You see a lot of trouble when you run a service garage. Trouble, in a way, is our business, but there's a lot more satisfaction in the other service we perform-the prevention of trouble. Because we service so many cars that we've known all their lives, our troubles are less than at a lot of garages.

And one thing that has always impressed me is the amount of trouble that a car owner can prevent himself by remembering a few simple reminders

I'm always interested to see the figures put out by the American Automobile Association showing which car troubles occur most frequently.

This year they have found, once again, that the items an owner himself has to do the most about cause the most trouble. Tires lead the parade; 23 per cent of all service calls concerned tires.

Batteries were second, with 22 per cent of the service calls. Items like brakes and lights, which a garage usually looks after and which are important safety factors, accounted for only one per cent each of the service calls.

It's so easy to cut down tire trouble. Check tire pressure at least once a week, both overinflation and underinflation are harmful. Tires should be rotated every 5,000 miles and wheel allignment checked at the first sign of trouble or at least every 10,000 miles.

tening until particles are the size of a pea. Sprinkle with ice water, using just enough to hold mixture together. Pat into round shape and roll to fit pie pan. Cream Filling (For 8-inch crust) 2 cups milk % cup sugar ¼ teaspoon salt 3 tablespoons cornstarch eggs

teaspoon vanilla 1 tablespoon butter

Scald milk. Blend 1/2 cup sugar with salt and cornstarch and stir into hot milk. Place over hot water and cook and stir until thickened. Cover and cook 15 minutes longer, stirring occasionally. Separate eggs and beat yolks lightly. Stir a little of hot mixture into yolks, then combine with remaining hot tnixture. Cook 2 to 3 minutes longer, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and blend in butter and vanilla. Cool slightly and pour into aked and cooled crust. Beat egg whites until stiff. Gradually beat a remaining ¼ cup sugar. Spread neringue in swirls over filling. Bake in a hot (400°F.) oven 8 to .0 minutes until meringue browns ightly. Cool thoroughly before cutting.

The Sanitary Landfill is an effective and proven method of permanent disposal of all types of non-salvageable waste.

Advantages of the Sanitary Landfill method of disposal would include:

1. Public health is protected because flies, mosquitoes, rats and other disease-carrying vermin are eliminated.

> 2. Fire and nuisances are eliminated.

3. Combined garbage and refuse collection is possible. 4. Disposal sites may be lo cated close to centers of refuse production without creation of

nuisance conditions. 5. Waste or useless land can be reclaimed and converted into parks or recreation areas. 6. Minimum of inexpensive equipment is required; this equipment may also be used for other city or county work. 7. Landfills can be operated on farm property to help stop soil

erosion. Public officials faced with the problems of unsatisfactory dump operation should plan to attend the meeting Thursday and see how a dump can disappear, authorities said.
