# Farm Topics

## Top-Dress Old Alfalfa Fields

### For Higher Yields, Savings on Seeds

The life expectancy of old alfalfa fields can be increased by several years when fields are top-dressed liberally with phosphate-potash fertilizer and boron if necessary, according to Midwestern agronomists.  
 C. J. Chapman, University of Wisconsin extension soils specialist, points out that if the plant food is put on this fall it will help the alfalfa resist winter kill and the nutrients will be there in the spring to build next year's crop.  
 Chapman says farmers get several important money-making benefits by maintaining alfalfa stands at a high production rate over a

period of several years. First, you increase profits per acre, because of higher yields and lower costs of production.

Second, you save on seed and also the expense of fitting your land.

For best results in giving new life to old alfalfa stands, Midwestern agronomists recommend top-dressing with 300 to 500 pounds per acre of a high potash fertilizer such as 0-10-30 or 0-9-27. On many soils it is advisable to use a fertilizer containing boron.

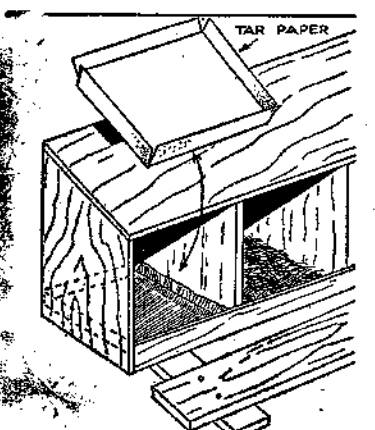
The agronomists emphasize that a soil test can help tell what nutrients are needed and can be a good guide in determining the amount and ratio of fertilizer to use.

## Healthy Cow Belches; Even If So Quietly

A cow or beef steer is very polite—even if unintentionally so. It belches almost inaudibly. And it belches a great deal. It has to—a really ambitious cow will chomp down from 100 to 200 pounds of grass in a day of grazing. When she can't belch, that means bloat. And bloat can mean death.

To amplify the quiet cow-belch and to listen to other inside-animal sounds, University of Minnesota veterinarians use an electronic stethoscope which "listens" at the animal's side and relays the sounds to an amplifier unit and loudspeaker. The once-quiet burp comes out a thunderous "york!" Bloat—too much gas on the stomach—is a common problem in ruminants. Ruminants are complex-stomached animals such as cows and sheep, whose stomachs are in four parts, the first and largest called the rumen. Bloat is most common in dairy cows and beef cattle. Gas develops while the animal is grazing. It usually is eliminated the same way as in man—by belching. But bloat results if, for some unknown reason, the animal cannot relieve itself by belching. University veterinarians induce bloat experimentally and then try to restore the animal's belching ability by drugs or other treatment. They need the instrument to listen for the welcome belch which means "success."

## Nest Liner



You can discourage vermin from infesting nests in the poultry house by inserting tar paper nest liners into the nests before adding straw, next cleaning time. Make liner 2 inches longer than width of nests and slit on the corners. Later, removing the liners will give nesting units a thorough cleaning.

**Heart Attack Fatal For Myron A. Carr**

Myron A. Carr, 79, died of heart disease Friday while fighting a grass fire on his farm at 5061 Burch road in Grant Township. Members of the Burchville Township fire department used a resuscitator but could not revive him.

Coroner Arthur B. Smith and Deputy Sheriff Jerry Armstrong investigated.

Firemen also put out the fire which spread after Mr. Carr set fire to a trash pile.

Mr. Carr was born in Prince Albert, Ont., Dec. 6, 1876, and came to the Thumb area when he was six years old.

Mr. Carr was elder several years of Owendale and Crowell Reorganized Churches of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints.

He was district president of the church's Eastern Michigan Conference two and a half years.

In Cass City, June 18, 1918, he married Miss Ida Abbe.

Surviving are his wife; a son, Lewis, at home, and a daughter, Mrs. Pearl Morley of Elkton.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at the Crowell Latter Day Saints church with Elder John Grice of Port Huron officiating. Burial was in Williamston Cemetery near Owendale.

**MICHIGAN MIRROR NEWS BRIEFS**

When a \$30 million dollar industry is suddenly established in two small communities there are bound to be human problems in addition to those economic and technical.

This is the situation in Whitehall and Montague, two communities north of Muskegon on Lake Michigan. There three companies, Hooker Electro-chemical, DuPont and Union Carbide and Carbon, established multi-million dollar chemical plants to tap Michigan's inexhaustible supply of subterranean salt. They produce caustic soda, chlorine and hydrogen.

"Alive in the summer - dead in the winter" characterized Whitehall and Montague before the entrance of the suddenly mushrooming chemical industry. Once great lumbering towns, these rural communities relied on tourist trade as the chief source of income once lower peninsula lumbering died out.

New residents meant suddenly expanded local business, banking facilities, enlarged schools. Many more homes produced questions that had to be faced and immediately answered, by townspeople accustomed to a less rapid pace of life.

The problem of fitting new residents into the local scene never really arose. In Montague, Hooker plant personnel found quick acceptance as new citizens. "New" people soon served as president and vice-president of the Montague Parent-Teacher Association, president and secretary of the Whitehall Parent Teachers Association, president of the local Rotary Club and president of the American Business Club.

A policy of buying locally and hiring locally whenever possible was adopted by the DuPont company. This gave Whitehall and Montague businessmen a chance to participate in the boom and further cemented friendly relations. Retailers quickly expanded operations to meet community needs.

To provide new and adequate housing, 11 subdivisions were quickly developed. Montague constructed a new high school, planned with an eye to future growth. A new supermarket established operations, others are in the "persistent-rumor" stage.

Permanent expansion is now anticipated by local citizens. The \$30 million dollar figure involves only plants now operating or proposed for the immediate future.

Residents feel this is only the beginning. Companies using the basic materials produced by the new chemical plants are expected to establish facilities nearby.

But with the human problems firmly in hand, both "old" and "new" residents, look forward to a happy, prosperous living.

Meals for millions of the world's starving people are provided by Michigan residents through their support of the Christian Rural Overseas Program more commonly called CROP.

Russell M. Hartzler, CROP director for this state, manages a Lansing office which hurries food and material to refugees, disaster victims and destitute persons without question as to race, creed or nationality. Under CROP some \$640,000 worth of food from Michigan alone was distributed since 1949. This year's goal is \$100,000.

Double benefits exist for the CROP contributor. First he has the knowledge that he is helping feed and equip hungry people. Secondly CROP offers an economically sound way to utilize immense food surpluses which exist in the United States. This, in turn reduces the surplus problem here.

Contributions come as bulk donations of grain, beans and other non-perishable foods, or in cash. Hartzler says that local groups are organized to handle the gifts.

Referring to local organizations as the "strongest foundation for building the future," he states, "13 county groups, Berrien, Gratiot, Lenawee, Monroe, Washtenaw, Jackson, Saginaw, Berry, Eaton, Ingham, Genesee, Kent and Ionia, are doing a fine job. Our goal is to have local organizations in every Michigan county to carry out the task of aiding our needy fellowmen."

The movement is spreading from rural origin to include urban areas.

Biggest boost in stretching the CROP dollar came in 1954 when the federal government authorized release of "surplus food" by private agencies to friendly people of the world.

Using this machinery, one dollar donated to CROP will supply 100 pounds of basic food commodities. A single dollar buys 40 pounds of wheat and 10 pounds each of beans, corn products, butter, dried milk, cheese and rice.

Operating as the relief arm of Church World Service, a co-operating group of religious denominations, CROP personnel distribute food through existing church channels.
