Meanwhile, club members report that work on the addition to the track at the Cass City Recreational Park is proceeding ahead of schedule.

The project is expected to be completed before the opening nome football game this fall at a total cost of about \$2,000. The lub has been helped financially by a donation of \$500 from the Gass City School district.

Club members have finished installing 1,983 feet of drainage tile for the new track and expect Pair to Celebrate to start erecting curb immediately

When the work is done there will be an eight-lane track on the straightaway and six lanes around the rest of the track. Curbing will be built on both sides of the eight lanes and on the inside of the remainder of the track.

The new portion of the track will be built by placing a bed of coarse cinders, followed by fine cinders mixed with clay, club spokesmen explained.

All of the work on the track is eing done by Gavel Club mem-



## Top-Dress Old Alfalfa Fields

#### For Higher Yields, Savings on Seeds

The life expectancy of old alfalfa fields can be increased by several years when fields are top-dressed liberally with phosphate-potash fertilizer and boron if necessary, according to Midwestern agronomists.

C. J. Chapman, University of Wisconsin extension soils specialist, points out that if the plant food is put on this fall it will help the alfalfa resist winter kill and the nutrients will be there in the spring to build next year's crop.

Chapman says farmers get several important money-making benefits by maintaining alfalfa stands at a high production rate over a



Plant food applied in the fall helps resist winter kill and nutrients stay there to help build

period of several years. First, you increase profits per acre, because of higher yields and lower costs of production. Second, you save on seed and also the expense of fitting your

For best results in giving new life to old alfalfa stands, Midwestern agronomists recommend topdressing with 300 to 500 pounds per

acre of a high potash fertilizer such as 0-10-30 or 0-9-27. On many soils it is advisable to use a fertilizer containing boron. The agronomists emphasize that a soil test can help tell what nutri-

ents are needed and can be a good guide in determining the amount and ratio of fertilizer to use.

#### **Healthy Cow Belches**; **Even If So Quietly**

A cow or beef steer is very polite-even if unintentionally so. It belches almost inaudibly. And it belches a great deal. It has toa really ambitious cow will chonk down from 100 to 200 pounds of grass in a day of grazing. When she can't belch, that means bloat. And bloat can mean death.

To amplify the quiet cow-belch and to listen to other inside-animal sounds, University of Minnesotaveterinarians use an electronic stethoscope which "listens" at the animal's side and relays the sounds to an amplifier unit and loudspeaker. The once-quiet hurn comes out a thunderous "york!"

Bloat-too much gas on the stomach-is a common problem in ruminants. Ruminants are complex-stomached animals such as cows and sheep, whose stomachs are in four parts, the first and largest called the rumen.

Bloat is most common in dairy cows and beef cattle. Gas develops while the animal is grazing. It usually is eliminated the same way as in man-by belching. But bloat results if, for some unknown reason, the animal cannot relieve itself by belching.

University veterinarians induce bloat experimentally and then try to restore the animal's belching ability by drugs or other treatment. They need the instrument to listen for the welcome belch which means "success."

#### **Nest Liner**



You can discourage vermin from infesting nests in the poultry house by inserting tar paper liners into the nests before adding straw, next cleaning time. Make liner 2 inches longer than width of nests and slit on the corners. Later, removing the liners will give nesting units a thorough cleaning.







### It's Fun to Cook On a Clean Range

There are times when every well-behaved range gets itself pretty well crusted with grease and grime. It's bound to work less efficiently at times like these, and you, of course, will not enjoy cooking on it either.

Are there easier ways to to this messy job without just scraping and scrubbing? Yes, indeed!

Oven cleaning has been considerably simplified and burners will come clean with a bit of know-

Oven Cleaning The oven should be thoroughly cool before you start cleaning. When it is, apply the oven cleaner to the enameled portions with a sponge or a brush which may come with it. This should be allowed to dry.

Drying depends upon how thickly ou have smeared the cleaner on the oven. If you can apply it in the evening to wash off in the morning, that's fine. Washing will leave it cleaning without scraping or scouring.

The cleaner can also be used on broiling pans. Any racks, however, either in the oven or in the broiler should be soaked in a cleaning powder or detergent until the crusts are loosened, then swished off with a plastic sponge. Once the oven is cleaned it's

smart to line the oven or broiler with aluminum foil to collect any burned food or dripping from pies so that it doesn't cling on the oven. Simply wiping the oven and broiler pan will keep them clean for long periods if the foil is used as it can be changed often.

Surface Cleaning

White or pastel surfaces on any range will wipe off easily either with a soapy cloth or one which has been rinsed off with clear water. If it's greased spattered, use the soap because this will cut the grease.

If the tray to your cooking units is enameled and has become food encrusted, the oven cleaning soluion may be used on them, letting and then rinsing off.

2 teaspoons whole cloves 2 teaspoons whole allspice 2 tablespoons stick cinnamon

Wash grapes and remove them from stems. Place in a pan and steam, with water until soft. Rub fruit through sieve and add remaining ingredients (spices tied in bag). Simmer 20 minutes. Pour into hot sterilized jars and seal at

Small pears are ideal for preserving. They make a wonderful accompaniment to beef, pork, ham or chicken.

Pickled Seckel Pears (Makes 5 pints) 7 nounds Seckel pears 1 tablespoon cinnamon 1 tablespoon allspice 1 tablespoon cloves 1 ounce ginger root 1 pint vinegar 1 pint water

3½ pounds sugar Pare stems, leaving stems on. Tie spices in a bag and add to vinegar, water and sugar; boil mixture 5 minutes. Add pears, a few at a time and cook until tender and clear. Place pears in jar, pour in syrup and seal. This same recipe may be used, substituting crabapples for pears. Do not pare the fruit in this case.
