



Creamy Prune Pie (Makes 1 9-inch ple) 1 can (9-ounce) crushed

pineapple ¼ cup sugar

- tablespoon cornstarch
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice Pastry for single 9-inch pie
- 1 cup cooked prunes
- 2 eggs ½ cup sugar
- teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon vanilla

1 cup commercial soured cream

Heat undrained pineapple. Blend sugar and cornstarch thoroughly, add to pineapple and cook and stir until mixture boils and thickens. Blend in lemon juice. Cool. Line pie pan with pastry, making high fluted rim. Spread cooled pineapple over bottom. Top with pitted prune halves. Beat eggs with sugar, salt and vanilla. Blend in sour cream. Pour carefully over fruit. Bake in a hot (400°F.) oven for 10 minutes. Reduce heat to moderate (350°F.) and bake 35 minutes longer or until just set in center. Cool thoroughly before cutting.
