Deford Old Settlers Schedule Meeting

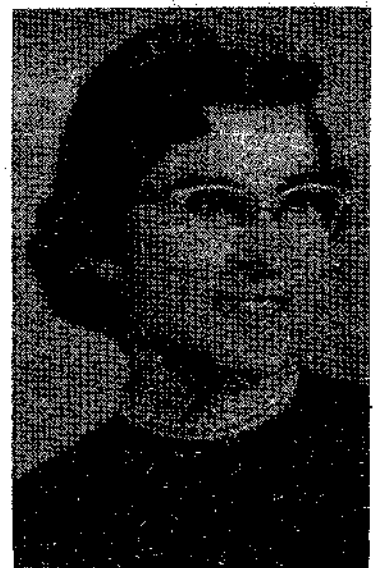
The Deford Old Settlers will hold their annual reunion Saturday, June 16, at Deford.

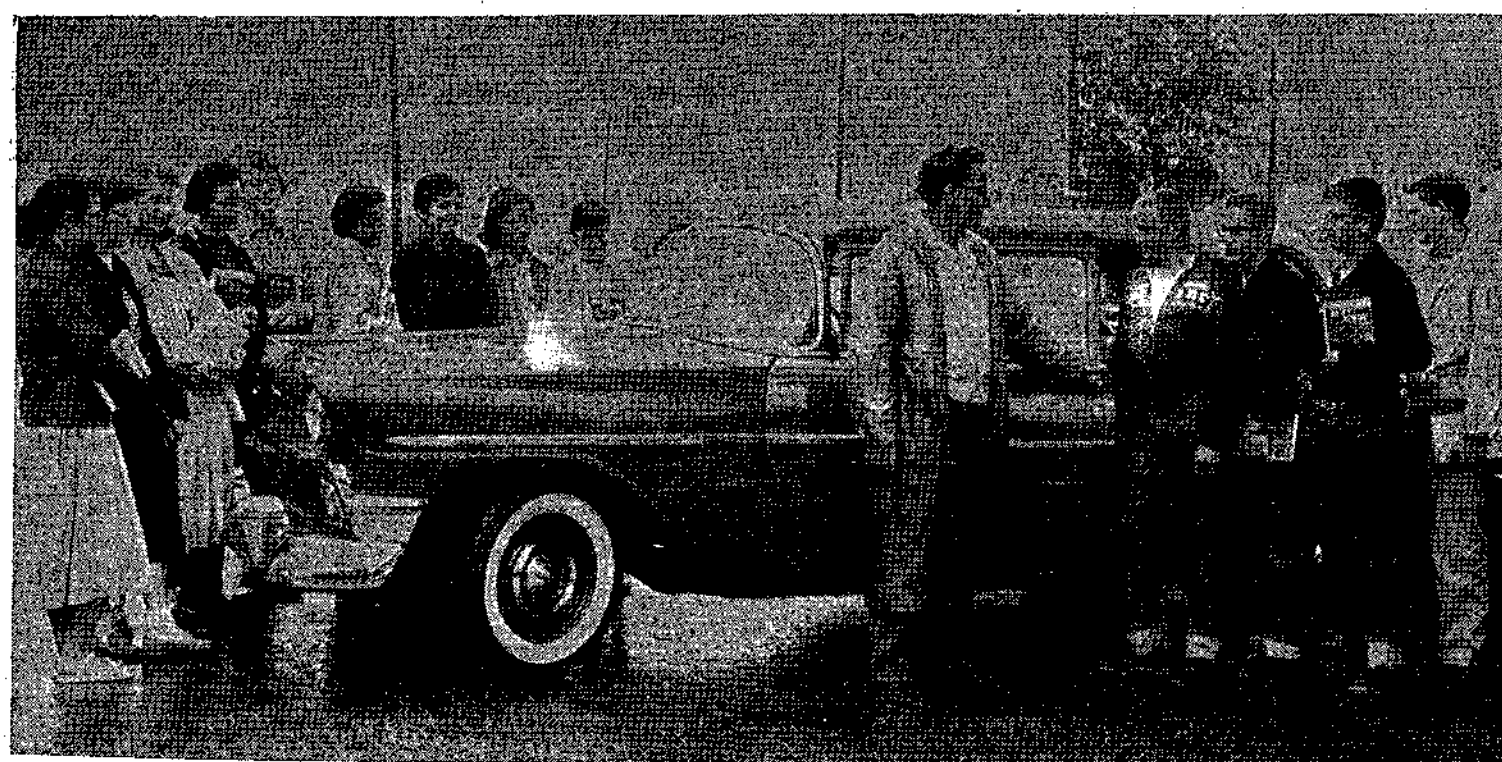

Richard Auslander, 21, was found dead Wednesday morning at 2 a. m. near his completely wrecked automobile on Deford Road, a mile and a quarter east of M-31.

Tuscola County Sheriff Department officials believe that he fell asleep while driving. Tracks indicated that Mr. Auslander left the road on the left side as he was driving east.

His automobile hit the north pier of the bridge over the Cass River and rolled on its top 12 feet inside the bridge.

He was found lying near the car by Lloyd Hicks of Deford. Death was said to be caused by a skull fracture.

Richard was born in Flint, April 16, 1935, the only child of Mr. and Mrs. Clark Auslander of Shabbona. He graduated from Cass City High School in 1953.

Sentence Stewart To Long Term in Prison

Gerald Stewart of Mayville was sentenced Thursday, May 31, for from seven and a half to 15 years at Jackson Prison by Judge T. C. Quinn in Tuscola County Circuit Court at Caro.

Stewart had pleaded guilty to breaking and entering the Juniata School. Besides the case he was tried for Thursday, he signed statements with the sheriff saying that he was guilty of 14 other breaking and entering offenses.

Elmer Holnagel of Saginaw, who pled guilty of uttering and publishing after issuing a worthless check to Henry Horning of Vassar for a car, was sentenced to two years' probation and fined \$100 plus court costs of \$250.

In addition he was ordered to make restitution of \$1,175 to Mr. Horning.

Orthopedic Clinic Slated in Caro

An orthopedic clinic for Tuscola County will be held June 28 at the Caro State Hospital in Murray Hall from 8:30 a. m. to 2 p. m., authorities for the Michigan Crippled Children Commission, sponsors of the event, announced this week.

Dr. Hugh L. Sulfridge, an orthopedic specialist from Saginaw, will be the examining physician. Persons who are 21 years old or under and have diseases involving bone or muscle are eligible for examination.

There is no charge for the service or x-ray if it is ordered. Cooperating with the commission are the Tuscola County Medical Society, Tuscola County Public Health Nurses and Tuscola County Society for Crippled Children.

Cass City Concludes Big Sports Year

Cass City High School has completed a very successful season in sports, according to Irv Claxman, athletic director at the school. In addition, both Mr. Claxman and Coach Mike Yedinak look forward to a fine season in 1956-57.

Cass City has had exceptionally fine teams through the years and the 1955-56 teams were among the best. In all sports, Cass City won 37 of 43 contests. In football a seven won, one lost record was posted. The team won six straight times in track without a defeat in regularly scheduled competition. They posted a 13-4 record in basketball and won an 11-1 record in baseball. They were undefeated on the diamond in conference competition.

The varsity teams won the conference championship in both baseball and track and were in second place in football and basketball.

Capacity audiences crowded into the Cass City High School auditorium this week as the school held its seventieth annual commencement.

Baccalaureate services were held Sunday evening when Rev. I. J. Mikulski, of St. Pancratius Catholic Church, spoke to the graduates, using as his subject, "Your Heritage and Your Future". The processional march was led by Walter Kloc, junior class president, assisted by 14 junior girls as escorts. The seventy-three graduates entered the auditorium through floral arches as the high school band played the traditional "Pomp and Circumstance" march. The Girls' Glee Club furnished several sacred selections and members of the Cass City clergy assisted in the service.

High point of commencement was reached Tuesday night in the graduation exercises for which Karen Cummings, class president, served as chairman. Other student speakers included Marlene Ricketts, valedictorian, and Patricia McConnell, salutatorian. Music was supplied entirely by the class members. A flute duet by Judy Howell and Karen Otis and a vocal duet by Marlene Ricketts and Margaret Pollman were well received by the audience. Norma Gunther, who has done considerable solo work with the Glee Club, sang "You'll Never Walk Alone," while a group of senior girls joined voices in "The Halls of Ivy."

An unusual feature of this year's commencement was the appearance of an alumnus of the school as guest speaker. Rev. Roy J. Striffler, member of the class of 1916 and now pastor of the First Congregational Church of New Baltimore, addressed the assembly on the topic, "An Open Door." Reminding the graduates that they should not be discouraged if they occasionally find doors closed to their progress, he emphasized that certain doors might always be kept open. Using the scriptural admonition, "Behold, I set before you an open door, which no man can close," he counseled that the doors of the mind, the heart and the spirit be forever kept open in order to find happiness and success in life.

Twelve Honor Society members among the class were recognized by Principal Arthur Holmberg, who also presented a number of other awards. Jack Clara received the Paul A. Smarks athletic award for 1956 for outstanding contribution in athletics, scholarship and citizenship. The recently established Thelma J. Hunt Memorial Scholarship was presented to Marie Gurdon. Other

scholarships awarded included the U of M Regents Alumni scholarship to Connie Bartle, a freshman scholarship to Central Michigan College to Keith O'Dell and a Port Huron Times-Herald award for Port Huron Junior College to Don Smith.

Superintendent Willis Campbell congratulated the class on its fine record and handed out the diplomas as the graduates left the stage. Keith O'Dell closed the exercises with a prayer and benediction.

Caro Voters Approve \$900,000 School Bond

The long awaited new high school at Caro moved a step closer to reality Monday when voters oked a \$900,000 bond issue by a majority of better than three to one.

The bond issue proposal carried by a vote of 531 to 151.

A proposal to rescind the present five-mill tax levy for a building and site fund and to replace it with a levy averaging 5.7 mills for 27 years was approved, 523 to 148.

The third proposal, to increase the tax limitation to permit collection of the 5.7-mill levy, carried by a vote of 534 to 156.

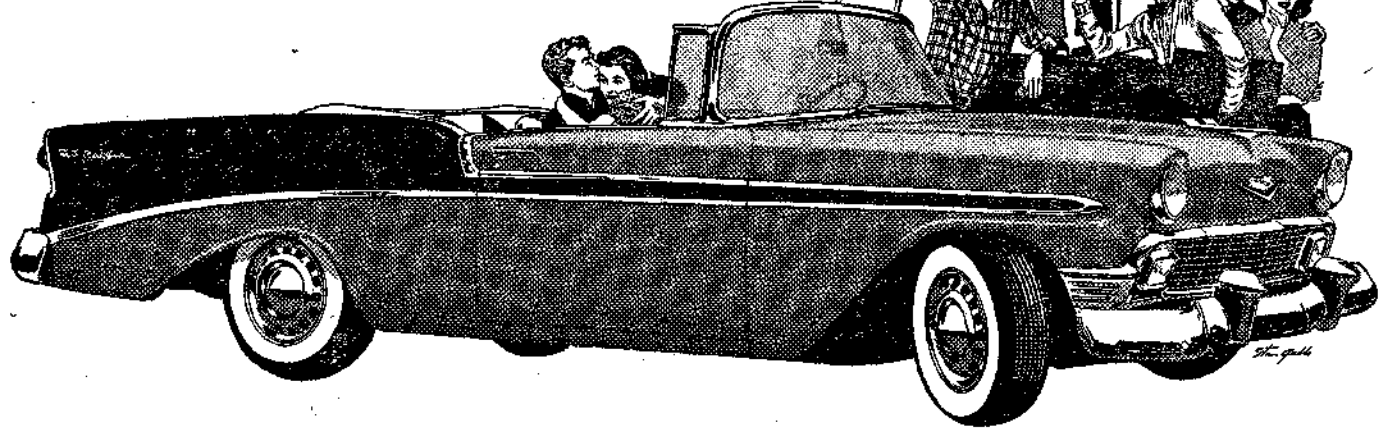

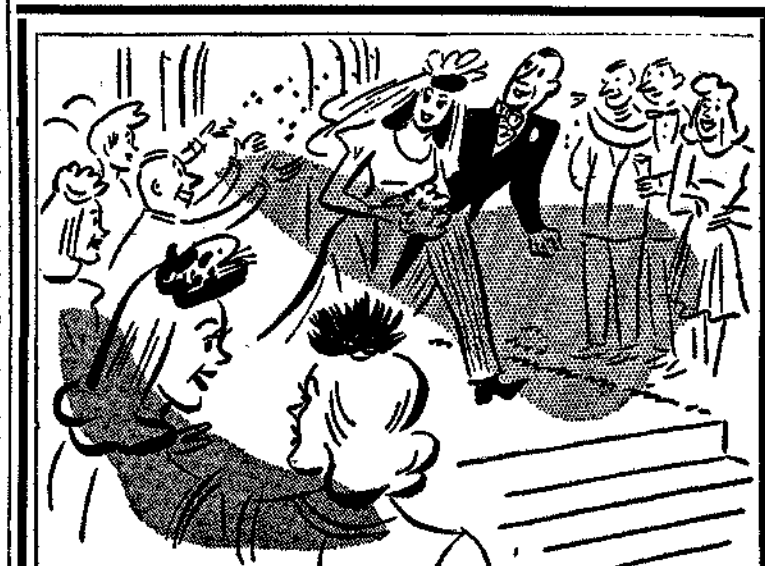

Elevator Career Day June 21

Several young men from Tuscola County who are interested in a career in the feed and grain trade will take part in the fifth annual Elevator Career Day at Michigan State University, June 21.

Alfred Ballweg, county agricultural agent, points out there is a shortage of qualified elevator men in Michigan and in other states.

Salaries offered, he says, range from \$4,000 to \$5,000 for qualified key personnel, depending upon their ability and experience.

Those attending the career day will learn about the elevator and farm supply short course which opens on September 24 at MSU. And they will be told how to apply for the many scholarships furnished by the feed and grain trade. The scholarships are \$100 for each term of work at MSU.

The course includes two terms at MSU, experience in an elevator for two terms and two more terms of classroom work. The experience in an elevator pays the trainee about \$65 a week, according to George Greenleaf, in charge of the course. He indicates there are many requests for graduates of the course which remain unfilled.

The young men will hear about opportunities in the trade from E. G. Cherbonnier, St. Louis, Mo., dean of the feed and grain business and an advisor to the National Grain and Feed Dealers' association.

Group counseling sessions will be under the direction of members of the trade: Charles Forre, Kalamazoo; James Bliss, Michigan Elevator Exchange; Ray Bohnsack, Farm Bureau, Lansing; and Don Shepard of the MSU short course department. Guy Rench, Channing, veteran feed and grain man, is chairman of the event.

No Storage Loan For Unclean Wheat

Farmers who want to store wheat under government loan this year will find the rules stiffer.

Men from the county agricultural stabilization and conservation committee office will examine the grain closely to see if it meets the new standards specified by the food and drug administration, comments Don Kehler, assistant county agricultural agent.

If the grain doesn't meet the standards on sanitation, the farmer won't get the loan.

The loan application can be rejected because of contamination from mice, rats, birds, cats or other animals; damage by insects; or because the grain may have some treated seed mixed with it.

Under a law passed by the last session of the legislature, all seed grain that has been chemically treated and sold must be stained or dyed. That means such seed can be detected easily in other grain.

The rules on grain sanitation are administered by the Michigan Department of Agriculture's food and standards division. The division handles all cases where there is a misbranding of products or where there is adulteration of food.

The department already has seized a large quantity of grain being shipped in Michigan. The grain was not up to food and drug administration standards.

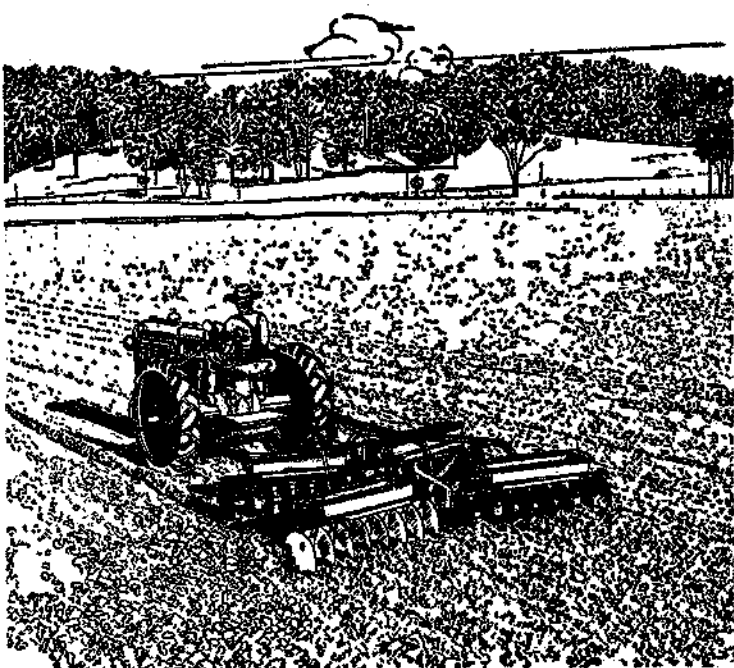

Tighten Michigan Grain Restrictions

Federal authorities are cracking down on unclean grain in Michigan.

And regulations are going to be even more strict on July 1, when new sanitation standards of the Food and Drug Administration become effective, points out Don Kober, assistant county agricultural agent.

While grain can be contaminated in any stage of marketing, the source usually is on the farm, he emphasizes. Here are the causes of contamination in order of importance:

- Animals, meaning mice, rats, birds, cats and others.
- Insects, the kind that damage stored grain.
- Mixing treated seed wheat with other grain in the bin.
- The latter cause was brought to the spotlight recently when three cars of contaminated wheat were seized by the Michigan Department of Agriculture.
- Wheat in the cars had treated seed mixed with clean grain, making the whole lot poisonous.
- A total of 48 cars of wheat have been placed under seal thus far from that cause. Authorities call such grain "pink wheat."
- How to comply with sanitation requirements in handling and storing grain can be seen in a revised Michigan State University extension folder just off the press. It's called "Prevent Damage to Stored Grain," and single copies are free at the county extension office. Ask for Extension Folder F-134.

MICHIGAN MIRROR NEWS BRIEFS

Voters must deal with an important educational issue this November if petitions of the Michigan Education Association are filed. An earnest effort is being made by the MEA to take the office of State Superintendent of Public Instruction out of politics. Support for the plan has been given by present Superintendent Clair L. Taylor.

Basic provision of the proposal gives the State Board of Education authority to appoint the Superintendent. This would replace the two-year elective term now in force.

Election to the board itself, though now on a non-partisan basis, would still be continued. Number of members would be increased from four to eight members; two would be elected each two years.

New plan calls for board members to serve eight-year terms. Candidates for these posts would submit petitions from at least 20 counties with a total of 25,000 signatures to secure a place on the ballot. Only restriction is that not more than two members shall reside in the same county.

The 219,000 name goal is in sight. According to A. J. Phillips, Executive Secretary of the MEA, their group has passed the half way mark in collecting 218,712 signatures, the required number to place the proposition on the November ballot.

Both political parties remember the bitter and costly fight preceding the last election of a Superintendent in April, 1955.

As a "practical measure" both could be expected to favor a plan which would save their campaign funds for "even" year elections when more political offices are at stake.

Democratic leaders would like to see the office appointive rather than elective. They prefer that appointment power be given to the governor.

Like to sign petitions? At least four other Michigan groups are looking for signatures for proposals. Chances of their success in meeting the July 6 deadline vary.

No pun intended, but Michigan Amvets Commander Edwin Numbers is pushing a proposal to legalize charity bingo. This is a slightly modified version of the amendment which was defeated at the polls two years ago.

Township officials through their state association, are circulating petitions to return property tax assessments to their control. Much of their former assessment power is now in the hands of the State Board of Equalization.

A new method of selecting judges has support of the State Bar. Known as the Missouri plan, this proposal requires that the governor appoint judges from a list of candidates submitted by a panel of laymen and attorneys. After serving one year, the appointed judge must be successful in an election if he is to hold his position.

A curb to limit the garnishment (forced payment) of wages is being presented by a group headed by Detroit attorney Gregory M. Pilon.

If passed, wages could not be garnished to pay bills due on any merchandise except groceries.

One other proposal is certain. The Legislature itself is submitting an amendment. It specifies a minimum age of 21 for all legislators and disqualifies persons convicted of felonies involving a breach of the public trust or subversion.

Watch for the national advertising program Michigan will launch next month to promote our state for new industry.

Keyed to the theme "Michigan is Good to Industry," the Michigan Economic Development Department is readying a campaign based on the \$100,000 fund voted at the last legislative session.

A larger cut of the huge industrial expansion "pie" is the campaign target.

According to Don Weeks, director of the development office, other states spent more than \$8,000,000 last year in an effort to secure new industry.

"We are pleased that Michigan will now have a coordinated campaign to promote the state's virtues," Weeks stated. "We anticipate that the state government's \$100,000 fund will be multiplied several times through tie-in advertisements by numerous companies and organizations."

A five-phase program is outlined, according to Weeks, which includes advertising in national consumer and trade journals, traveling displays, a Michigan movie, a television film and direct mail advertising.

Michigan residents, most of whom have a stake in the state's economic growth, can help by plugging Michigan's advantages at every opportunity as an excellent location for industry. A successful campaign would provide through new industry, more jobs for state residents and added money for the retail businessman.

Expansion of Akron Elevator Proposed

A plan has been developed to expand the Caro Farmers Cooperative Elevator by constructing a new plant at Akron, Michigan. This plant will be a branch of the Caro operation. The new plant will have a 70,000 bushel capacity in silo type bins.

The plant will have seven silos and two receiving pits. Grain receiving capacity of 4,500 bushels per hour is planned. A 1,000 bushel per hour corn sheller and automatic scales throughout will be features of the new elevator. A drier handling 500 to 700 bushels per hour and warehouse for office space and other farm supplies will be erected.

Modern, fast grain and bean handling equipment and a large capacity grain dryer are in the plans, according to Robert Schantz, Manager of the Caro Elevator.

Chairman Clifford Smith of the Caro Cooperative Elevator Board of Directors says that many area farmers have met with the Board to help plan the new plant. Harold Humm is Secretary of the Board.

Plans include the starting of construction about July 1st, and a completion date in time for bean and corn harvest this fall.

The new development will be financed by the sale of "Series A Debentures," an investment-type security of the Caro Farmers Cooperative Elevator. Mr. Elden Smith, of the Michigan Farm Bureau is coordinating the program of security sales.

Joining in the sales program will be Robert Schantz, R1, Caro; Clifford Smith, R2 Unionville; Harold Humm, R2 Fairgrove; Alton Reavey, Akron; Fred Bach, Akron; Harry Rohlf, Akron; Clarence Rohlf, Akron; Arnold Shafer, Unionville; Clark Montague, Caro, and Roy Hickey, Fairgrove.
