### Kingston Man Damages Bridge In Auto Crash

Samuel Villarreal, route two, Kingston, lost control of his pickup truck Saturday afternoon and rammed into the Cass River bridge, south of Cass City on Cemetery Road.

Mr. Villarreal, traveling south, was in the right of the bridge, breaking it in three places.

His truck, out of control, bounced off the girder and went through the bridge, stopping near the southern entrance.

According to Deputy William Schram, who investigated, Mr. Villarreal claimed that he swerved to avoid hitting a car traveling north when he lost control of the truck.

No trace of the other car has been found.

Mr. Villarreal was uninjured in the accident. His wife, Tilly, who was a passenger in the truck, suffered a bruise on her knee. The truck was completely demolished.

County employees have been working all week on the bridge, which was closed for traffic for a short period.

Cost of damage to the bridge has not yet been determined.

The 74th annual Tuscola County Fair will open Monday for a six-day stand, concluding Saturday night, according to Carl Mantey, secretary-manager.

All of the popular features of the fair are returning and many others have been added to attract what authorities believe will be an all-time record attendance.

Monday's features will be a free gate until 5 p. m. and a grandstand show at 2 p. m. for patients of the Tuscola County Infirmary and the state hospital at Wahjamega. At 7:30 p. m. Monday, the WLS barn dance will give their only grandstand performance.

Tuesday is kid's day as the youth of the county will be admitted free.

Youth exhibits will begin to be judged at 9 a. m.

The judging will continue throughout the fair. At 2 p. m. a free grandstand show has been arranged for children of school age. At 7:30 p. m. a 4-H and FFA livestock parade will attract the interest of spectators.

At 8 p. m. the first outdoor grandstand extravaganza will start. It will feature circus and hippodrome acts and will be seen nightly during the remainder of the fair.

Wednesday at 2 p. m. one of the outstanding features of the fair for many persons, harness racing, will start. Highlight of the evening program will be the "million dollar" livestock parade and return of 4-H and FFA champions.

Thursday at 2 p. m. six heats of harness racing will be the feature attraction of the day.

Friday will be the final day for harness racing, when the concluding six heats will be held. Feature of the evening program will be the crowning of the Tuscola County queen by Senator Charles E. Potter.

Saturday a parade of farm machinery and a precision drill team from Jackson will be the feature attractions of the afternoon. The drill team will do a repeat performance in the evening starting at 7:30 p. m.

As always, a giant midway has been provided for county residents who attend.

### Marlette Worker Killed in Railroad Crane Accident

Gordon McMann, 46, of Marlette was killed Tuesday afternoon when a railroad crane ran over him while he was operating an air hammer on the tracks, one and a half miles west of Clifford.

State Trooper David D. Swanson said the laborer fell beneath the car and across the track.

Joseph Hessling, Harbor Beach, narrowly avoided being hit by the crane when he jumped aside at the last moment when a worker shouted a warning. He was standing near McMann.

The crane was backing at about 10 to 15 miles an hour and the whistle was sounding as it moved, the operators told Trooper Swanson.

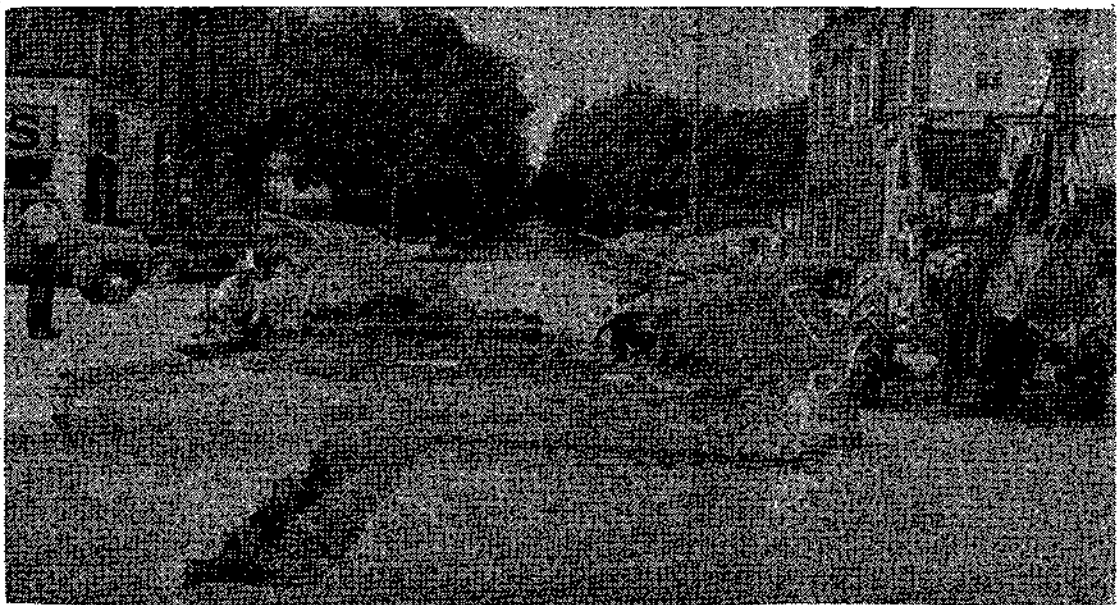
Wednesday, Aug. 10, they cracked Harry Hartwick for nine hits and three runs to take a 3-2 victory in an overtime eight-inning game.

### From the Editor's Corner

The Cass River bridge on Cemetery Road, south of Cass City, has long been a hazard for traffic. Periodically, an accident is reported as drivers misjudge the curves leading to both approaches.

As all area residents know, the bridge was not designed for modern day traffic and is a continual source of accidents.

Funds for a new bridge are not available now as the county continues to pour road money into hard-topping roads which, of course, is sound business practice. Hard-topping reduces maintenance and allows more funds to be diverted to new construction throughout the county.

However, when the road situation is well in hand and the Tuscola County Road Commission starts a campaign to repair bridges, we believe that the Cass bridge should be one of the structures to receive top priority.

Rumors have been circulating that a softball league will be revived in Cass City next year. Judging by the crowd at the Auten's-Lions game Wednesday night, we believe that the interest justifies the move.

Softball, run on a limited schedule, would probably hold the interest of the fans. If a league is formed that plays two nights a week instead of three, as it did when the league was discontinued, we believe that enough fans would attend to pay most of the expenses and sustain interest of the players.

### Name Ruggles Tuscola County Committeeman

Bruce Ruggles of Kingston is the new member of the Tuscola County Committee for the Farmers Home Administration. His appointment became effective July 1, the agency's acting county supervisor announced.

Mr. Ruggles succeeds Gustave Haas of Mayville, whose term on the 3-member committee expired this year.

Mr. Ruggles operates a 120-acre farm near Kingston and does general farming. He is president of 4-H Council and is a director of the SCS District.

The other two members of the committee are George W. Foster of Mayville and Harry Russell of Gagetown.

There is a Farmers Home Administration county committee in every agricultural county in the country. The committee determines the eligibility of applicants and helps the county supervisor adapt the agency's loan policies and services to local conditions. Each member is named for a 3-year term, and one appointment expires each year. A member completing his 3-year term cannot succeed himself. At least two of the members must be farmers.

The Farmers Home Administration makes loans to farmers to buy, improve, enlarge or operate efficient family-type farms. It also lends money to

Judge Bach denied a decree to either party in a contested case between Clara Frances Bulla and John C. Bulla.

The court said that neither party had shown that they were entitled to care for the minor child involved and that no benefit to the child would come from a divorce.

Lila M. Coons was given a divorce from Francis E. Coons. The maiden name of Lila M. Coons was restored to the former Mrs. Coons and a dollar granted in lieu of dower.

John G. Fritz, 70, petition for a modification of his divorce decree was granted. Mr. Fritz no longer can work because of ill health. ### Bean Field Day Slated August 25

A new bush bean will be shown at the annual bean field day at Saginaw August 25. The new bean will likely be released to certified seed growers in 1957, reports Alfred Ballweg, Tuscola County agricultural agent.

Site of the field event is the George Schenn elevator farm, two miles south of Saginaw on Sheridan Road. Sheridan Road is one mile east of M-18 and intersects M-46, or it may be reached by taking South Washington Road. The program is scheduled to start at 1:30 p. m.

Agent Ballweg says E. E. Down, bean breeder, and Axel Anderson, plant pathologist, both staff members at Michigan State University, will be on hand to bring visitors up to date on progress in pea (navy) bean breeding. Plots of bean plants resistant to anthracnose, plants resistant to Virus 15 and 3500 strains of plants resistant to both diseases will be open for inspection.

The new bush bean will be shown in four-row plots at two-row widths and two dates of planting. Other promising bush bean plants will be included in the four-row plots along with some of the best in the strains.

H. F. McCully, Michigan State agricultural engineer, is slated to discuss bean harvesting and methods. Buford Grigsby, Michigan State University weed control specialist, will talk about weed control and defoliants for field beans.

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### Frenchman Describes His Homeland

## Air French Farm Problems in Rotary

"Frenchmen clinging to old methods are hindering the progress of agriculture in my country," said Michael A. Gervais, 24, a University of Paris student who spoke to Cass City Rotarians Tuesday noon at the New Gordon Hotel.

Mr. Gervais, who is spending eight weeks as a guest of the Bad Axe Rotary Club, is an agricultural student and explained farming in his country.

We have refrigerators, radios, old cars and sometimes tractors, he pointed out. But we also have horses, no washing machines, televisions or other appliances, that are common in the United States.

Although some farmers have a tractor, they also have four horses, simply because they have always used horses and do not want to change, Mr. Gervais explained.

It is virtually impossible to change an old-time Frenchman's

Mr. Holmberg, whose office is on the third floor, and Mr. Holes, whose office is on the second floor, will handle registration from 9 to 12 a. m. and from 1 to 4 p. m. daily.

Used books will be sold in the agriculture laboratory on the first floor. Pupils selling books should bring them on or after Tuesday, Sept. 6, when a clerk will help price them and arrange for sales.

A five cents service charge will be made for each book sold and the used book store will open Tuesday, Sept. 6, and close Friday, Sept. 9.

New books for students in grades seven through 12 will be sold in the main office. Elementary workbooks may be purchased on page 10.

## School Board Raises Salaries Of Local Coaches

The Cass City School board voted Monday evening to raise the salaries of Irv Clasenman, athletic director, and Mike Yednak, coach, \$300 a year.

The action was taken because of the extra hour daily that the coaches will be required to spend with the various teams.

At a meeting last year, the school decided to eliminate one hour a day of practice during school hours for athletic teams. The hour will be added to the practice schedule this year after regular school hours.

### August 19 Deadline For Wool Vote

August 19 is the deadline for lamb and wool promotion vote, says Assistant County Agricultural Agent Don R. Keblen.

Sheep raisers and lamb feeders are reminded that Friday, August 19, is the last day on which they can vote on the proposed agreement between the U. S. Secretary of Agriculture and the American Sheep Producers' Council, Inc. If approved, the agreement would provide for the deduction of one cent per pound of the incentive payment to be received by the grower. This deduction would provide a fund estimated at two million dollars annually for the promotion of lamb and wool.

All growers who owned one or more sheep six months old or older for a consecutive 30-day period since January 1, 1955, are eligible to vote. This referendum is provided under section 708 of the National Wool Act of 1954, commonly known as the "self help" section.

The voting is being conducted by the county ASC office. Growers who have not received a ballot may secure one there. To be valid, ballots must be mailed and postmarked or delivered not later than Aug. 19 to the County ASC office.
