Selection of replacement heifers and a sound breeding program depend greatly on keeping accurate records and studying them. Identification records are needed because all other records are of little value unless every animal is positively identified. You can identify animals by photographs, color markings, tattoos, chains around neck or horns, eartagging or branding.

Breeding records will help you get the most production from each cow. They help to make sure that each cow will have one calf a year. They also tell you when to dry up cows to give them a rest. Such records show the condition of the herd's breeding health, too. And don't forget about production records. To keep them, join a Dairy Herd Improvement Association.

matter, and can attack bean plants whenever soil conditions and weather become unfavorable or best growth of the bean

No effective control is known or this root rot, and no bean variety is resistant to any of the organisms. However, these organisms seem to thrive least well under conditions that are ideal for producing strong, vigorously growing beans. Therefore, the grower should do all he can to produce these favorable conditions. A rotation of at least four or five years is recommended, and the cropping system should include cereals (corn, oats, etc.) clover and alfalfa.

Under favorable bean growing conditions, rootlets may develop above the affected root and the plants produce an almost normal crop. It must be taken into account that these infested plants have been delayed and may not produce a mature crop in time to harvest. If the field is spotty with these infested plants, the main crop will be ready to combine before the others are mature.
