For seasoning, put green lumber

in a stack on a firm foundation that slopes slightly to the rear Make sure air circulates well un der the stack. Put stickers every two feet under each layer of lumber. Each sticker should be directly over the one under it.

Keep at least two inches between each pair of boards in the stack. If you are drying two-by-fours, you should put them on the bottom of the stack and on edge. Use low-grade lumber to roof over the stack.

,100 closed districts (those having no schools) join with a nearby operating school system by July , 1957. Alternative: the County Board of Education will designate new district lines. State Superintendent of Public Instruction Clair L. Taylor states that his office is receiving notification of annexations at an average of one per day. Remaining, however, are about 500 districts which must take action before the end of June.

In some of these there is bitter controversy about what steps to take.

Extensive tissue tests by the Food and Drug Administration have confirmed previous findings by State experiment stations that no detectable amount of the hormone-like chemical, stilbestrol, is present in meat from steers fed this substance in fattening rations. The FDA tests contradict claims made in some quarters that such meat contains enough stilbestrol to render it unsafe for human consumption,

Previous work by a member of State experiment stations and by USDA's Agricultural Research Service at Beltsville, Md., showed that use of stilbestrol can increase the rate and economy of gain in beef cattle without adverse effect on meat quality as measured by usual evaluation methods, including taste-panel tests.

Sensitivity of the tissue-assay method used by the Food and Drug Administration was at least 2 parts per billion-meaning that the drug could have been detected if present in traces as small as 2 parts in a billion parts of meat tested. More than 700 mice were used testing the meat samples for estrogenic activity.





Add powdered fruit pectin to fruit and mix well. Place over high heat and stir until mixture comes to a hard boil. Stir in sugar, Bring to a full, rolling boil; boil hard 1 minute. Remove from heat. stir and skim for 5 minutes. Ladle into glasses. Parraffin at once. Fresh, mashed pumpkin or the

canned pumpkin may be used in the following recipe for an appetizing butter: **Pumpkin Butter**

(Makes 7 medium glasses) 3¼ cups cooked pumpkin 41/2 cups sugar

1 tablespoon pumpkin pię spice 1 box powdered fruit pectin Measure sugar. Measure pumpkin and place in large saucepan. Add spice and powdered fruit pectin to pumpkin, mixing well. Place over high heat and stir until mixture comes to hard boil. Stir in sugar. Bring to a full, rolling boil and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and ladle quickly into glasses. Cover at once with 1%-inch hot paraffin.
