### Tricks for Getting Good Grass Silage

The two most important factors of getting the most out of your pasture seeding are blooming date and moisture content, says assistant county agricultural agent, Don R. Kebler.

Jim Hays, extension dairy specialist, suggests the following ideas for making good grass silage:

The proper bloom for an alfalfa-brome-ladino mixture depends on the amount of grass in the seeding. If there is little grass, it should be cut when the alfalfa is at about half bloom. If the field is grassy, cut when the alfalfa starts to bloom.

No wilting is necessary to make good grass silage unless it is cut when too wet. Grab a handful of silage and if you can squeeze juice from it then it is too wet. If you can't squeeze it at all, it is too dry. It should spring back slowly.

If the field is too wet when cut, you can let it wilt or use a conditioner to absorb moisture such as molasses or ground corn. Sodium metabisulfite at the rate of 8 to 10 pounds per green ton of hay is easy to apply. Figure a green ton of hay as 100 cubic feet of box space. However, it is best to try to get along without wilting or conditioning by cutting the field at the right time.

Timely Tips For The Week.

(1) Red clover seed yield can be doubled by making first cutting into hay in June and second crop for seed.

(2) The loose smut in our wheat is a carry-over from the previous season. This fungus is inside the seed and can't be killed by the same treatment used on stinking smut, which is on outside crease or brush of wheat grain. Therefore, this presence of loose smut is not due to faulty seed treatment.

(3) Moisture meter is recommended for irrigation systems.

(4) The feeding and weighing of your lambs now may help you to top out a few lambs before the end of July. It is very possible for you to sell an 80-pound choice fat lamb, before the end of July, for as much as a 90-pounder later in the fall.

(5) MSC pageant will be presented daily and on four evenings from August 15-20. This is a once in a lifetime affair, so plan on seeing it.

(6) Now is the time to spray for apple maggots. Use 2 pounds of arsenate of lead plus a safening agent of either 1 pound of captan or 1/2 pound of ferbam. This will protect from 10 to 14 days for each application.

Even then, the old law of supply and demand hadn't been repealed. Cars sold easily, but there were fewer to sell. Now, there are lots of cars, but you work harder to move them.

Sure, there were used car dealers in those days who cleaned up. But then as now the basic rules of the new car dealers remain.

A new car dealer like ourselves is in the used car business only to make it easier to sell new cars, to provide a market and an incentive for people to trade. The rule of thumb is that you make NO money out of the used car side of the business.

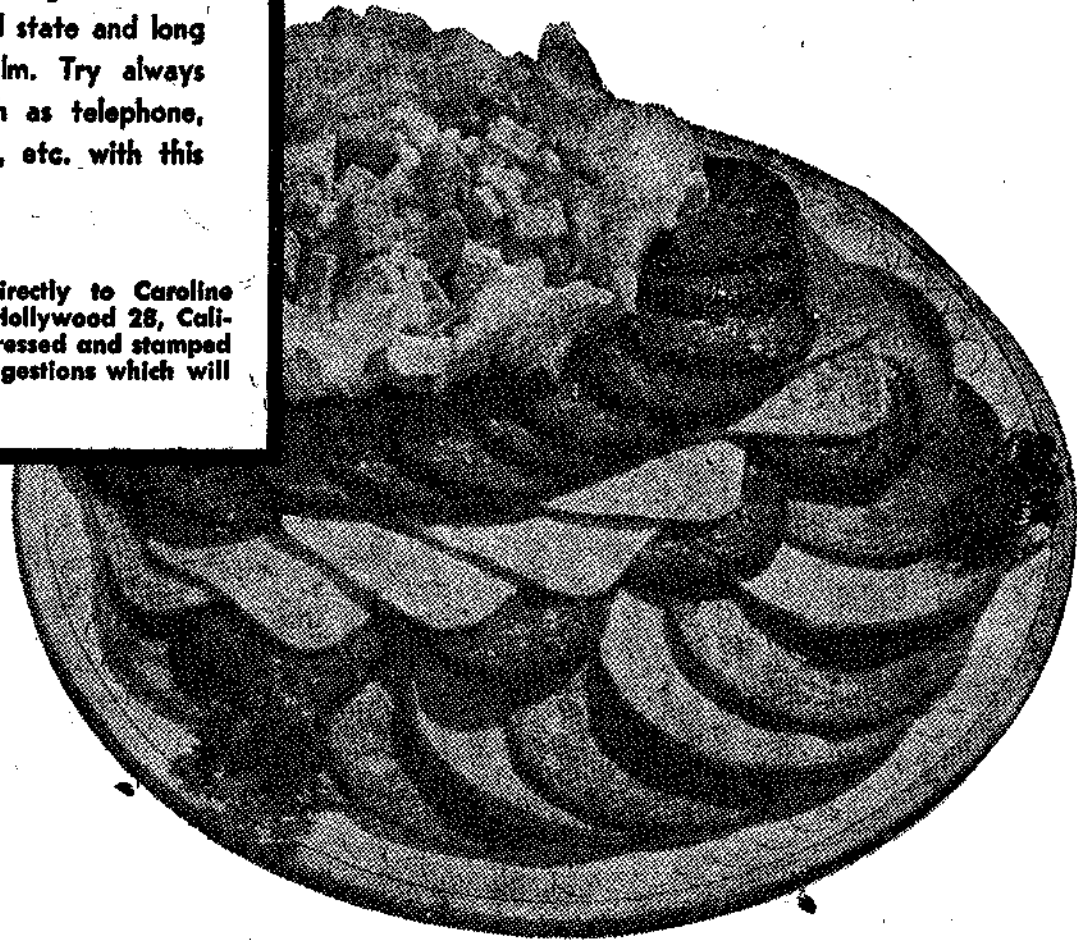

### MICHIGAN MIRROR NEWS BRIEFS

Tourists are pouring back into Michigan for the 1955 season among Michigan's 11,000 lakes in the rich resort areas which are enjoying increased prosperity after last year's decline.

It's a \$50 million a year business for the state and a healthy flow of tax dollars for the state treasury.

Robert J. Furlong, executive secretary of the Michigan Tourist Council, predicted that a 10 per cent decline in dollar volume last year will be erased before fall.

the summer. These are areas where tourists can camp and swim and fish and relax, free or for small registration fees.

Major park project this year will be continuance of work on Sterling State Park on Lake Erie.

Parents are asked to help the Michigan Liquor Control Commission enforce the law against teen-age drinking.

Chairman Frank Blackford said that increased penalties against tavern owners and package liquor dealers have not cut down measurably on the problem.

"We must get the cooperation of parents or we will fail to meet the problem," he said.

Enforcement officers note a general increase in under-age drinking every spring and have cracked down with legal weapons in state laws, but, until now, there has been a loophole.

One state law forbids a minor from possessing liquor in a car. Officers say youths hold their parties in parks. The law does not apply unless a minor and liquor are found together, in a car.

The 1955 legislature gave officers another weapon, a legal ban on possession, in or outside a car. Blackford said the new law will help.

Stiffer penalties against licensees, up to 15 days suspension, an increase from the seven-day suspension, has not helped, he said.

"Now we've got to get help from the parents," he said. "There's a safety factor involved, too, as well as the fact that drinking by a minor is strictly against the law."
