

You're breezing along the highway merrily when—oh that sickening feeling!—the engine just rolls over and dies. The first thing most of us think of as we head for the nearest farm house to phone a tow truck is the fuel pump. And rightly so, probably.

But before you head for the farm house, there are a few simple tests anyone can do, and perhaps solve and repair the problem in
