Announce Christmas Post Office Hours

Christmas hours at the Cass City Post Office were announced this week by Postmaster Chester Muntz. The post office will be open on the usual hours and in addition will be open Saturday afternoons, Dec. 8, 15 and 22, and Thursday afternoons, Dec. 18 and 20.

Pointing up the need for your cooperation on his 1956 "Mail Early For Christmas" Campaign, Postmaster Muntz says if you will follow these three simple rules, all of your gifts can be delivered before Christmas Day: 1. Wrap them securely. 2. Address them correctly. 3. Mail them early. Amplifying these rules, the Postmaster said, "Avoid the risk of mailing poorly wrapped packages. Use corrugated mailing cartons, plenty of heavy brown wrapping paper, and be sure that every package is tied with strong cord. Cartons containing several gift packages should be stuffed with tissue or old newspapers to cushion the shocks." He also reminds us that size and weight limitations for Parcel Post packages vary according to place of mailing and destination, and advises us to secure Pamphlet No. 2 at the Post Office, telling all about Packaging and Wrapping Parcels for Mailing, and Pamphlet No. 8, giving complete details on Domestic Postage Rates and Fees.

Speaking about correct addressing of Christmas gifts and cards, the Postmaster said: "Be sure your Christmas mailing list is up to date and that you have the complete name, address, zone number, city and state for everyone on your list. Send all your Christmas cards by First-Class mail, because they will be processed and delivered quicker, and they'll be forwarded, or returned, if it becomes necessary." Only Christmas cards sent First-Class mail may carry written messages, a custom everyone enjoys. Moreover, Christmas card envelopes smaller than 2 1/4 in. by 4 in. or larger than 9 in. by 12 in. require hand cancellation, and thus, must carry First-Class postage.

The Postmaster urges everyone to secure free labels at the Post Office marked "All for Local Delivery" and "All for Out of Town Delivery." Then, sort your Christmas cards accordingly, tie them in two separate bundles with each address facing the same way, and attach the correct label to each bundle.

For the first time in several years, the Cass City Junior Livestock Club failed to produce a champion in the annual Junior Livestock Show at Detroit, held Wednesday.

The champion steer was a Black Angus shown by a Presque Isle 4-H'er, who lives 800 miles from Detroit, and the champion fat lamb was exhibited by George Good of Lansing. His Shropshires also were judged the top pen at the show.

Although Cass City entries failed to produce a champion, local exhibitors finished well up in the competition.

Linda Severance had the reserve champion pen and the second place lamb in the Shropshire division.

In the Southdown competition, Arthur Severance showed the third place pen and the fourth place individual, Janet Perry, whose brother Jack won the championship in 1955, had the eighth place Southdown pen and the fifth place Southdown individual.

Virginia Perry had the ninth place Southdown pen and eighth place individual.

Larry Goodall had both the first pen and first individual in the crossbred sheep competition.

In the steer division, Hugh Milligan exhibited the first place lightweight Shorthorn and won the reserve championship of the Shorthorn class with the same steer.

Allan Milligan had the third place lightweight Shorthorn and Hugh Milligan also showed the 16th place lightweight.

Arthur Randall's lightweight Shorthorn was judged 17th in its class.

There were more than 500 entries from 31 counties in Michigan competing at the show this year. The animals were to have been auctioned Thursday afternoon to restaurants, hotels, supermarkets and packers.

Leonard Kyle to Speak in Sandusky

"Decisions for profit in '57" is the general theme of a meeting to be held in Sandusky County next month.

Can I make money by using the Soil Bank program on my farm? How do changes in the social security law affect me? How about new income tax regulations? What prices can I expect for products next year?

Some of the more important decisions which you must make in your 1957 farm operation depend upon the answers to these questions.

These questions will be discussed in detail at a meeting to be held Thursday, December 13, at 1:30 p. m., in the Farm Bureau Building, Sandusky, according to Alden E. Orr, county agent.

Agricultural Economics specialist, Leonard Kyle, of Michigan State University is working with the county extension office on this event. He will show how you can decide whether you should take part in the Soil Bank program. He will point out how it can affect your total profit as well as some other things which may affect your decision.

Wise decisions will help increase farm profits. Wise decisions also depend upon accurate information, so plan to attend the meeting on December 13 at Sandusky to get these facts.

The local social security representative will be present to handle questions on this subject. A member of the ASC office has also been invited to attend.

Dr. Frank Morris and Mrs. Helen Stevens, village health officers, this week issued a warning to parents to check on diphtheria inoculations for their children.

To be safe, the officers said, children should have a shot when young and a booster shot when about five years old—inoculation immunity lasts only about five years.

With the outbreak of the disease in Detroit, parents should be extra careful at this time. It is wrong to assume that one inoculation provides lifetime immunity they said.

John Meininger led both the offense and defense as he netted 21 points and grabbed the majority of the rebounds for Cass City.

The Hawks looked like world beaters in the first quarter as they jumped into a 27-9 lead with accurate shooting and deft ball handling.

After the first period they failed to operate as smoothly and committed many of the errors expected in an opening game. The team recorded a very good 42 per cent shooting average for the night.

The first quarter drive was led by Dick Hanby, who caged 12 of his 16 points for the evening, and Meininger who netted seven.

In the second period, Caro edged the Hawks by posting a 17-14 margin and Cass City led at the half, 41-26.

In a free scoring third period, Caro dropped in 24 points and the Hawks countered with 21. With Cass City slowing the tempo of the game, the Tigers netted just eight points in the final period

Corn Growers To Vote in County Dec. 11

Commercial corn growers in Tuscola County will vote at selected sites Tuesday, Dec. 11, to decide the type of corn program in 1957 and later corn crops.

Charles B. Eckfeld, office manager of the Tuscola County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said this week.

Two choices face the growers. If two-thirds favor the corn base acreage program it will be in effect and if more than a third approve acreage allotment, the allotments will be in effect.

Under a corn base acreage program, support would be at a national average of \$131 a bushel. Under an acreage allotment program, support would be \$136 a bushel for 1957.

The polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. Farmers in Elkland Township will vote at the Damm Implement Store in Cass City. Elmwood residents will vote at the fire hall in Gagetown and Novesta farmers at the Novesta Town Hall.

Wheat Price May Be Above Supports

The Michigan farm price of wheat should be at or slightly above support prices during the first half of 1957. This is the report made by Vernon Sorenson, Michigan State University agricultural economist, according to Alfred Ballweg, county agricultural agent.

Michigan prices will be helped by the fact that soft red winter wheat is in lower supply than at any time since 1951. Stocks on hand this summer were lower in 1955, and 1956 production was down 23 million bushels from last year.

The Michigan navy bean crop is 12 per cent larger than last year's crop, and 50 per cent above the 1945-54 average.

Unless early winter bean prices are well below support levels, it probably will not pay to store over the winter and sell in spring or early summer.

If farmers complied with acreage allotments, Sorenson suggests that they place excess corn under loan. If they did not comply, he advises storing for later sale only if the early winter price of No. 2 corn is below \$1.25 per bushel.

Unusual Pastry Proves Tempting

This is the season when you can serve pastry even with a hearty dinner. Appetites are ready for it and will most certainly be tempted with good fare.

Here's a pie that features a single crust of crisp pastry and a creamy mixture with sweet prunes and crushed pineapple. It's not a time-consuming recipe and yet the results are unusually delicious:

Creamy Prune Pie
(Makes 9-inch pie)
1 can (9-ounce) crushed pineapple
1/2 cup sugar
1 tablespoon cornstarch
1 tablespoon lemon juice
Pastry for single 9-inch pie
1 cup cooked prunes
2 eggs
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup commercial soured cream

Heat undrained pineapple. Blend sugar and cornstarch thoroughly, add to pineapple and cook and stir until mixture boils and thickens. Blend in lemon juice. Cool. Line pie pan with pastry, making high fluted rim. Spread cooled pineapple over bottom. Top with pitted prune halves. Beat eggs with sugar, salt and vanilla. Blend in sour cream. Pour carefully over fruit. Bake in a hot (400°F.) oven for 10 minutes. Reduce heat to moderate (350°F.) and bake 35 minutes longer or until just set in center. Cool thoroughly before cutting.

You'll want to keep this recipe for tarts handy during holiday time as they have a festive air:

Pecan Tarts
(Makes 8)
1/2 cup water
3 1/2 tablespoons instant tapioca
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup dark corn syrup
3 eggs, slightly beaten
2 tablespoons butter
1/2 cup pecans, coarsely chopped
8 tart shells

Combine water, tapioca, sugar and salt and mix well in saucepan. Bring mixture to full boil, stirring constantly. Remove from fire; add corn syrup, eggs and butter; stir until blended. Cool, stirring occasionally. Place a tablespoon full of nuts in bottom of each unbaked tart shell, fill with cooked mixture and bake in a hot (425°F.) oven for 20 minutes or until browned. Serve plain or with whipped cream.

MICHIGAN MIRROR NEWS BRIEFS

Missing, 23,000 Michigan veterans! That's the number who have yet to apply for their state Korean bonus.

Maj. Gen. George C. Moran, state adjutant general, warns that the time is now growing short. According to the terms of the act, formal application must be in the mails before midnight of March 6, 1957.

Except for the stragglers, most of the Michigan bonus money is paid. General Moran states that payments now total more than \$56 million to some 204,170 veterans. There were 3,948 claims rejected and 1,646 are still being processed.

When the state bonus act first took effect, 14 Army officers and 177 civil service employees were needed to handle the avalanche of claims. Now only one officer and 14 civilian employees remain on the staff.

About 85 to 90 claims are received weekly. At this rate only some 700 will be received by the March 6 deadline. The question remains: where are the 22,300 other eligible veterans?

"Christmas Tree Boulevard," a stretch of US Highway 27 in Osego County, is once again open for a one month season that will provide an ultimate \$5 million crop and happiness in thousands of homes throughout the state.

Ordinarily a normal part of the state highway system, Christmas Tree Boulevard gets its name from the many trucker's depots that once each year set up shop, stock-piling the sweet-smelling greenery that means Christmas throughout southern Michigan and parts of Ohio and Indiana.

Some 1,350,000 trees make up the 1956 crop. By Dec. 14 most will be in city lots or already reaching homes for decoration.

While the selling season is short, approximately one month, it is the result of long years of hard work in a risky business. A scotch pine may bring around \$1.75 at depots, but first it must survive eight years of weather, insects and fire.

The "Boiler Room" Salesmen are busy again in Michigan.

Latest story comes from Grand Rapids where they sold more than 100,000 booklets supposedly "for" Kent county civil defense. Now the complaints are rolling in to the city's Better Business Bureau. A boiler room salesman gets his name from the operation he carries on, usually from a temporary office using a telephone to make all contacts. In the trade they're called "phonemen."

Operating just within the law, the professional phoneman finds civic organizations, businessmen and the general public easy pickings.

His method follows a similar pattern wherever he sets up operations. First he finds a civic organization or some legitimate group who wants to raise money for a worthy cause or promote a worthwhile project. He promises the group he will do the job "professionally" and raise more money than could be obtained otherwise. The gimmick: he gets a percentage of all the money pledged.

Next step is to start telephoning. It may be calls to merchants to "sell" advertising or it may be to the general public asking for "pledges" of money for the worthy cause. Phonemen use the name of the organization freely and drop names of well known local personages to warm-up their "victims."

They collect their percentage as soon as they finish, move on to another town and leave the civic group to collect all the "pledges" as well as the woes that follow. In the case of pledges, many groups learn to their sorrow that they have a difficult time collecting the money once the professionals are gone.

The Civil Defense booklet in Grand Rapids is a typical example. There, they promised that the book would be "local" in nature and assured officials that no boiler room tactics would be used. They followed up their "promise" by selling 600 local merchant and trucking costs must be deducted first. And there is no accurate guide to anticipate the market in advance. What's your best defense against the phonemen? The Better Business Bureau urges common sense caution. Know the organization or charity requesting the donation. If you are a merchant, be careful of special advertising schemes. When you have doubts, a call to your local BBB, Chamber of Commerce or newspaper may keep your money out of the "phonemen's" pockets.

Pay Indemnities For Inspected Cattle

Tuscola County farmers who through eight months of age. And have brucellosis-infected cattle this vaccination can continue for can get rid of the animals right up to three years or until the away and be paid an indemnity or herd is brucellosis-free.

If a farmer wants to show that he has a brucellosis-free herd, he can get a certificate to that effect from the state veterinarian. But that means the herd must (1) pass three consecutive blood tests if an initial test shows infection. The first and last of these three tests must be at least twelve months apart. (2) If there is no infection present, the herd must pass two consecutive blood tests followed by one clean blood test. The milk ring tests must not be more than 360 days or less than 90 days apart.

To keep the certification, the herd must pass a clean blood test annually. Although only two per cent of Michigan's cattle are infected, the number could increase sharply if the eradication program relaxes, insists George Parsons, extension dairyman at Michigan State University. The goal of the eradication program is all brucellosis-free herds in the Wolverine state by 1960, he says.

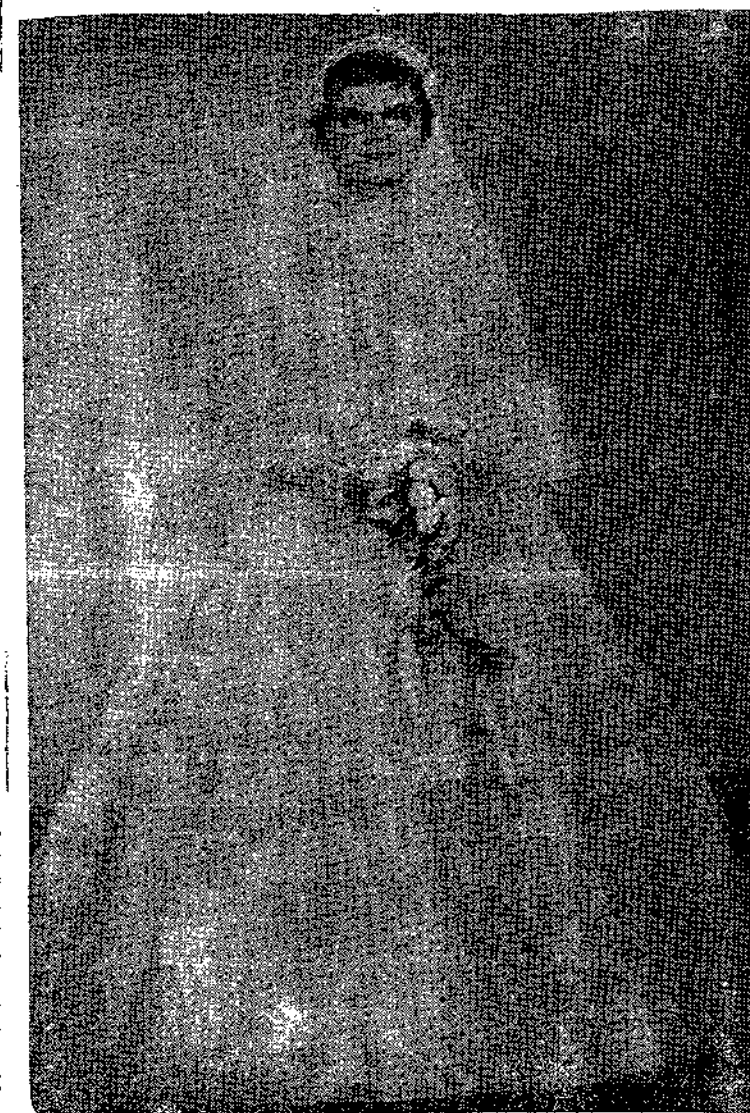

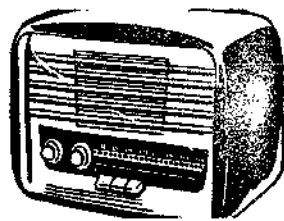

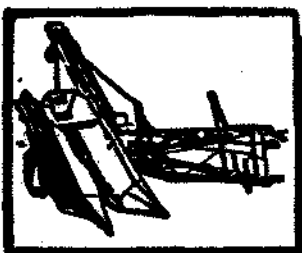

Hewens Chairman of Michigan Week

Bath Towels Make Excellent Yule Gifts, Says Mrs. Clark

Bath towel sets, sheets and pillow cases make excellent gifts for almost anyone on your shopping list. Mrs. Frances T. Clark, county home demonstration agent, has a few suggestions when buying these items for the shopper who is interested in getting the most for his money.

Examine closely the towels you are buying. The closer and the more compact the pile, the more absorbent the towel. You will also find that a more absorbent towel has double loops. Color also affects the absorbency of the towel. White towels are the most absorbent with pastel shades next. Deep tones have the lowest rate of absorbency.

Watch for the color-fast label. It is your guarantee that the towels you are buying will not bleed when washed. Dark colored towels, however, tend to bleed and lint greatly when washed.

Wide decorative borders will shrink more than the rest of the towel, so shop for narrow borders. Sheets and pillow cases of high quality contain smooth, evenly spun yarns while those of low quality contain fuzzy, uneven yarns. To give more balanced wear a sheet should have approximately the same number of threads of the same size and quality in both warp and filling. Examine the selvages of the sheets. The best sheets have extra yarns woven in to reinforce the edges against strain and tears.

A heavyweight muslin sheet is strong, sturdy and durable and is a good selection where hard wear is expected. The percale sheet is made of finer yarns, has more yarns to the inch, is lighter weight and is second in line for breaking strength. It is a more expensive sheet and is often preferred for its softness, luxury and fine appearance.

The best length sheet for standard size beds is 108 inches, points out Mrs. Clark. The width of the sheet should be 24 inches wider than the mattress. The ideal pillow case is two inches wider than the pillow.
