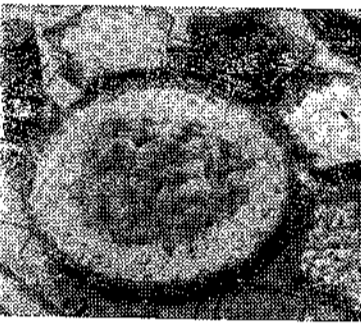
### Serve Shrimp Curry When You Entertain Guests Casually

PLANNING a get-together with friends soon? Entertain casually if you want to enjoy yourself as well as making them happy. Friends feel at ease with simplicity and you'll be able to devote yourself to the fun of being together if you're free of much of the preparation.

This shrimp curry may be prepared in advance, if you like, then heated at the last minute for serving. You might even get out the curry accompaniments in small bowls beforehand, wash and dry the greens for salad and have sherbet ready in the freezer.

- Noodle Shrimp Curry (Serves 4)**
- 1 tablespoon salt
  - 3 quarts boiling water
  - 8 ounces medium egg noodles
  - 1 can (10½ ounce) condensed cream of celery soup
  - 3 tablespoons catchup
  - ½ teaspoon paprika
  - 1 teaspoon curry powder
  - ½ teaspoon ginger
  - 1 pound shrimp, cooked, shelled, deveined

Add tablespoon of salt to rapidly boiling water. Gradually add noodles so water continues to boil.



Curried shrimp is a good teammate to noodles. If you're having friends in to enjoy it with you, serve the small dishes of curry accompaniments with it to make for interest. Chutney, pickled onions, shredded coconut and chopped, hard-cooked eggs go nicely with shrimp and noodles.

Cook, uncovered, stirring occasionally, until tender.

Drain in colander. Combine soup, catchup, paprika, curry powder and ginger. Mix thoroughly. Cover and cook 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add shrimp; heat

thoroughly. Turn noodles into heated serving dish; top with shrimp mixture. Serve with accompaniments such as pickled onions, chutney, chopped hard-cooked eggs, chopped or whole peanuts, grated fresh coconut or crumbled bacon, if desired.

### Nutmeats Flavor Pastry Shells

Pastry has long been a favorite dessert, but it's bound to reach new popularity now with some of the interesting flavors being added to pie crust.

A smooth and delicious cream filling, for example, is a perfect teammate for a walnut crust. Top this with a snowy meringue and brown it lightly and you're certain to find your family poking into the refrigerator just for another smidgeon of something so delicious.

- Walnut Crust (Makes 1 8-inch crust)**
- 1 cup sifted all-purpose flour
  - ½ teaspoon salt
  - ½ cup shortening
  - 2 to 3 tablespoons ice water
  - ½ cup finely chopped walnuts

Sift flour with salt. Cut in shortening until particles are the size of a pea. Sprinkle with ice water, using just enough to hold mixture together. Pat into round shape and roll to fit pie pan. Sprinkle walnuts over pastry and roll lightly. Flute edges and prick crust with a fork. Bake in a hot (450°F.) oven for 12 to 15 minutes or until browned. Cool.

- Cream Filling (For 8-inch crust)**
- 2 cups milk
  - ¼ cup sugar
  - ½ teaspoon salt
  - 3 tablespoons cornstarch
  - 2 eggs
  - 1 teaspoon vanilla
  - 1 tablespoon butter

Scald milk. Blend ½ cup sugar with salt and cornstarch and stir into hot milk. Place over hot water and cook and stir until thickened. Cover and cook 15 minutes longer, stirring occasionally. Separate

eggs and beat yolks lightly. Stir a little of hot mixture into yolks, then combine with remaining hot mixture. Cook 2 to 3 minutes longer, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and blend in butter and vanilla. Cool slightly and pour into baked and cooled crust. Beat egg whites until stiff. Gradually beat in remaining ¼ cup sugar. Spread meringue in swirls over filling.

Bake in a hot (400°F.) oven 8 to 10 minutes until meringue browns lightly. Cool thoroughly before cutting.

### Many in 4-H Clubs at MSU

Going to college doesn't cut the tie that binds a 4-H club member to his 4-H interests and activities.

In fact, declares Bill Muller, Tuscola County 4-H club agent, proof of the college interest in 4-H is the growing Michigan State University campus 4-H club. Although its 75 members carry on no direct 4-H project work, they do participate in social and educational activities connected with agriculture and home economics.

Most of the campus club members are those former 4-H'ers who have done outstanding work in their home communities.

The campus club is one of the few agricultural clubs on the MSU campus which has an equal number of men and women members. Activities that it sponsors start in the fall with the annual 4-H Service Club day. Meetings which are held twice a month consist of a business meeting, followed by a speaker, movies or other type of program. Advisors are Kenneth Ousterhout and Mary Woodward of the state 4-H club staff.
