is showing that substitution of a few simple practices for seeding methods now commonly used can boost forage yields several times over in the first harvest.

In one experiment, cooperating economists and engineers compared broadcast seeding and fertilization with drill seeding and



USDA tests showed that drill seeding and hand fertilization brought higher ylelds than same mixture broadcast seeded and fertilized.

band fertilization. A tall-fescue and Ladino-clover mixture, seeded broadcast at the rate of 4 pounds of tall fescue and I pound of Ladino per acre, and fertilized at the rate of 750 pounds of 3-12-6 fertilizer per acre, yielded an average of 817 pounds of weed-free dry matter per acre in the initial harvest. When the same mixture was drilled and fertilizer was banded one inch below the seed, per-acre yield of dry matter averaged 2,865 pounds. Similar widely divergent yields resulted when these two methods were compared using various rates of seeding and fertiliza-

Greenhouse Planting Allows Extra Crops

Ever hear of planting corn in December? They do it at the versity of Illinois. College of Agriculture

O. T. Bonnett, a plant breeding specialist at the University, says the chief advantage of a greenhouse for growing and studying field crops is that it's a time-saver. By growing two or three crops a year under artificial conditions, specialists can plant crops on the


University's South Farm next spring that they ordinarily wouldn't get out until 1957 or 1958. More than 300 light bulbs with enough power to furnish light for a small town are used in the greenhouse every year to grow crops under controlled conditions. Tem-

perature, moisture and length of

day can be controlled. Some diseases under study in the greenhouse include red clover. root rot, wheat smut and oat rust. Bonnett says it is a "constant race" between the plant breeder and disease-causing organisms. As soon as the plant breeder finds a crop that is resistant to a certain disease, the organism gets ready to attach again by producing its own new varieties.

Research is done in the greenhouse on almost every field crop grown in Illinois.

Need Balanced **Price Supports**

Hog Feeder Avoids **High Priced Corn**

The things we learn from price support programs should help us plan better future programs. H. C. M. Case, farm economist at the University of Illinois be-

lieves the chief lesson we should learn is that government can legislate prices and even acreage, but it cannot legislate consumption and yields. Government supports the price

of corn, but a hog feeder, won't buy corn—or feed corn—if corn down on corn, a surplus piles up. This is the most potent reason for flexible price supports, according to Case. With flexible supports, the level can be adjusted to meet supply situations that threaten to become a problem.

Stall Prevents Sow Crushing Baby Pigs

Sow-crushing of baby pigs is said to be nearly impossible with a portable farrowing stall developed by Tom Johnson, Oregon State college animal husbandman. Testing of the simple device

showed no baby pig loss up to three weeks after farrowing. The stall is made from two partitions wide enough to confine the


sow comfortably, yet narrow enough to keep her on her underside before she rolls into nursing position. Space between the bottom of the partitions and the ground permits baby pigs to move about freely. Stalls are easily adjustable to handle different size

Heat lamps suspended over the area outside the "sow" portion of the stall warm and attract baby pigs while they are not nursing.

Tests indicate sows should be placed in the stall a day or two before farrowing. Stalls are roomy enough for daily feeding and watering, but Johnson suggests 15minute exercising twice daily.

The first two days after birth is the critical period for death from crushing. After that, the sow and litter can usually be removed to a regular farrowing pen.


