Easy Path

REMEMBER as a child lying on the floor before the open fireplace, one gray afternoon, picturing hobgoblins, ghosts and deeds of deering do in the bright, warm flames that leaped and crackled from the seasoned hickory logs that spread a comfortable warmth against the night's cold chill.

A faint sound of footsteps came along the rocky road—a sound that might have been the wind walking in the tree tops or those moving things which cannot be seen. The steps grew louder, then stopped in front of our door from whence came a timid knocking. At my father's invitation of "come in" the door opened softly, and there, lighted against the black night, stood a bent, feeble old man with eyes like weak flames, asking in a strange creaking voice:

"Would you give an old man shelter for the night, and a bite to sup?"

A look of complete relief came into the face of the wayfarer as Father, who never turned away friend or stranger from his door said:

"Come in, Neighbor. And welcome."

When the top job in a department pays less than subordinate positions, it is understandable that competent, professional people would prefer not to be "promoted."

Perhaps less desirable than the salary deficiency is the political aspect. The administrator must run for office each term. This is almost always a physical and emotional trial as well as an expensive one.

The "boss" is always a target for fair and even unfair criticism from citizens or political opponents. There are, for instance, many who believe that the Governor's blasts at Charles M. Ziegler were much more for political reasons than any other.

Some key appointed positions are little better. John H. McCarthy, chairman of the Public Service Commission since 1949, announced his resignation effective the first of the year. His salary is \$9,000, only \$500 more than it was when he accepted the job. At the same time, he has been directing staff people who are paid more than he is, including one employee paid \$13,800.

Legislators have indicated some inclination to improve this matter in the coming session. If action is not taken, the situation will grow less and less practical as other salaries increase. And it will become more and more difficult to find capable men willing to work for less than those whose activities they direct and whose actions they are responsible for.

"From that day to this, like the apostles of old, with 'neither gold, nor silver, nor brass in my purse' I have devoted my life to wandering from state to state; house to house with a warning to all mankind: My friend, how can you risk your happy home, the safety of your loved ones to the unbridled fury of the storms, when for a few paltry dollars you can be protected from the all-devouring flame of lightning? No, I do not sell them, and don't ask me where to buy them. Don't delay! You will thank me when your house is wired and your loved ones protected from the wolfish thunder of the lightning's tortured howling in the fury of a summer storm."

Next morning, after many thanks for the night's lodging, he was on his way to warn our neighbors.

About a month afterwards a light spring wagon drove up to our door with two men in it. The wagon was loaded with "miles" of shining wire, brass fittings, glass balls and golden arrows. In those days lightning rod agents were frowned upon by the backwoods farmers, but Dad was not hard to convince that for "a few paltry dollars" (same expression used by the old man) our home could have complete protection from stray bolts of lightning. He signed on the dotted line while the men stabled their horses and went to work hacking and hewing. Like a miracle our home blossomed out with sharp spears pointing heavenward from every gable and one from the center which held a blue glass ball, surmounted with a golden arrow, that the men assured me would always point out the direction of every bolt of lightning.

Bananas broiled with Canadian bacon make an ideal luncheon salad accompaniment. Just brush peeled slices (1/3 banana cut on the diagonal) with honey. Wrap a slice of Canadian bacon around each slice as far as it will go and secure it with a toothpick. Place on a broiler pan and broil, 4 inches from the heat, turning it to broil all sides.

MICHIGAN MIRROR NEWS BRIEFS

Who wants to be foreman in a shop where workers are paid higher than the supervisor? Who wants to be boss of a business where employees earn more than the man with most responsibility? The answer, obviously, is, "not many."

Yet the income circumstances outlined above are exactly that our state government provides for several important state positions. And situation plays a big part in the lack of enthusiastic candidates.

The state superintendent of public instruction is paid \$12,500 per year. He is responsible for the education of Michigan's nearly 1 1/2 million children. But four employees of his department, all of whom enjoy the securities of civil service, receive higher salaries. The present superintendent has indicated he has not yet decided whether he will run for re-election in April. Surely finances must play an important part in his decision. If he had maintained his former capacity as deputy superintendent, he would now in all probability be drawing more than \$15,000 per year. Superintendents of schools in many localities are paid this amount. In Detroit and several of the larger cities salaries are as high as \$30,000.

The tremendous responsibility of the state highway system rests in the hands of a man paid \$12,500. He handles more than \$200 million per year. On the highway staff are at least four people receiving salaries higher than the commissioner.

First steps to form such an organization were taken. An executive committee was appointed to study all aspects.

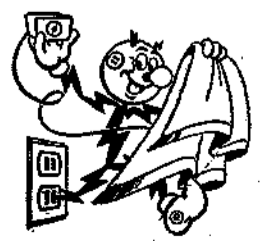

BULEN TALKS Cars

150 MILES PER GALLON

Once upon a time there was a scientist who took an ordinary car out on the highway and got 150 miles to a gallon of gas. That's right, 150 miles to the gallon—and he didn't have a magic carburetor or a car that would run on water or any Buck Rogers dream like that.

It was all quite legitimate. The only trouble is it wouldn't be practical for ordinary driving. First of all, recognizing that the drag of the tires used up most of a car's power, he shaved the treads down until they were just razor sharp edges touching the road. Then he inflated them to 110 pounds pressure.

Then he put ridiculously light oil in the bearings. He accelerated the car to 20 miles an hour, threw in the clutch and turned off the motor and let it coast almost to a standstill before repeating the performance.

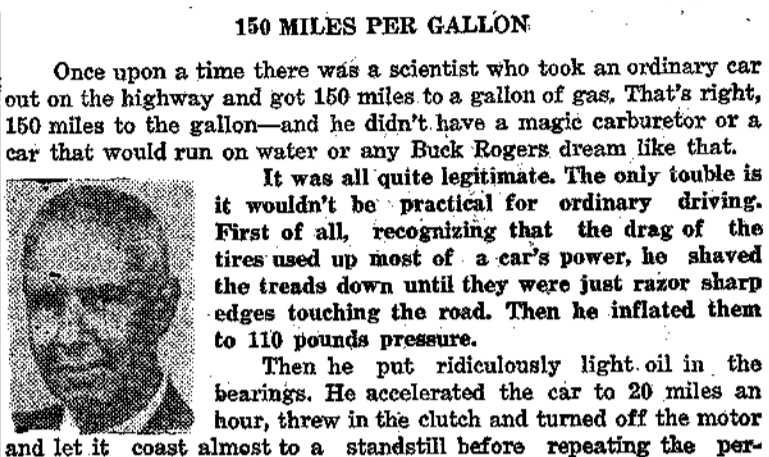
It's impossible for you and I to get 150 miles to the gallon, or anywhere near it, but the experiment did prove that tires, lubrication and driving habits have a tremendous amount to do with the kind of mileage we get from our cars.

Some of the strangest things can help increase your miles per gallon. Racing drivers know that a gleaming smooth polish helps cut down the car's wind resistance at high speeds (wind resistance is four times as great at 50 miles an hour as at 25). A smooth polish can actually give an extra four or five miles to the gallon while travelling at a steady 50.

Proper and regular lubrication is vitally important, to cut gas costs while you have the car and to assure a better price when you trade-in. If we've lubricated your car regularly, we'll know what fine shape it's in when you come around to trade. Predict Strong Beef Prices in Early '57

Cattle prices will average higher during the first half of next year than during early 1956, according to Alfred Ballweg, county agricultural agent.

Slightly smaller beef supply, boosts in consumer purchasing power, a growing population and reduced supplies of pork indicate that beef prices will be up in the coming year, according to Harold Riley, farm economist at Michigan State University.

Riley says that prices for choice grades at Chicago will likely average between \$22 and \$24 during the first six months of 1957. These prices would be \$2 to \$3 above prices in the same period of 1956.

The MSU farm economist does not expect the sharp rise in cattle prices next fall that occurred in the fall of 1956. Trends indicate that a record number of cattle are on feed this year.

Riley points out that Michigan farmers who have abundant supplies of roughage on hand should do well by wintering low grade steers for the April-May market. The extreme drought in the southwestern U. S. has forced large marketing of cattle there and also cut the demand for feeding and grazing stock. Also, the large corn crop in the central and eastern corn belt areas has put farmers in that area in a favorable position to make average profits from cattle feeding next year.

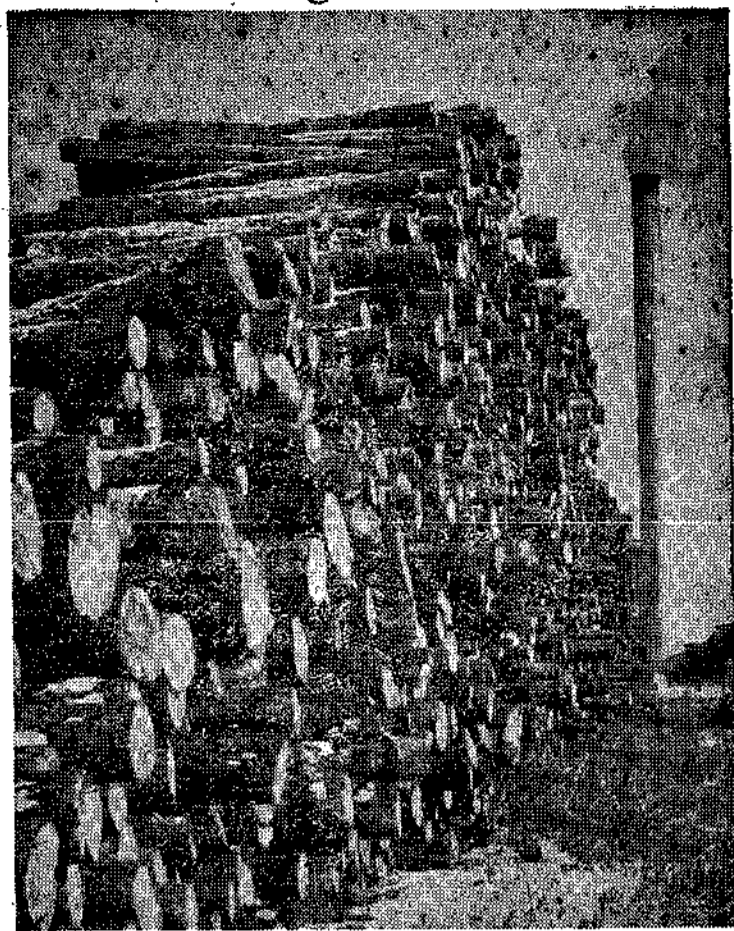

Blue Cheese Puts New Flavor Zip In Apple Pie

THERE'S no doubt about it. Apple pie is an American favorite of long standing.

You've undoubtedly tried triangles of cheese served with it, but the latest trick is to cut some blue cheese right into the crust. It gives just the right amount of zip to the apples and helps produce a pastry which is mouth-



wateringly flaky and tender. It's the season for apples now and you might try this apple pie for a refreshingly different treat.

Apple Pie, Cheese Pastry (Makes 1 10-inch pie)

3 ounces crumbled American blue cheese
 1/2 cup shortening
 2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
 5 tablespoons cold water
 6 cups thinly sliced tart apples
 1/2 cup sugar
 3 tablespoons lemon juice
 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
 3 tablespoons butter

Cut cheese and shortening into flour with pastry blender or two knives. Add water in small amounts, stirring lightly. Press dough lightly into two balls. Roll one ball to 1/4-inch thickness on lightly floured surface. Press into 10-inch pie plate.

Combine apples, sugar, lemon juice and nutmeg; mix well and turn into pie plate. Dot with butter. Roll out remaining pastry and place over apples. Press edges together and flute. Cut slits in top to permit escape of steam. Bake in a hot (400° F.) oven 45 to 50 minutes or until apples are tender.

Relax Your Mouth; For Beauty's Sake

All occasions do not warrant smiles of the wide, mouth open variety, but an inward smile gives a pleasing effect which does wonders for the face. Think of something pleasing or whimsical and watch your mouth in a mirror.

Your first step in getting rid of the mannerisms is to be conscious of them. Then substitute a bad habit with a good one.

Flattering Color
 Lipstick is one of the first things people notice about you. It's because of the red for one thing, and then because the mouth is a prominent feature.

To find the shade most flattering to your skin and clothes you may take a bit of experimenting with the small sizes, but it's well worth it so neither skin nor clothes fade out.

In general the red-red is perfect for all complexions and most clothes. Blue-red tones are good with pinkish skins or sensitive skins will have an almost transparent look.

Yellowish-red tones are fine for most dark complexioned people with some sallowness in their coloring or blondes who have tans.

Cream the lips as often as you do the face so the lips won't dry out or crack. Remember, too, that a lovely smile depends on your teeth which should be cared as necessary by the dentist and scrubbed scrupulously every day to avoid food stains.

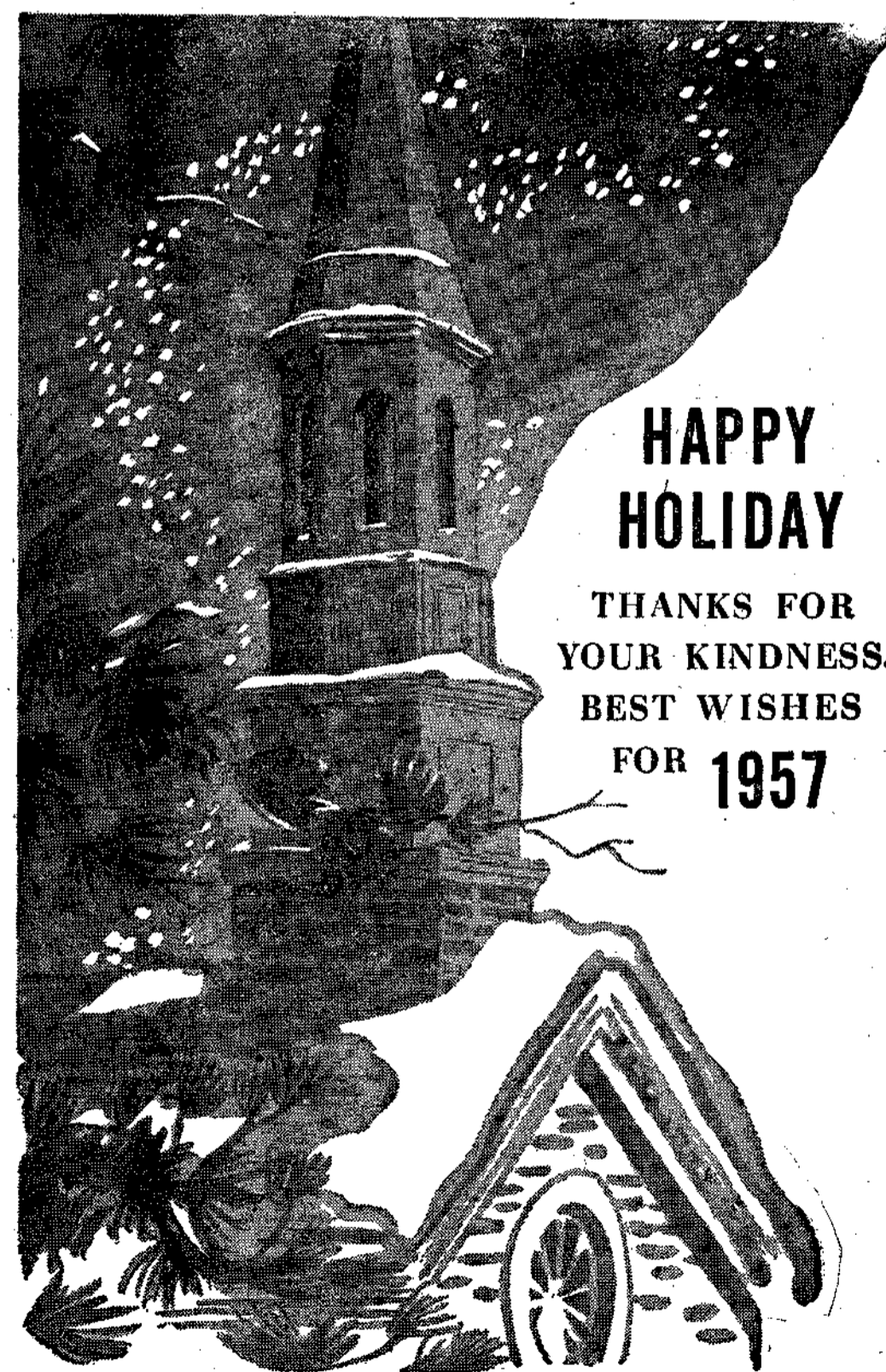




