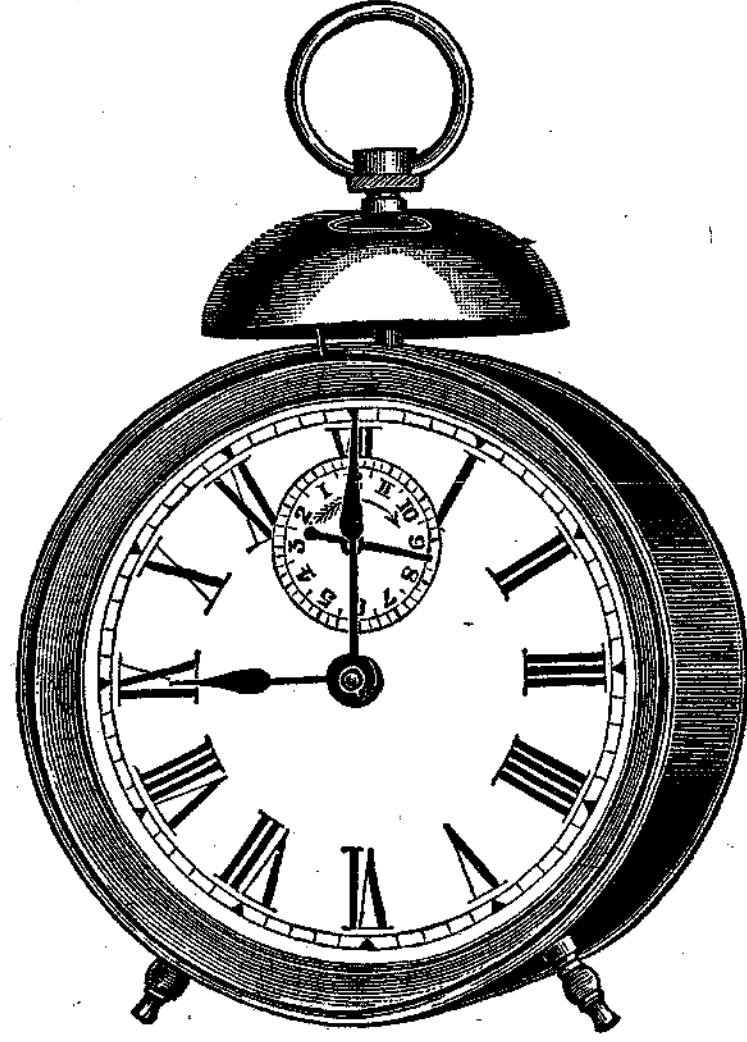

Many farmers in Tuscola County would have better luck on yields if they work the soil deep in the fall before planting the following spring.

State University's soil science department. The tests showed that on many soils deep tillage—from 12 to 16 inches—with a field cultivator in the autumn will bring the best yields.

weighted packer wheels on the drill will do the job. Kehler points out that it's best to plant immediately after plowing in the spring.

Sugar beets, the MSU tests showed, are more sensitive to excessive soil compaction than are corn, tomatoes, soybeans, oats and wheat. Tests in both the greenhouse and field have shown this.

Free Fruit Folder Now Available

A new extension folder, No. F-924, available at the Tuscola County extension office, will tell you the why and where-fors of fruit fertilization, says assistant county agricultural agent Don R. Kehler.

Information is included on the nutrients needed, how to determine needs, what fertilizer to apply and when and where to apply it, and how to use cover crops, mulches and manure to the best advantage.

Written by members of the Michigan State University department of horticulture, the folder also includes an analysis table of commonly available fertilizers.

**Feeder Cattle Sales Slated in State**  
 Farmers in Tuscola County who have a supply of grain and forage to be marketed during the next year may well consider a feeder cattle program, according to Alfred Ballweg, county agricultural agent. The Thunder Bay Beef Breeders' Association held their second annual feeder cattle sale at the Alpena Livestock Yards, 12 miles west of Alpena on M-32, Wednesday, October 10. The local breeders will market some 450 steer and heifer calves and 150 yearling cattle. The following day, Thursday, Oct. 11, will mark the 11th annual sale for the Northern Michigan Beef Breeders' Association group at Gaylord when they will market a crop of 1,000 calves and 450 yearlings. A week later on October 18 the Northeastern Michigan Hereford Calf Association with headquarters at West Branch will assemble 1,500 Hereford steer and heifer calves.  
 The cattle in these three sales are out of commercial beef cows and sired by purebred beef bulls. They will be assembled the two days before each sale, sorted into uniform groups of 5 to 15 head, according to sex, weight, breeding, finish and market quality. The feed lot operators may see the cattle in the pens from which they will sell the day before the sale. Upon each pen a card will show the consignor's name, the cattle weight as they arrived at the yard, the number of cattle and their average weight. They will sell at auction starting at 12:00 noon.  
 A cattle feeding program, according to Animal Husbandry Extension Specialist, W. L. Finley of Michigan State University, should provide a market for the home grown feed supply. Corn silage is one of the best ways of marketing the corn crop; however, 1 1/2 to 2 pounds per head per day of a 32% or higher protein supplement will improve feeding efficiency. Cattle might well use lots of silage and other forage during the early part of their feeding period but add plenty of grain the last half to be sure the cattle are fat enough for their grade when marketed. A stillbestrol supplement should be used the last three to five months before marketing. Finley says plan your top "good" "choice" and "prime" cattle for a fall market, if you can. The plain cattle will usually sell best from March to June.  
 If heifer calves can be purchased for 3 to 5 cents per pound less than steers you may like them also. They should be marketed at 900 pounds or less in weight.  
 These northern Michigan calves will be weaned, taught to eat whole oats and dry hay. They will be 5 to 7 months of age and weighing 350 to 450 pounds. The yearlings will be well grown 500 to 700 pounders ready to start a full feeding program.

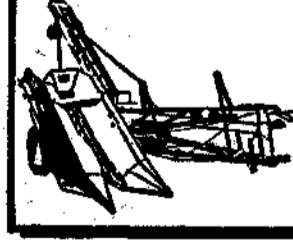

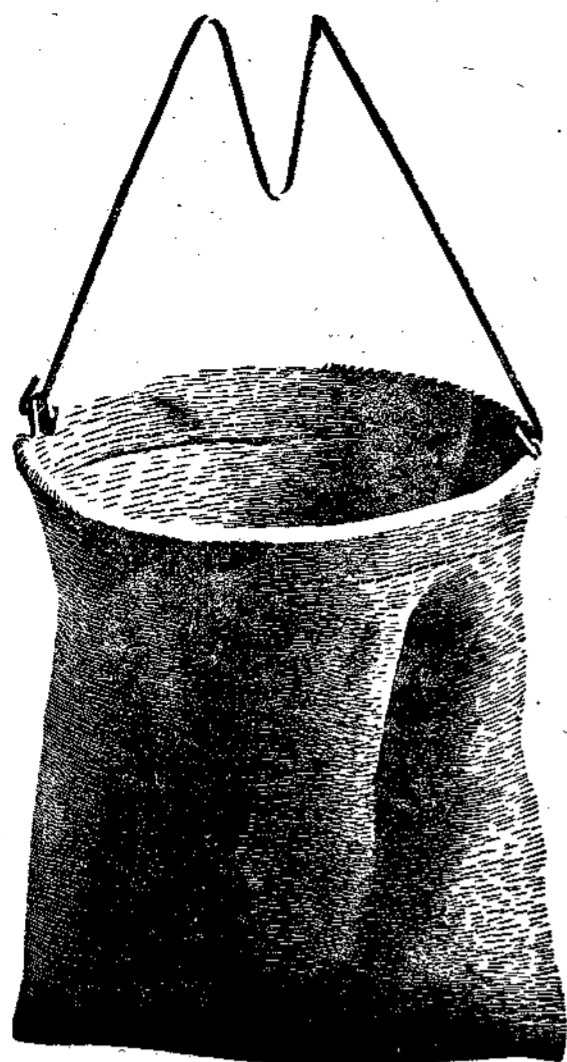

# Michigan Mirror News In Brief

Fall "color tours" are in order as autumn brings glorious hues to trees and shrubs throughout northern Michigan and the Upper Peninsula.

So says Robert Furlong, director of the State Tourist Council.

Plugging for leisurely drives through areas where color reigns as king, Furlong urges Michigan residents to see their state at its best.

To help you plan a tour at exactly the time colors are at their height, the council offers a tailored information service.

Send a self-addressed post card to the tourist office at Lansing stating where you plan to travel in Michigan. Just before the color is at its peak in the area you name, the council will remail your card to you saying "now is the time."

And best of all—the whole majestic show is free.

The autumn season also gives the Tourist Council a breathing

period to evaluate last summer's tourist business.

Figures now coming in indicate that this was a "pretty good" tourist year—although it did not reach pre-season expectations. Bad weather played a major role in limiting tourist spending.

"Tourist traffic through Michigan was good, but people kept moving around in search of better weather," Furlong comments. "In all, we had four inches more rainfall this summer."

Mackinac Bridge construction brought people flocking to the straits to see the new structure. Traffic between the two peninsulas was up 1½ per cent over last year.

Until all figures are in, best "guesstimates" by the Council are:

Summer tourist business won't reach the \$800 million level predicted last spring.

But it won't fall below the \$600 million mark set last year.

The big job handled by the

"little people" in Michigan's state government is being done well according to C. J. Hess, deputy civil service director.

While politicians are making headlines in newspapers, the business of government continues to run smoothly in the hands of some 25,000 state employees who provide services through 117 state agencies.

Scientific appraisal through promotional examinations given employees seeking better positions shows that 71 per cent of them are qualified to handle more important jobs.

The system of competitive examinations for promotion is popular with state workers, Hess asserts. It gives an employe a stake in his own promotion—a goal reached by personal achievement.

Out of all those taking examinations only 10 per cent have been found unsuitable for advancement.

The rating plan was introduced in 1949 to provide a standard

yardstick for measuring worker aptitude, efficiency and satisfaction. Before that time promotions were based on recommendations of agency and department heads.

If an employe is not satisfied with his rating, which is always presented for his signature, he can appeal for a change in jobs, Hess explained. "We have conducted surveys that show even those denied better ratings are for the most part satisfied with the test, and show determination to do better the next time," he concludes.

A unique Michigan newspaper is served each Friday to perhaps the most eager "captive" audience a publication could desire. This newspaper—"The Spectator"—is the weekly at Jackson prison.

Barbara Howarth, Cass City sophomore at Michigan State College, was recently tapped for membership in the Tower Guard, a sophomore women's honorary organization.

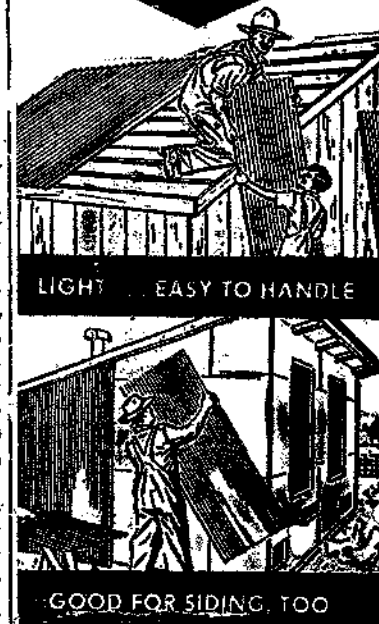
**Ten Years Ago.**

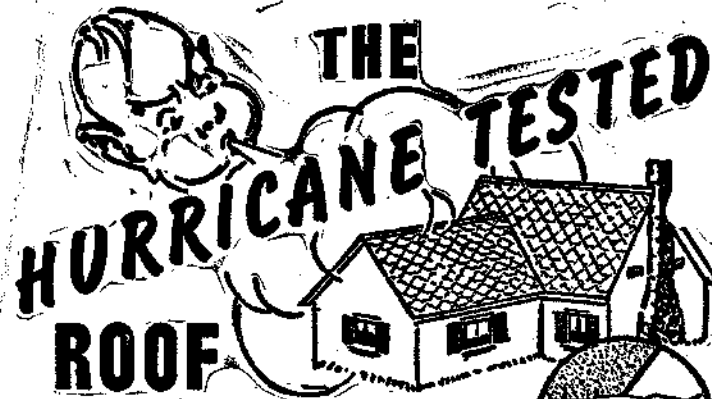

Continued from page one. In discussing juvenile and teenage recreation, it was felt that although community centers offered a partial contribution, they did not solve the problems. Many delegates thought that perhaps another part of the solution lay in the home and family.

Other topics of interest were road construction programs, the integration of immigrant labor into community life, the attraction of small commercial business to towns with increasing industrial populations and a re-evaluation of local tax structure in order to provide revenues for the services essential to increased population.

The guest speaker, Mr. David C. Lowe, of Detroit Marine Terminals, Inc., discussed enthusiastically the growth potential of the Thumb as a lake port area and emphasized the local planning and imagination necessary by the Thumb community if this growth is to be profitable and orderly, rather than chaotic.

Dr. Howard McClusky, Miss Cynthia Jones and William P. Barth, all of the University of Michigan Community Adult Education staff, also stressed the fact that the solutions to these problems can only come through organized group activities of the area people themselves. They noted, however, that there are various services available to the community from the state, and that these services are too frequently unused. They pointed out, further, that the Community Adult Education Program was available for consultation and in addition has facilities for arranging county or regional meetings with various agency state representatives.

Popular religious recordings were compared with great hymns of the church.

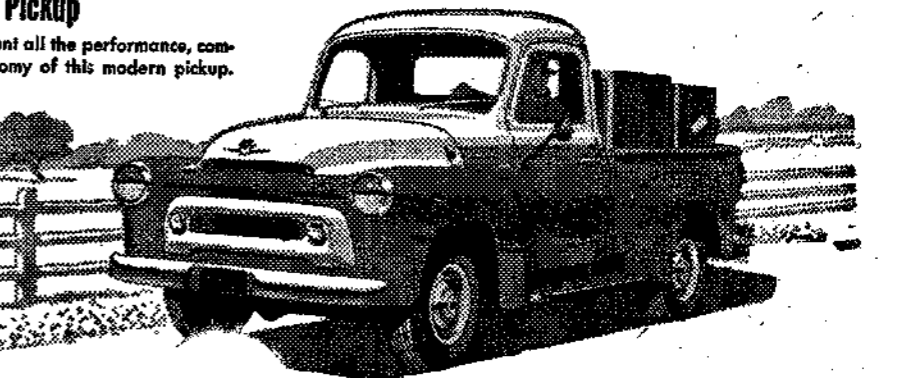

## McHales Celebrate 45th Anniversary

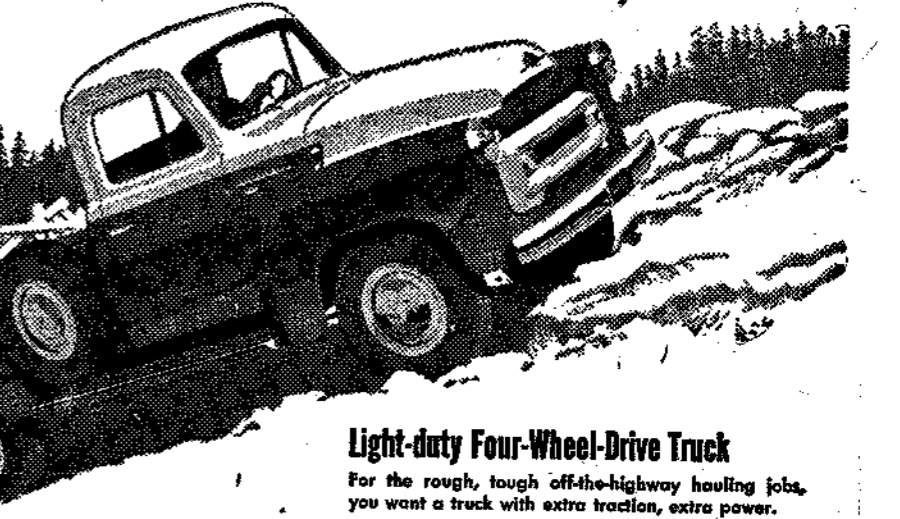

The McHales have lived in the same house for 42 years. Attending the dinner were their seven children, 17 grandchildren and a few close friends.



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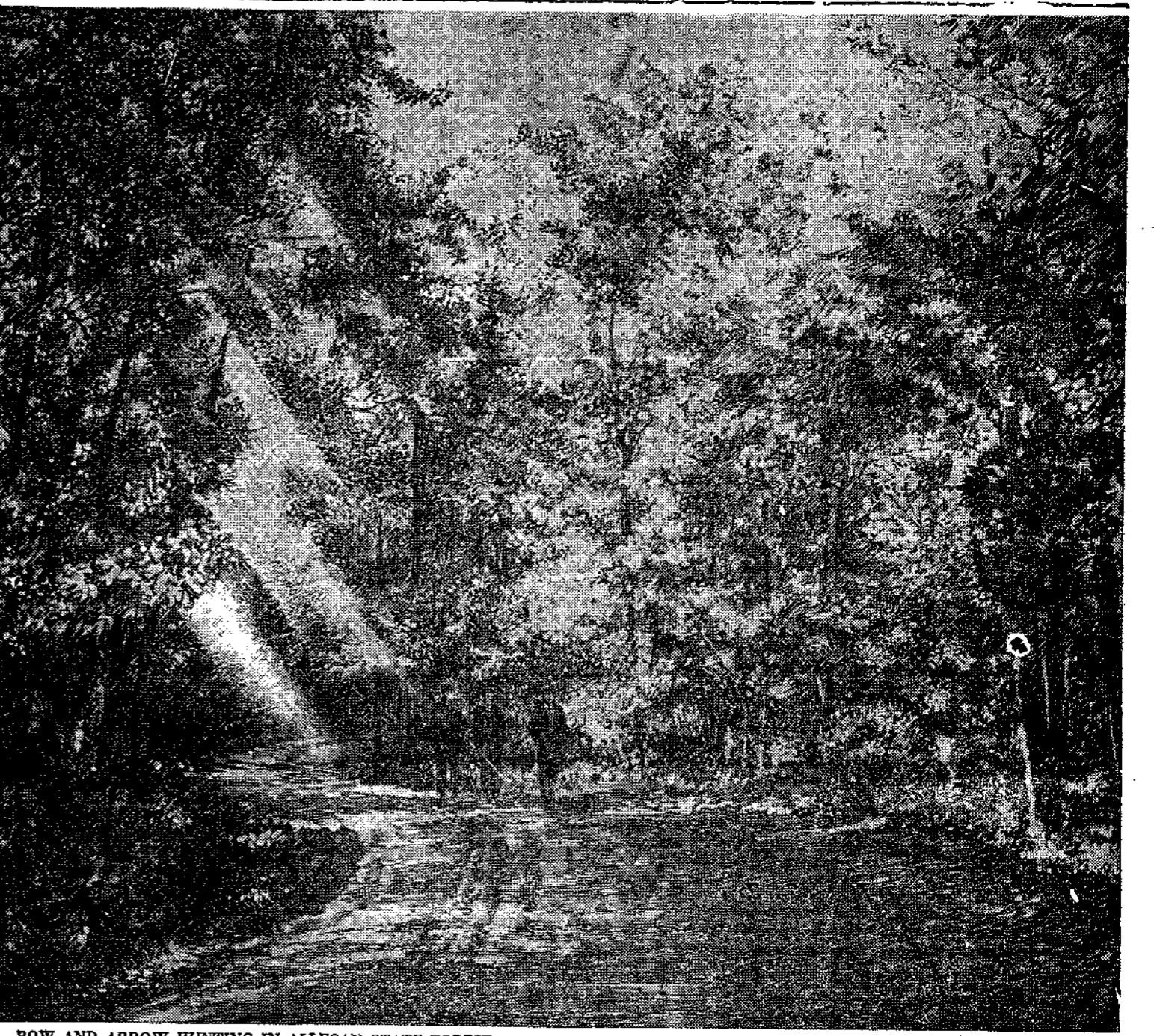
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
