

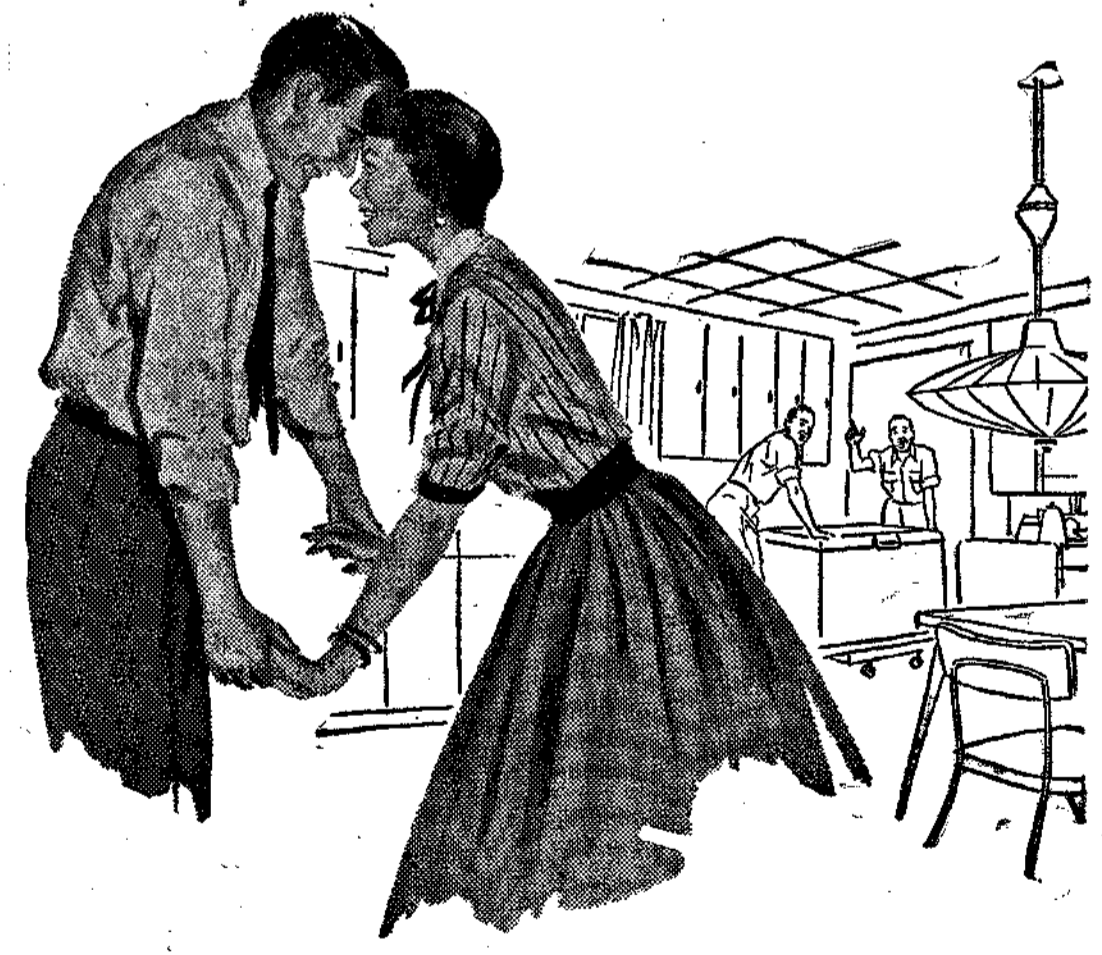

Standards Reported For Wheat Crop

The United States Department of Agriculture has announced revised sanitation standards for wheat in the 1955 price-support program.

Farmers who want to put wheat under the price-support program must have wheat that contains no more than two rodent pellets per pint, or comparable amounts of other contamination and contains no more than two per cent of kernels visibly damaged by insects.

Farm-stored wheat offered as security for price-support loans will be sample tested to see if it meets these minimum sanitation requirements. If it does not, it cannot be accepted as eligible for the loan.

The wheat must also meet the minimum sanitation requirements at the time it is delivered to Commodity Credit Corporation at the end of the loan period. If it does not, the CCC will sell it to the highest bidder for nonfood use and the settlement value will be at this sale price.
