred Ballweg. In that part of the state the 'wheel track" method of planting corn is spreading rapidly. The new taxes. number of farmers using the method has snowballed rapidly. Some will be using the system for the second and third year.

Originators of the system are of Van Buren County. This is the penses. seventh year since they sold their harrowing equipment.

Here's how "wheel planting works: Plow deep fust ahead of planting, then without any disking or dragging, plant the corn on the plow furrows. To prepare a solid seedbed for the corn, they pull their 2-row planters with small tractors with wheels set in so the planter shoes run in the wheel tracks.

Leyton Nelson, Michigan State farm crops specialist, claims the idea has spread with good success all the way from Ohio to Iowa. The only stumbling blocks Nelson points out are that the two-row planter is slower than the usual four-row type and it's sometimes hard to keep the plow less than a half-day ahead of the planter.
