

# \$9,000 Boost In 1956 Budget for Village

Village trustees approved a budget of \$102,200 for 1956 Tuesday night at their regular meeting at the Municipal Building. The budget is over \$9,000 higher for 1956 than it was in 1955. Last year's expenditures were \$80,349.27 and the 1955 budget called for \$92,800 to be spent.

One of the major increases in costs of operating the village will be for operating and paying for the new sewer disposal plant. With a full time man, the cost is expected to be about \$9,500 next year. Last year the cost was \$724.57 and the budget allowed \$3,200 for the purpose.

Another cost that is expected to rise sharply is for police car and radio. This year the budget calls for an expenditure of \$1,800. The 1955 budget was \$900. The increase will be to trade the police car for a new one.

Cost for water works operation is also expected to be greater in 1956. The budget calls for an expenditure of \$10,200. Last year \$7,000 was budgeted. The increase will be to pull and repair a pump and to dig a well for supplying water to the Recreational Park.

## Yule Displays Attract 7,663 Cars in Nine Days

Interest in Cass City's Christmas decorations is as great or greater than in previous years, judging by the number of cars recorded by the automatic counter placed at the Gavel Club display at the Cass City Recreational Park.

A total of 7,663 cars have been recorded in the nine-day period from Dec. 19 through Dec. 27. Although records are vague, authorities said that about 8,000 cars were counted through the entire 1954 Christmas season.

Top day for visitors was Monday when a total of 1,474 cars were counted. Dec. 19 there were 495 cars passing the display. The number of cars increased daily until it reached its peak Monday, Dec. 20, 598 cars were recorded and on Dec. 21, 772 cars passed over the counter. Figures are combined for the next two days. On Dec. 22-23, 860 cars were counted and on Dec. 24 and Christmas Day, 2,611 cars were recorded. Tuesday, Dec. 27, 953 cars were counted.

The week-end surge of visitors resulted in the usual traffic jam in the village and persons living on main roads leading into the village reported a steady stream of cars going and coming.

## Five Men Slated To Enter Service From County

Five men will form the January quota for the Armed Forces from Tuscola County. Among the five will be Douglas C. Bird of Cass City.

Others to leave are: Floyd A. Redwanz, Reese; William C. Meyer, Akron; Jerry W. Hanlin, Millington, and Kenneth C. McLeod, Caro.

The registrants will report at the American Legion Hall in Caro, Wednesday, Jan. 4, at 8:30 o'clock.

They will go to the Detroit induction station where they will be processed into service.

Elford Cederberg, 37, congressman from Bay City, was one of six persons injured in a crash that killed Mrs. Myrtle Monroe, 60, at the intersection of Colwood Road and M-81, three miles southeast of Caro Wednesday night. He suffered cuts and bruises.

Besides Mr. Cederberg, others injured were:

Arlene Cederberg, 38, wife of the congressman, who suffered a fractured skull and cuts on the face.

Thomas Cederberg, 11, a son, broken left leg and bruises.

Marilyn Cederberg, 9, a daughter, cuts and bruises.

Ernest Monroe, father-in-law of the congressman and husband of the fatally injured woman, who is described as in fair condition at Caro Community Hospital.

Charles Dyer, 41, of Caro who received minor bruises.

According to Sheriff William Tomlinson, who investigated, both parties said that the crash occurred when an unknown car pulled onto M-81 from Colwood Road in front of Mr. Dyer, heading southwest toward Caro.

Mr. Dyer told investigating officers that he swerved to the left to avoid the other car. Mr. Cederberg said that he also swerved. The left front of the Dyer car collided with the right front of the Cederberg automobile.

All of the persons in the accident were taken to Caro Community Hospital and several have been transferred to a Saginaw hospital.

## Infant Baby Dies In Auto Crash West of Caro

Donna Thibo, 11-week-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Donald J. Thibo of Bay City, was killed and six other persons injured in an automobile accident Monday night. The crash occurred on Gilford Road, four miles west of Caro.

Injured were: Mr. Thibo who suffered shock and Mrs. Thibo, internal injuries and Mr. and Mrs. Herbert R. Bidwell, Flint, and their two sons, Robert, 13, and Ronald, 8, who received cuts and bruises.

The injured persons were taken to Caro Community Hospital. Sheriff William F. Tomlinson said automobiles driven east by Thibo, 26, and west by Bidwell, 39, collided at the top of a hill.

The Cass City Village Council approved a substantial raise in the cost of water and originated a sewer charge Tuesday night to pay the costs of running and erecting the expanded sewage disposal system in the village.

The council decided that the only fair way to pay the village's obligation was to spread the cost according to the amount residents used the facilities.

The new sewer charge is divided into two parts. Homes, industries and businesses using up to 20,000 gallons of water a quarter will be charged \$1.50 per quarter. Those who use over that amount will pay \$2.50 a quarter.

Minimum charge for use of water has been raised from \$3 to \$4 quarterly. Minimum users are those using less than 5,000 gallons per quarter.

Persons using from 5,000 to 15,000 gallons quarterly will be charged 40 cents per 1,000 gallons. The former rate was 30 cents per 1,000 gallons. Users that need over 15,000 gallons will be in a commercial rate of 15 cents per 1,000 gallons.

The rate increase is expected to yield about \$6,750 more revenue yearly. In 1955, water collections amounted to \$11,253.41 and the anticipated revenue from water collections, as shown in the budget, is \$18,000.

Besides paying the increased rate, persons living outside of the village limits and using village water will pay a 50 per cent extra charge for service.

Persons in the village using sewer facilities but not village water will pay the maximum sewer charge of \$2.50 quarterly.

Trustees said that the extra charge for persons outside of the village was added because these users pay no other village taxes which go to help maintain service.

The maximum sewer charge for non-water users in the village was decided because it is the only revenue the village can receive for use of facilities.

Other Business  
Trustees discussed retaining C. U. Brown on a yearly basis for advice and help with the water system. They decided to have the village marshal check the village building housing the girl scout rooms and fire hall. The decision was made to determine what night damage is done, if any occurs while groups are using facilities.

1955 was a busy year in the Cass City area. The news, as seen on the front pages of the Chronicle, reflected a prospering community, new businesses, factory and many other, advancements were recorded.

The long awaited resurfacing of Main Street was completed and several pioneer residents of the community died and the usual number of weddings and social events helped complete the news scene.

As always, because of the great number of deaths by natural causes, none will be reviewed here.

Paper by paper, then, these were some of the highlights of 1955.

Jan. 8—Robert Shaw, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Keith Shaw of Snover, was pinned for five hours under a tractor in icy water. He suffered from exposure and near frostbite. Harold Outley accepted a position teaching in Allen Park after 1 1/2 years in the Cass City School system.

Jan. 15—E. B. "Chic" Schwader was honored by the Tuscola County Highway Commission with a banquet at Vassar for his work on the commission from 1949 through 1954. Voters of the Quick School district vote 21-3 to join the Deford Consolidated School.

Jan. 22—W. E. Walpole announces that the Walbro Corporation

had reached a total employment of 84 persons with a weekly payroll of \$4,500. Eli D. Holes joins staff at Cass City High School, replacing Harold Outley.

Jan. 29—Members of Deford Community School board discuss plans for new school building. License bureau moves to Fix-it Shop in Cass City as Democrats take control of state offices.

Feb. 4—Committee forms to supervise a summer program at the Cass City Recreational Park. Talk of reorganizing civil defense post in Cass City at new site at park.

April 1—Jack Gallagher earns State Farmer award. New factory (Cass City Manufacturing Co.) announces that it intends to build in Cass City. Village taxes increase over \$3,000.

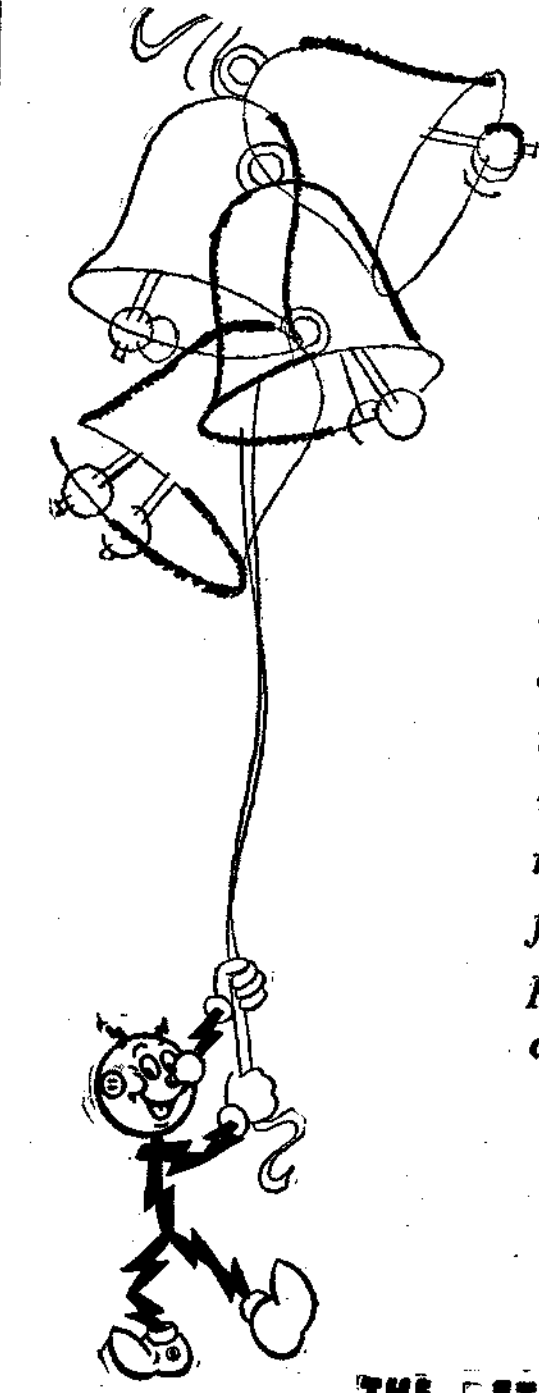

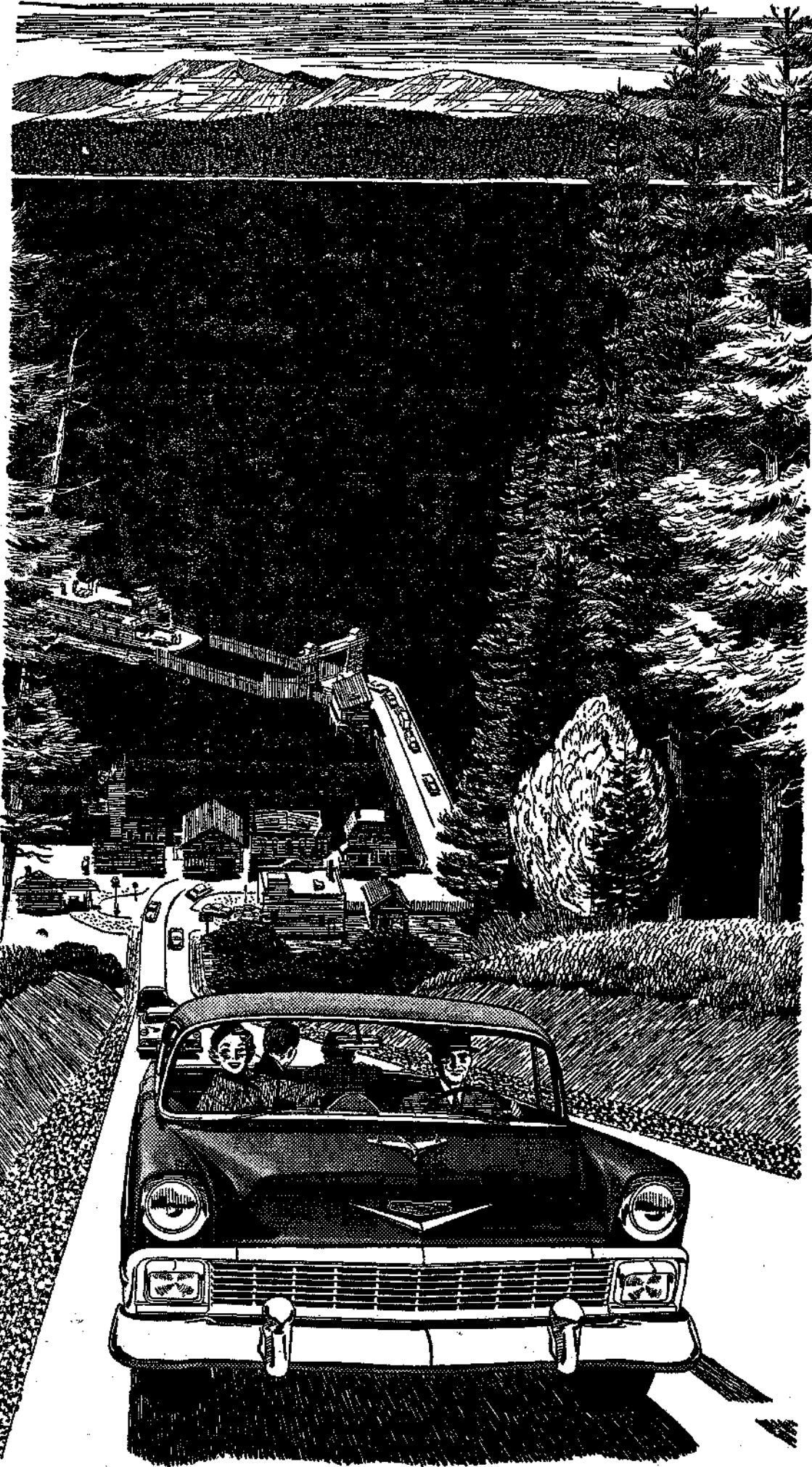

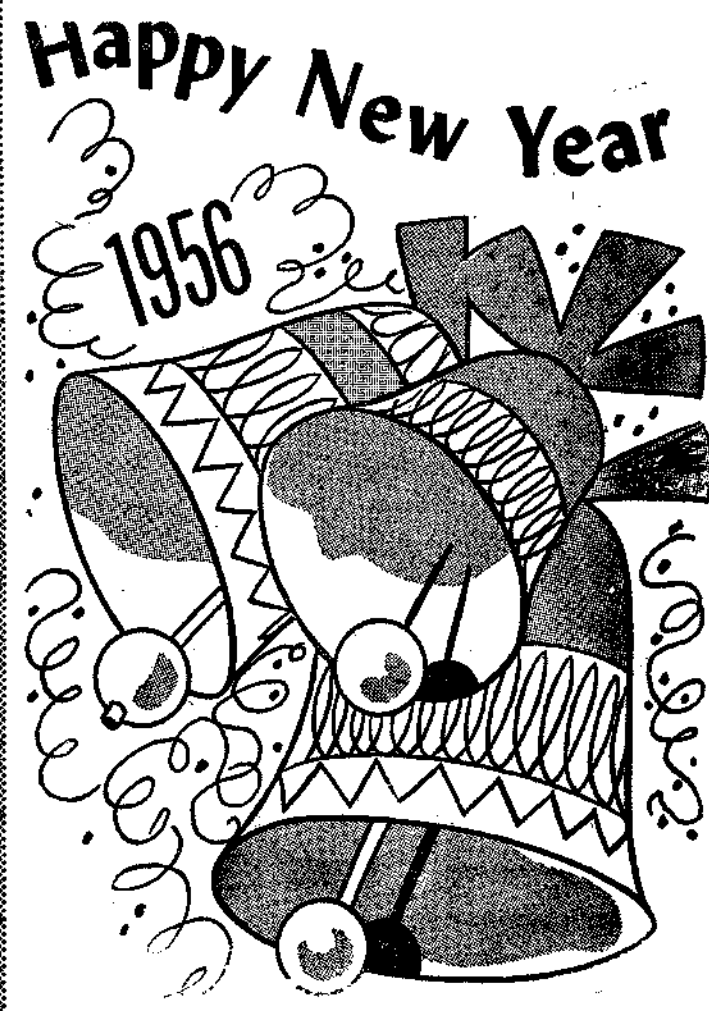

**MICHIGAN MIRROR NEWS BRIEFS**

Michigan's bitter fight over facilities to care for mentally retarded children is not over. Major groups already are getting ready with ammunition to fire in the legislature toward a permanent solution following the anti-climactic struggle over an emergency program.

As a single phase of the many-sided mental health problem, it created a sensation of bitterness and strife which deadlocked the legislature for six weeks.

"At least the people now know that we have a problem in mental health," said Rep. George W. Sallade (R-Ann Arbor).

He and others are forecast as the leaders of a continuing fight over the issue. Already a 2,500-bed hospital for mentally retarded children is planned in southeastern Michigan.

But how was this deadlock resolved and who were the players in one of the roughest legislative dramas in history?

It was Senator Elmer R. Porter (R-Blissfield), a 73-year-old farmer and chairman of the Senate appropriations committee who came up with the solution.

Porter merely repeated the decision he made weeks ago on the final night of the first special session, Nov. 4.

It was to rent the controversial Farmington Children's Hospital and the beds needed for the children. There was no promise to buy the hospital.

"That's as far as I can go," Porter said.

He made the decision Nov. 4 and it took more than a month to get agreement among the widely-split factions of the legislature which had split both Houses and both parties.

The legislature ended with this program:

The state will obtain 1,150 beds, slightly under the original request of Gov. Williams, and at a cost of \$1,214,222, almost \$4,000,000 under the request of Democrats.

On the program, 150 beds will be leased at Farmington, 150 in private hospitals under contract, 800 at a reconverted Fort Custer station hospital, Battle Creek, and the rest at expanded facilities at Coldwater and Mt. Pleasant Home and Training Schools.

"It represents a respectable compromise," said Williams.

But the program strikes others as something less than adequate.

There will be a strong campaign to stop the march toward institutionalizing trainable and educable mentally retarded children and a campaign to provide local schools and other facilities.

Too, there will be a hurry-up campaign to build the proposed new 2,500-bed hospital in southeastern Michigan, in Macomb County near the Wayne County line.

Michigan will hear of mental health problems for years to come, despite its ranking as one of the top states in the nation as a solution finder of mental health problems.

Republicans in the legislature are ready to fight Democrats in their campaigns on "non-partisan issues."

The irony develops from the struggle over facilities for mentally retarded children and other issues which, though allegedly non-political, have pitted parties against each other.

It all started in 1951 when the Detroit labor unions campaigned against the "Balanced Legislature" proposal unsuccessfully by proposing a "strictly representative" legislature.

**Slate Civil Defense Meeting Jan. 5**

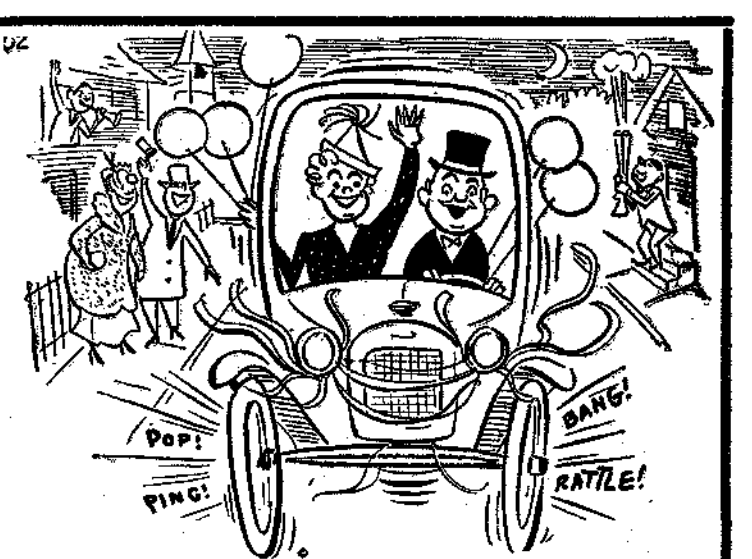

Emphasis will be placed upon those things which you can learn in Civil Defense work which will be useful to you in your everyday living—useful to you whether there is an enemy attack or not.

There will also be demonstrations and exhibits. Included will be instruction in home nursing.

Michigan motorists will have until Feb. 1 to purchase 1931 license plates for their cars, Frank D. Fitzgerald, secretary of state, announced Saturday.

The largest volume of business in the history of the Cass City post office was transacted this month, according to Mrs. Andrew Birelow, postmaster. Fifty thousand two-cent stamps and 20,000 three-cent stamps were sold during the Christmas mailing season, she said.

### Not Necessary to Retire to Draw Social Security

"You don't have to retire completely to start drawing your social security benefits after age 65," according to Fred A. Globig, field representative of the Saginaw social security office.

Globig explained that the 1954 Amendments to the Social Security Act permit earnings up to \$1200 in a calendar year before any benefits are lost, even if you work in all months of the year. Even if you earn more than \$1200, some payments can be made if your total earnings for the year are not over \$2080.

Moreover, you do not lose a benefit for any month in which you do not earn more than \$80 in employment or do not render substantial services in self-employment, regardless of the amount of your earnings in other months of the year. And, when you reach the age of 72, you can receive your benefits even though you continue to work, regardless of your earnings.

Globig pointed out that these provisions enable the worker to take a part-time job or one involving less responsibility and if he is over 72, payments can be made for each month if a claim is made for the benefits. In this way, he can keep busy and at the same time supplement his social security benefits. He suggests that when the time for retirement comes or if you are 72 years of age, you read the easy-to-understand leaflet, "Facts About Earnings While Receiving Payments," which is available upon request at any social security office. It will tell you exactly how your benefits will be affected if you continue to work. "Better still," he said, "come to our office and we will be glad to discuss your particular problem with you in person and give you any necessary assistance if you wish to claim benefits."

The Saginaw social security district office is located at 304 Bearer Building.

### 40 Conservation Jobs Now Open

The Michigan State Civil Service Commission is now accepting applications to fill over 40 vacant conservation officer positions and many vacancies for park managers, according to Gerald O. DeBoer, branch manager of the Caro office of the Michigan Employment Security Commission.

Salary for conservation officers starts at \$3,946.00 and go to \$5,011.00 annually. Candidates must be 23 years of age but not more than 29. They must be at least 5 ft. 9 in. but not more than 6 ft. 4 in. and weigh at least 150 pounds. They must have graduated from high school.

Salary for park rangers is \$61.60 per week. Candidates must be 18 and not over 60 and have completed the eighth grade.

DeBoer states that applications can be had from the Michigan Employment Security Office, the Michigan Conservation Office or directly from the Michigan Civil Service Commission, Lansing 13. Applications must be filed on or before January 4, 1956.

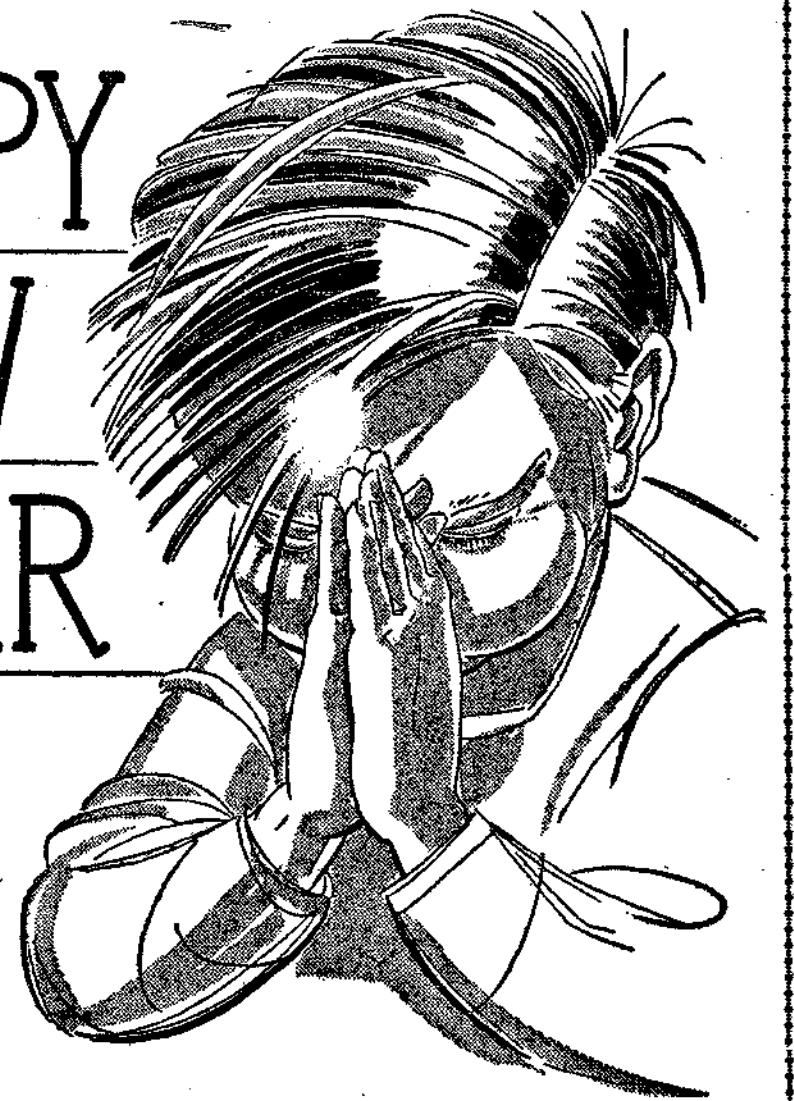

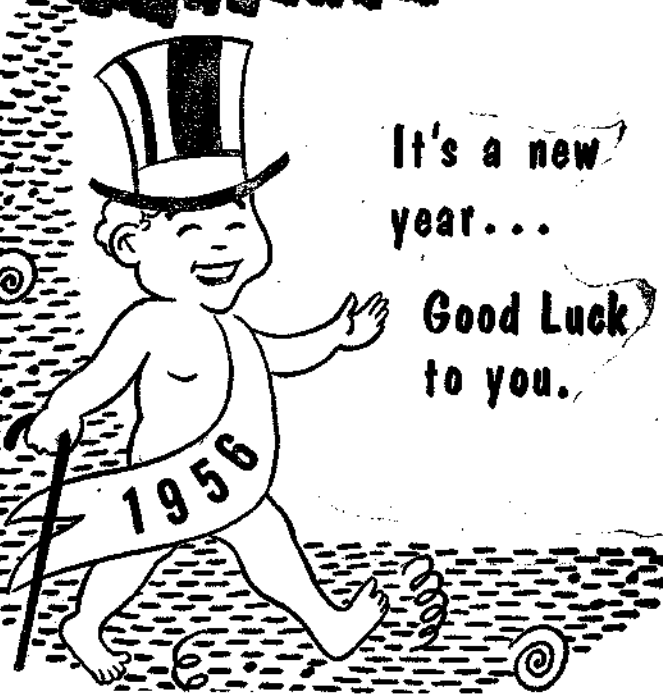

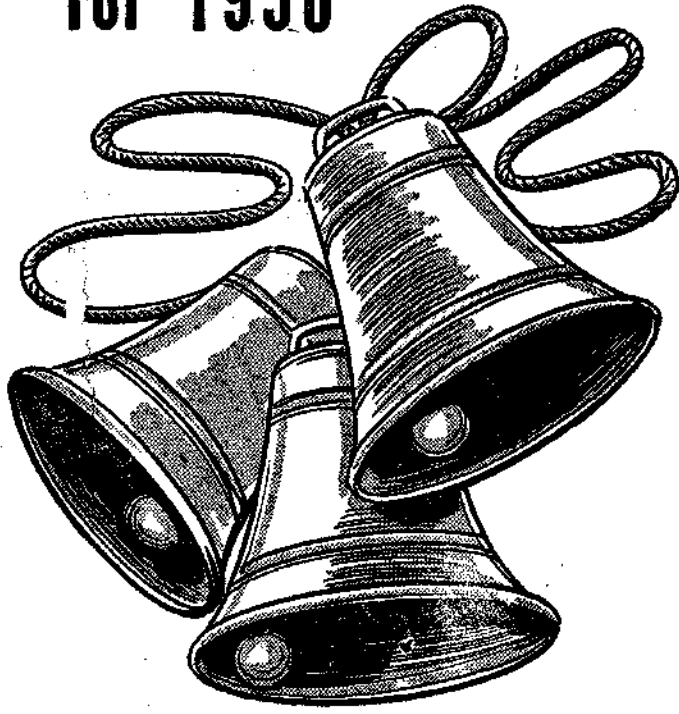
