Rules, regulations and prizes for the Junior Livestock Show to be held in conjunction with the sixth annual Cass City Home-coming are listed in the premium book that will be distributed to contestants.

Each year the show has grown a little larger and this year's event promises to be the largest in history, members of the committee in charge said.

Rules and prizes as offered in the book are given in full in this article.

1. Open to any boy or girl regularly enrolled in 4-H work or Vocational Agriculture. Animals must be shown by girl or boy owning same. All animals must be recorded in name of boy or girl exhibiting. Combination ownership will not be accepted. Grade dairy heifers of good type and from good milk producing ancestors are acceptable and encouraged.

2. Exhibits will be judged and premiums awarded on the Group A, Group B, and Group C basis. The judge will have the privilege of creating a fourth group for exhibits not showing previous preparation for the show, but no premiums will be awarded in this group.

3. If, in the opinion of the judge, an exhibit does not merit a Group A rating, the judge has the privilege of starting with the group he decides upon.

4. Exhibits are to be on the grounds by 9:00 a. m. the day of the show. Will remain until 4:00 p. m. Furnish own straw and feed.

5. Advanced entry is required. Entries must be in one week prior o the date of the show. Send entries to -Alfred Goodall, Cass City, Michigan.

6. FFA and 4-H members entering exhibits shall be limited to one entry per class (with the exception that two steers may be entered) regardless of the fact that a boy or girl might have two similar projects—one in FFA and one in 4-H. You may not make an FFA entry in a class if you already have a 4-H entry in the same class and vice versa.




Dictate Food Prices

Present indications are that the cost of getting America's food from the farm to the consumer's table will keep on going-upwhich offers little hope that the farmer will get a better share of

the consumer's food dollar. The postwar climb of distribution costs has caused the drop in agricultural prices to be only partially reflected in grocery price tags. The farmer's share of the consumer's food dollar, in the meanwhile, dropped from 52

cents in early 1946 to 44 cents in early 1954. Thus, food worth 44 cents at the farm cost another 56 cents to move to the consumer's kitchen. From two-thirds to three-fourths

Bring Price Cuts Bulk handling of fertilizer is be-

coming increasingly popular with Michigan farmers, according to a Michigan State College survey. The survey showed that farmers

who have tried it are generally happy with bulk fertilizer-if they handle it themselves rather than have it spread. And they mentioned there are

no old bags to dispose of, no fertilizer lost from broken bags and less heavy lifting.

Most farmers who applied the bulk fertilizer with their own equipment drilled it in with small grain. Some have used it on cornboth drilled and checked-as top dressing on grass, on vegetable and small fruit crops and on orchards.

It was found that savings on liminating bags-and the bagging process-could be big. In one plant, labor costs per ton of fertilizer produced could be reduced from 93 cents to 23. And bags represent 5 per cent of the sale price.


Vernon L. Sorenson, MSC farm economist estimates that manufacturers could supply retailers with bulk fertilizer at a saving of from \$3.50 to \$4 a ton under the bagged kind.


